

Pateritsas to reign as Miss Florida Seafood

The 2009 Miss Florida Seafood pageant showcased the beauty, talent and fitness of the county's young women Saturday night, culminating in the selection of Isabel Pateritsas to reign throughout the year.

The blue-eyed, auburn-haired Franklin County High School junior took first place in three of the four categories to win the hearts of the three judges from Jackson County.

Pateritsas, daughter of Franklin County High School English teacher Callie Nichols and Mario Pateritsas, of Greece, won in the interview segment, which ac-

counts for 40 percent of the total; in the poise and appearance portion, 25 percent of the scoring; and in the talent category, 20 percent of the total.

Named first runner-up was Franklin County High School junior Shelby Shiver, who won in the physical fitness category, 15 percent of the scoring. She is the daughter of Mike and Melanie Shiver.

Named Miss Congeniality was Port St. Joe High School junior Madelin Zambrano, daughter of Bianca and Mariano Zambrano.

FACING OFF

Four candidates to seek two seats in Sept. 8 elections

Four candidates are facing off at the ballot box Sept. 8 to fill two spots on the Carrabelle city commission.

Incumbent Richard Sands, 49, who lives at 911 Tallahassee Street, is seeking re-election as he runs against three challengers: Cherry

Rankin, 49, from 205 Marks Street; Cal Allen, 71, from 1204 Gulf Avenue; and Charlotte Russell Schneider, from 1622 Bayou Drive.

The top two votegetters at the Sept. 8 election will be declared the winners. There are a little over 900 registered voters in Carrabelle.

The following are four stories of the candidates, appearing in alphabetical order.

Cal Allen wants jobs for Carrabelle

Cal Allen is a candidate for Carrabelle City Commission who seeks to encourage tourism, commercial fishing and other business in Carrabelle. The following is a statement from the candidate:

"Because of my interest in the city, I have attended most of the city commission meetings since 1999. I participated in meetings discussing the Comprehensive Plan for 2020 and the land development regulations. I have studied the issues.

"My goal is to develop jobs and

Rankin believes her past will serve Carrabelle's future

Cherry Rankin is seeking a seat on the Carrabelle City Commission. Her platform rests on providing activities to expand and enhance resources available to Carrabelle's youth.

"I am a lifelong resident of this great city and have entered this race to further my commitment to better the place where I was born and raised and have raised my five children," she said. "This is my home."

In an interview, she began by openly addressing what she termed "so much

Sands wants to be voice of people

Commissioner Richard Sands said he wants to remain the voice of the people.

"I am running now for the same reason I ran before. I want to be sure that everybody gets heard whether I agree or disagree with them," he said.

He urged everyone to vote at the upcoming election. "My big concern is that nobody's going to show up to vote because it is a small election with no big controversial issue. I'll be surprised if 50 percent of the voters show up," he said.

Sands expressed pride in his last four years of service on the city commission.

P&Z slows proposed retail store for island

The county's planning and building board last week short-circuited a hotly-contested plan to build the largest retail store ever proposed for St. George Island.


The plan, which involves adding 8,000 square feet alongside the existing 7,000-square-foot St. George Island Trading Company, must now be resubmitted since it has been modified from the original proposal.

After lengthy discussion, the board voted 5-2 at its Aug. 10 meeting to table the project indefinitely. Board Chairman Tony Millender, Vice Chairman Larry Perryman and board members Jean Ulrich, Steve Davis and Gayle Dodds voted to table, with board members John Murphy and Dakie Ward opposed.

The board also pledged to begin a visioning process to create a comprehensive plan for the island.

An eighth member of the planning board, Mary Lou Short, recused herself on the advice of County Planner Alan Pierce, since her ownership of the nearby Island Emporium could represent a possible conflict of interest. Speaking as a "private citizen" from a seat in the audience, Short led criticism of the project on behalf of about 50 residents, primarily from St. George Island, on hand to oppose the project.

The board, which reviews proposed construction plans, issues permits, per-

forms inspections on construction and investigates building code complaints, reviewed the proposal by local real estate broker, Oliver Monod, to erect an 8,000 square foot retail center on Lots 8-24, Block 6 East, the site of Anchor Realty's former island office.

Millender told the assembly he had received four letters opposing the store. Ulrich and Dodds each said they had received over 20 negative emails. Ward said he had received 17.

"Maybe we can finish this right now, how many of you are here to oppose this project?" asked Davis.

