

# Swine flu vaccine to arrive in county any day

County health officials have everything in place except the vaccine in hand as they prepare to immunize county residents, particularly young people, against the increasing presence of the H1N1 virus.

Commonly known as swine flu, the new strain of influenza has plagued a growing number of individuals in the county, although no serious cases have been reported.

"We've ordered enough for the whole county, and we were supposed to be getting some last week, but the first shipment was scheduled for Sept. 30, and that's come and gone," said registered nurse Sherry Willis, the health department's director of nursing and school health coordinator.

"We've ordered over 12,000 doses, and we'll get an allotment based upon the county population," she said. "How many we will get is up in the air."

First to arrive is expected to be the LAIV flu mist, a nasal

spray that contains a live attenuated influenza strain. This is recommended for people ages 2 to 49 who do not have underlying medical conditions, such as asthma, or who have a compromised immune system.

"The first targeted group was supposed to be pregnant women, but we can't use it (the mist) on them," Willis said. "We are also supposed to be contacting people who are caring for children less than 6 months, plus health care workers."

"This was just something that

became available, and they decided to ship it," she said. "The group will be limited by how many doses we get."

Those targeted groups, pregnant women, caretakers of children 6 months old and younger, and direct health care givers will all be first to get the shots once they arrive. Following that, the priority is to immunize all children between 6 months and school ages, and then 19- to 24-year-olds.

"We're targeting all children. Our plans are to make it available at first with the younger ones, by

going to day cares, and for stay-at-home children, and make it available at a clinic," Willis said.

From there, the health department will address the school-age population and will administer the vaccine to students at the school who have signed permission slips from their parents.

"This is a purely voluntary immunization; the parent does not have to have child immunized," Willis said. "They will have information ahead of time."

## Contractors' rebids delay Apalachicola bank project

Because initial construction cost estimates came in higher than expected, rebuilding the Apalachicola State Bank is taking longer than bank officials initially thought, but it should be off the ground by year's end.

"We are full steam ahead to rebuild," said Terry DuBose, chairman and chief executive officer of Coastal Community Bank, of which the Apalachicola branch is a part. "I am certainly hopeful that in the next 45 or so days we

## TDC funds more events to boost county tourism

In response to an increased number of grant requests this fall, the Franklin County Tourist Development Council will boost its 2009-10 offseason grant award budget to help more local nonprofit groups promote tourism-related events in Franklin County.

Over the next year, the TDC will spend \$88,000 to help promote 27 events and festivals — five more events than were funded in 2008.

According to TDC officials, it is hoped that the TDC's decision to provide more funding for more frequent smaller events will pay off by providing visitors more reasons to return to Franklin County and spend money locally.

"We have noticed that a growing number of visitors are coming from shorter distances and booking rooms on a shorter notice," said Helen Spohrer, TDC chairwoman. "If we focus on these trends and offer visitors inexpensive ways to visit more frequently, our visitor traffic will increase and the local economy will benefit."

The TDC prepared the list based on ranked grant applications received earlier this season. The Franklin County Board of County Commissioners approved the TDC recommendation at their Sept. 15 meeting.

The following is a list of the five new grant recipients added to the event funding schedule this year.

**Crooked River Lighthouse Lantern Festival:** Hosted by the Carrabelle Lighthouse Association at the Carrabelle Beach Crooked River Lighthouse, this evening event on Oct. 31 commemorate a famous shipwreck that occurred off the coast of Carrabelle in 1769. The festival will feature a re-enactment of the shipwreck by the Panhandle Players Theatre group and a rare nighttime climb to the top of the Crooked River Lighthouse, as well as games and activities.

**St. George Island Snowbird Day:** Hosted by the St. George Island Business Association, this brand new event scheduled for Feb. 10, 2010, will be a celebration of the migration of St. George Island's favorite