Dozens of people raised their hands.

Building modified to be freestanding

Pierce said the proposed retail outlet shared a wall with the existing St. George Island Trading

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Claudette brings rainfall, but little damage

Tropical Storm Claudette blew in Sunday morning, left by Monday morning and didn't leave very much damage in her wake.

The National Weather Service said a record rainfall of 3.57 inches was set at Apalachicola Sunday, breaking the old record of 1.89 inches set in 1931.

Claudette was supposed to make landfall Sunday evening, packing winds of up to 50 miles per hour, but the gusts were likely well below that.

Power was out for up to 1,500 county residents at times during the day, mainly in the 11-Mile area. But by 8 p.m., Progress Energy had gotten everybody back on, with no lengthy interruptions.

The Florida Park Service closed the

campgrounds and evacuated all overnight visitors Sunday from St. Joseph Peninsula and St. George Island state parks, but reopened them Monday.

Claudette, the first tropical storm to strike the mainland this season, made landfall at Fort Walton Beach.

Pam Brownell, director of the Emergency Operations Center, said the EOC was activated at a Level 2, partial activation, until the National Weather Service dropped the storm warning early Monday morning.

She said the only damage reported was a tree blown down across U.S. 98 in Apalachicola. "It was a good practice for a hurricane," she said.



County boosts assessments for firefighter funding

The county commission unanimously passed a measure Tuesday morning increasing Municipal Service Benefit Units (MSBU) across the board to support volunteer fire departments.

The biggest change is that vacant parcels of land will now pay MSBUs. Each parcel of vacant land with a tax number will be assessed \$10 regardless of the size of the parcel. As a development is subdivided, the individual owners will be assessed.

Property Appraiser Doris Pendleton said property owners with multiple contiguous lots can contact the appraiser's office and have the lots combined under a new parcel number. When the owner deeds out a lot, the appraiser will automatically create a new tax number for that lot.

Single-family residences and multifamily rental units, will be assessed at \$50 per unit, up from the current \$42. The rate for mobile home parks, travel trailer/RV rental parks and commercial establishments will go from \$12 to \$16 per space, with the maximum rising to \$375, from the current \$300.

Hotels will pay \$10 per unit, up from \$7, with the maximum going to \$500, up from the current \$300.

Travel trailer and RV rental spaces will go from \$5 to \$8 per space, with the maximum going from \$300 to \$375 per park.

The rate for commercial buildings will be \$100, rather than \$75, with a \$375 maximum for

commercial establishments such as malls, up from \$300.

Buildings housing multiple business activities will pay \$375, up from \$300.

With the increased assessments, Alligator Point will generate about \$51,500 annually from residential properties and vacant land, about \$20,000 more than this year.

"The MSBU meets our operating costs, but we still need help with capital improvements," said Alligator Point Fire Chief Steve Fling, referring to the situation across the county.

"Let's see how all of this works out before we talk about any more funding. We have to discuss more options," said Commissioner Cheryl Sanders.

Apalachicola will receive \$30,000, and Carabelle \$36,000, as its allotment for serving unincorporated areas.

Dog Island will generate \$9,000 a year, about \$4,000 more than it got this past year.

Eastpoint will receive \$37,000, which still falls short of their \$53,000 operating budget, but Fire Chief George Pruett said he believes commercial assessments will make up the difference. Last year, Eastpoint generated about \$45,000 from MSBU funds.

Lanark Village will gather \$52,000, about \$22,000 more than this year and which will meet their operating expenses for the first time in three years.

St. George Island will generate MSBU assessments totaling close to \$101,000, about \$32,000 more than was generated this past year.

Apalachicola proposes millage rate hike

The city of Apalachicola is proposing to raise millage rates by nearly 27 percent next year in an effort to generate about the same amount of property taxes as last year.

At its first budget workshop held Aug. 18, City Clerk Lee Mathes unveiled a budget that proposed an ad valorem tax rate of 7.56 mills, 1.6 mills more than this year's tax rate of 5.96 mills, or about 26.8 percent.

The 2009-10 budget would raise \$1.32 million, just \$69,786 more than the roughly \$1.25 million raised during the current budget year. This is due to a sharp decline of nearly \$35 million in the city's tax base, from \$209.7 million to \$174.8 million.

As required by state law, Mathes' budgeting sets aside 5 percent of tax revenue in cash reserve, so the city would have \$1.26 million to spend.

Together with \$160,000 in revenue from utility franchise fees, \$125,000 from the half-cent sales tax, \$95,000 from utility taxes, \$90,000 from state revenue sharing, \$85,000 from local communications taxes and the rest from a host of other taxes and fees, the city will have about \$2.07 million in fresh revenue next year.

In addition, the city has a \$544,000 carryover from last year, including \$74,000 from the county's Municipal Benefits Service Units fees, which the city receives for handling fire emergencies in unincorporated areas outside the city limits. In addition, the cash forward amount includes \$106,000 in local option gas tax monies and \$365,000 in cash reserves.

City commission candidates Brenda Ash and Jerry Hall were both on hand for the workshop, as were their opponents, incumbents Frank Cook and Valentina Webb.

At the Aug. 4 meeting, Ash urged the commission to set the millage rate below the proposed 7.56 mills. "It's time to stop the fiscal

madness and adjust to the economic times in which we live," she said.

Hall asked at the workshop that the commissioners find more funding for the fire department by finding cuts to the administration and police department, specifically mentioning the building inspector as an area that should be considered. He also called on the police to consider financing their purchases of new cruisers over time, rather than paying cash up front.

Nearly all department had roughly the same expenditures as last year, with the police department proposing to spend \$601,000, administrative operations \$374,650, city hall department \$362,860, public works \$286,425, street department \$263,685, fire department \$55,500, recreation \$45,000 and library \$24,900.

On the request of the library board, the com-

mission added \$3,000 for compensation to additional hours being put in librarian Caty Greene, who is not a city employee but is paid as an independent contractor. They also added \$1,000 for the first responders.

In addition, they took out a \$5,000 line item for travel reimbursement to Bill McCartney, who has been brought on board to lobby for state funds in Tallahassee.

Water and sewer billings and other fees are expected to bring in about \$1.5 million next year, with the cost of running the two departments to run about \$1.29 million.

Mayor Van Johnson urged the commission to look carefully for more savings in the budget in advance of the Tuesday, Aug. 25, workshop at 6 p.m. But he noted that one mill generates about \$175,000, well below the more than \$2 million a mill generates

countywide.

"We're not dealing with a whole lot of money, contrary to what people think," he said, noting that if the millage rate were kept the same, the city would see a loss of nearly \$210,000.

"The only way you're going to get these (savings) is to start laying off people," he said. "You guys want to do that, let's start deciding. Who you want to layoff?"

Johnson said that Police Chief Bobby Varnes has been good about trimming overtime costs, and that as mayor he would not jeopardize the safety of officers or citizens by making further cuts in the department.

Cook said he planned to look at areas where "we can wiggle around a little bit" to achieve cost savings. "It's going to be hard," he said.

"We really need to take a closer look at this," Johnson said.

Heaven knows, I have breathed in plenty of the stuff during my lifetime.

As kids, the mosquito control truck offered a grand opportunity. We thought it great fun to weave our bicycles in and out of the billowing clouds of poison fog. The parents didn't seem to mind. We gleefully followed the truck for blocks.

At home, my father considered mosquitoes in the house a personal affront. Armed with aerosol bug killer, he created airborne killing fields targeted wherever humming was heard. I

distinctly remember lying in bed in my darkened room when the light would flash on. Daddy would be striding around, blanketing the air with his heavy artillery. My sister and I would lie there ensconced in fumes, but, at least, the mosquitoes didn't keep us awake. I'm not sure how I feel about that quid pro quo.

Mosquito control has always been a very big deal in Florida, and

the No. 1 drive-in in Apalachicola certainly did its part. Movies started at dark, a prime feeding time, and the critters had a captive audience. The concession stand provided weaponry to help us fight back. Along with sodas, popcorn and candy bars, patrons could buy insecticide coils to burn in the car.

We generally placed ours on the middle of the floor in the front. There

it glowed, much like incense, quietly filling the air with smoke. I don't think it really killed the bugs, but rather acted like a portable smudge pot, keeping the critters away.

During those days, the insects were the enemy, not the poisons we used to kill them. Regular folks certainly didn't consider long-time health implications.

Granted, "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson was published in 1962, raising concerns about insecticides, but the use of DDT wasn't banned until 1972. The massive environmental movement of today was a long time coming.

Even though we might think of our grandparents' generation as the original organic farmers, I'm here to tell you that my Nana and Papa embraced the availability of fertilizer and chemical pest-killers. I suppose they had hauled enough manure in their childhood days.

They farmed a decent-sized plot at their home on Brownsville Road.

Before planting, they always treated the soil with a chemical to kill nematodes. They simply were not going to risk malformed roots and misshapen vegetables. Papa also adored fertilizer. Nana would rant when she found burned plants, which were the product of Papa's zeal to obtain maximum growth.

Given the chemical-laced experiences of my childhood, I'm not sure being careful with pesticide even matters for me anymore. However, I now close the windows and bring the dog in when I hear the mosquito control truck. I think I will continue my one-on-one tactic with the roaches, and I'll attempt to go organic in my raised-bed gardening experiment.

The fleas, now, that's another story for another time.

Stabilization money (\$388,000 for Franklin District) and Stimulus money (IDEA and Title 1) will exist for two years, as a gift. It is not a guaranteed source of funding; therefore, when the stimulus dollars are no longer available, any programs or staff paid from these programs would have to be discontinued.

Our future looks great! The Franklin County School Board employees will rise to whatever occasion is presented. The worldwide financial crisis can continue without this district's involvement as we will tighten up, conserve energy everywhere we can and be proud of our accomplishments when the sun sets over the nest.

Company and would "trip the trigger for allowed commercial density" on the site. He said the maximum allowed footprint was 15,000 square feet. The proposed plan showed a 15,100 square foot combined footprint.

Monod said the footprint of the plan had been reduced to 8,000 square feet and that in the revised plan, both structures would be freestanding.

"In the site plan, the building appears to be attached," asked Pierce.

Jim Waddell, of Inovia Consulting Group, who engineered the plan, said it had been revised immediately prior the meeting. He also said the new plan met the code for parking, loading and impervious surface and would not require a variance under the site's zoning.

Riley Palmer, of Riley Palmer Construction, the

firm tapped to construct the building described the proposed structure as "a pre-engineered, freestanding, single slope building."

Monod told the board he planned to use most of the proposed structure to house a grocery store, with 1,200 square feet carved out to house new offices for Anchor Realty and Vacation Rentals.

"I am the landlord," he said. "I have decided initially to rent to a grocery store because I think there's a need. The round trip from the Plantation to Apalachicola is one hour. This will have many benefits for island residents."

"I don't think it's commonly asked what a building will be used for when you go before planning and zoning," he said. "I am working very hard for it to be a grocery store at first, but I cannot guarantee it

will be one forever."

Monod said the project would be permitted under all of the necessary agencies.

"If you look at the buildings in the St. George Island commercial district, it would be shorter to give a list of buildings in compliance with code than those that are not," he said.

Accusations of foreign labor

Tom Loughridge voiced anger at what he said was "vulgar trash" merchandise, including T-shirts with lewd phrases being sold above toys meant for children. "It's an insult to the women of the county," he said.

Loughridge said Monod had an "ugly history" of misrepresenting his plans to the county. "He told us

St. George Island Trading Company would be owned by a family and managed by a couple on the island," said Loughridge. "The manager, Mr. Afuta, lives on 146 Bainbridge Street in Panama City. They employ one local and bring in all the other employees from Israel on a work visa. He needs to tell the truth."

Monod responded angrily to Loughridge's charges, and said they were "unfounded accusations." He said Mr. and Mrs. Nissim Afuta were "a hardworking couple and they have all of my respect" and that they had asked Monod to find them a house in the county to live.

He also jotted down a list of 13 employees at the store, including Billy Tomlin, Sheena Forehand, Michelle Ramsden, Leigh Redmond, Lindsey Carter, Debbie Soderholm, Can-

dice Adams, Sean Mendez-Catlin, Brandon Breaks, Kayla Medley, Cierra Griffin, Tera Cruson and Kelsey Codrington. He said the proposed store would employ another 30 locals.

Pierce said the existing St. George Island Trading Company has created problems on Franklin Boulevard because the building has no rear door. Instead of parking in the lot at the rear of the building, customers park in the right of way, Pierce said, adding that another large store on the site could worsen the problem.

"The FDOT (Florida Department of Transportation) regards the plan as an upgrade for access management to Franklin Boulevard, because it actually reduces the number of driveways entering the road," Monod said.

Riley said the new store would improve the park-

ing situation because, although the main entrance is in the front, the proposed grocery would have a set of double doors in the rear. He said people could use those doors to access Anchor and the grocery and to walk through to the Trading Company.

Dodds said Monod had not conformed to his stated plan for the existing Trading Company. She said he originally proposed the store as a temporary building that would allow him to generate income from the property during the economic downturn.

"The store is built to withstand 140 mph winds. I guess any building is temporary if you have a big enough bulldozer," said Tom Loughridge.

Monod said the structure of the St. George Island

Isabel Nichols was on hand Saturday night to share, with her daughter Callie, in her granddaughter's joy. Callie's sister, Rosalie, was selected Miss Florida Seafood at the 1974 pageant. Ten years ago, she and her young son Matthew died in an automobile accident.

"We have lots of family history here, my mom and all her sisters were in the pageant," said Pateritsas. "I'm so happy I'm going to be able to carry on in the tradition and represent Franklin County."

The new queen's mom and grandmother beamed as they congratulated her on the stage after the pageant. In a black sequined dress, Pateritsas had sung the Hilary Duff song "Someone's Watching Over Me" as her talent.



Trading Company could be dismantled at any time

Mark Curenton, assistant county planner, said later that even a temporary building constructed on the island would be built to withstand hurricane force winds.

Parking plan questioned

Speaking as a private citizen, Short spoke on behalf of citizens' complains. "No matter how you slice this piece of cake, a 15,000 square foot store in the center of the island is high impact," she said, contending that it did not meet requirements for parking and a loading zone.

Pierce said he counted 77 parking spaces but was not sure if the plan met code because it had been changed before the meeting and he had not had time to review it. "We let the St. George Island Trading Company double up on parking and loading and that has become a problem," he said.

"This parking plan is an engineer's nightmare," Short said.

"We need to ask Mr. Monod to put a concrete barrier up so people can't park on the right of way and put 'No parking' signs in place to stop the current problems," Pierce said.

Short said there were other problems with the plan as well.

"I do not believe there is another county in Florida that allows this kind of project on a barrier island with only a septic system. A good golfer could hit a ball into the bay in one direction and turn around and hit one into the Gulf in the other. There are a number on people on the island who are poised and ready to file suit against the county if this project is approved," she said.

"I own 13 commercial acres across the street from the site," said James DeMonia. "It will be a pretty good job for a garbage truck to get to the dumpsters the way this plan is drawn. I do not approve of what's already been done with stormwater. It's a shotgun aimed at my property and I'm not happy with the parking situation either."

Lisa Munson, who works as a store clerk on the island said, "People come here for the unique atmosphere. That's why I moved here. If we don't put a comp plan in place soon, we're going to lose that and we're going to lose a major part of our economy."

Dodds said, "In the past we have tried to do things

piecemeal on the island. It has become more and more obvious with more and more development that we are not doing a good enough job. Now is not the time to do anything more or less than to look at an overall comp plan for the island."

Further specifics sought on project

Monod said it was unfair to use proposed comp plan consideration to thwart the project. "That is an idea that should have been implemented earlier if you want it to apply today," he said.

"We need a comp plan but every time we get to that point, the county commission and their attorney tell us you can't apply different standards here because it's not incorporated," Short said. "This is a fragile ribbon of land. If the state can declare Franklin County an area of critical concern, then I believe we can carve this out too."

Monod said he planned to pursue approval of the plan before the county commission at the Tuesday, Aug. 18 meeting. But, because changes were made to the proposal between its initial submission to the board and county planner and the planning board's Aug. 11 meeting, County Attorney Michael Shuler said Monod must resubmit his plan to the planning board at their Sept. 8 meeting.

Curenton said he wrote an Aug. 13 letter to Monod detailing the questions that must be answered before the plan can be reconsidered. He said the letter asks for dimensions on parking spaces because this is unclear in the plans, and specifies the two buildings must have a minimum of 76 spaces.

Curenton said each building must have a 10' by 25' loading and unloading space with at least 14 feet of clearance, and location of loading areas must be shown on the plan. To allow for stormwater drainage, 20 percent of the site must be pervious, Curenton said, noting there is no indication of surface type on the site plan.

Curenton said there were also concerns about fire safety because the plan did not show the proximity to St. George Inn.

Not all the opponents were pleased with the outcome. "I'm disappointed. I don't think they have any guts," said Don Grinenko. "They should have just stopped it."

controversy and negative accusations in the past."

In Oct. 2005, Rankin was charged with grand theft, a third degree felony, while serving as president of the Franklin County Senior Citizens Council. The charge stemmed from more than \$5,600 in purchases made in connection with her work on the council. Prosecutors said the purchases were of a personal nature and therefore questionable.

Rankin pled not guilty and Circuit Judge William Gary withheld adjudication in the case. By July 2006, Rankin had paid the \$370 she was assessed in court costs, and in Jan. 2007 she had completed her community service and probation was ended.

"When I decided to run, I knew I had a past. Everybody does," she said. "This race isn't about me and my past; it is about my future, our future, the future of the City of Carrabelle. I can't do anything about the past, but to grow and learn from it. And that I have. I have learned from my past and the experiences

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Seahawks roll with schedule changes

With two telephone calls, the Franklin County Seahawks' 2009 football season got even tougher last week before any player ever stepped on the gridiron for a game.

But judging from the 34 players introduced Friday night to parents — their morale, discipline and crisp appearance — they are up to the challenge.

The John Paul II Panthers, originally slated to travel to Eastpoint on Oct. 2 to be opponents in the Seahawk homecoming, called Coach Josh Wright on Aug. 13 to say they had canceled their season.

"Evidently, they did not have enough to fill their team," said Mike Todd, Franklin County High School's athletic director.


Wright scrambled to re-arrange the schedule by turning Oct. 2 into a bye week, and agreeing to travel to Graceville on Sept. 25, the day that had been the Seahawks' bye week.

"Graceville was also to play John Paul, so we used our little noodle and said, 'Look, if John Paul was going to be there, then we'd like to fill that date,'" Todd said. "At this point in the year, you have to get who you can get."

Wright agreed to a two-year contract with Graceville, which has the Tigers coming here in 2010. And since the Seahawks lose a home game this year, the contract stipulates that if the Tigers opt out of next year's contest, the Seahawks program will get half the gate from the 2009 matchup.

In addition to dwindling down to four home games, the Seahawks will face in the Tigers a 1B opponent considered more formidable than John Paul, especially since Graceville was state runner-up in 2005.

Also, Franklin County will have to choose another home game, likely Oct. 23 vs. Liberty County or Oct. 30 vs. Blountstown, to turn into homecoming.

But coming off a strong summer practice regimen, and judging from Friday's presentation, Seahawks fans should see a season improved from the last two winless ones.

"We averaged 23 kids a workout," Todd said. "We had some true dedication of the kids, and that's something we haven't had in this county for several years. People will see a difference. We're going to be stronger because of the dedication."

Wright, together with assistant coaches Mike Emerson, Todd Van Sickle and Fred Drake, and training assistant Connie Turner and Todd, closed out last week's practice with a parents meeting Friday evening on the field.

Wright introduced each player separately as they trotted across the field. He outlined each young man's height, weight and playing responsibilities, and gave each description the same emphasis, the same hype. It was the hallmark of a team concept, and parents seemed impressed by what they saw.

As he sent the boys up to the stands to join their moms and dads, he gave them a directive. "Tell them you love them, because

you probably don't do that enough," he said.

Each player carried an envelope in his hands to give to mom or dad, and it was paperwork to review. The first sheet was a list of how well players attended summer workouts and who was qualified to come out and play.

"We don't have a problem right now," Wright said. "There's a direct relation between how many summer workouts they made (and how well they perform)."

Wright also introduced a Touchdown Club fundraiser, in which the players will be selling \$10 cards that entitle the purchaser to a series of discounts at local stores and restaurants. The more cards the players sell, the more chances they'll have in the drawing, from cash in a helmet, in which they could draw out anything from a buck to a C-note.

Wright has also introduced a series of SuperHawk and BigHawk supporter categories, where for a donation, fans can get perks that include complimentary game tickets, preferred parking and attendance to team functions.

The coach focused on his overall message, rather

than any detailed discussion of his offensive or defensive strategy. That will come to light at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Aug. 21, on the field, when the Crimson and White scrimmage game is held.

"Nobody I've talked to in

the community has had a negative attitude," Wright said. "Everybody wants us to do well."

He shared a story he heard from a veteran, who talked about how many miles it would take an air-

craft carrier to turn or to reverse itself, given its enormous size.

"We've turned the rudder and we've changed direction," the coach said. "I'm excited because we have the right system."

"I feel the commission has done more for the community than at any time in the past," he said. "I am proud that I was part of a commission that tried to bring industry to this county. The GreenSteel might not be real fruitful right now, but if they can hang on, I think it will be worthwhile."

"The first time I ran, somebody told me that I wasn't qualified. I thought the only way to get qualified was to run and get elected," Sands said. "Now I feel like I am better qualified than before. I have a good grasp of the city's needs and I

can prioritize."

"I don't think some of the candidates realize what they are getting into. You have to put in the legwork," he said. "Times are tough out there right now. You can't be a commissioner in Carrabelle one day a month. You have to have your feet on the ground. You have to be a commissioner everyday."

"Priorities have changed since the last time I ran. Anyone who thinks they are going to get a lot of grant money is going to be disappointed. It's not out there anymore. My major concern is trying to

keep people working and reducing the burden on the taxpayers." He said.

"I will continue to try and make Carrabelle a better place. That is my promise. I feel both this commission and the former commission have worked to help seniors and our youth. We have provided funding to ElderCare and supported the Senior Center. We built Tilly Miller Park for the kids," he said. over our dinner table. As a developer's wife and a realtor I must recuse myself any time there is a conflict of interest. That means my husband or my boss has lost a vote I have already shown that I will recuse myself while serving on Planning and Zoning."

Schneider believes she has the solution to Carrabelle's economic woes.

"I am pro tourism. I have been blessed to always be able to support myself. When I first went to work in the tourist industry it was like a revelation. I was able to support myself here without working three jobs," she said. "When I worked as a shucker, I was a pretty good shucker, I could work as long as the bay was open but if something happened and

it closed, I could be out of a job for weeks.

"I want to see more jobs and more income for the city as a whole. Carrabelle is known for its fishing and that's what brings people here to buy our gas, eat in our restaurants and shop in our stores," she said. "I think we have a good board who would like to see Carrabelle grow but they have never dealt with tourism."

Schneider wants to see the commission more involved in developing the tourist industry.

"What we need is a commissioner who will join the historical society and go to meetings," she said. "I want to see Carrabelle get its historic designation. This is where we trained for Normandy. That started tourism in Florida. The people who

trained here came back. Someone should work one on one with the chamber of commerce to develop it.

"There are girls who drive from here to St. George Island and Apalachicola to wait tables. That's at least an extra hour a day they spend away from their families. They could be working right here in Carrabelle," she said. "I was appalled that we didn't give the Tourist Development Council an office here in the city complex. The publicity we would have received through that office could have been amazing"

Schneider said she also has environmental concerns. "Growing up here, in my era, we were taught that septic tanks were killing the bay so I'm all for sewers," she said.

Florida unveils campaign to ready for license changes

The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles has launched GatherGoGet.com — an educational campaign designed to assist Floridians with new driver license and identification card requirements.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2010, Floridians renewing or obtaining a new license or ID will be required to show proof of identification, Social Security number and residential address (two items).

The campaign is anchored by a new website designed to help residents understand the new requirements.

The department is encouraging Floridians to visit GatherGoGet.com to find out how and when to gather your documents, go to a driver license office and get your

new card.

The GatherGoGet.com campaign Web site will enable residents to determine when they will need to visit a driver license or tax collector office; create a personalized checklist detailing documents they will need; obtain contact information showing where to get required documents; and browse a list of driver license offices in their local area.

"Florida is a national leader in driver license and ID card security," said Electra Theodorides-Bustle, the department's executive director.

"These new requirements reflect our continuing commitment to the integrity and security of this process and will help lead the way to a safer Florida."

Beginning Jan. 1,

2010, all Florida residents wishing to obtain a new license, legally change their name prior to the renewal date, or immediately replace a lost or stolen license or ID card should visit an office with the required documents ready for processing.

Those simply renewing may do so by a convenience method via the Internet or mail one time between office visits.

The next renewal after the convenience option must be in a driver license or tax collector office. Residents may always update their address or obtain a replacement card online at GoRenew.com.

"We are working to produce the most secure identification document possible and by improv-

ing our issuance process we will ensure that the personal information of Floridians is safer from identity theft," said Sandra Lambert, director of the Division of Driver License.

Residents are encouraged to use GatherGoGet.com not only to identify the documents they need, but also to find out when they will need to visit an office.

As the changes might require some preparation, the department encourages residents to visit the Web site to speed through the process in order to keep from having to make a second trip.


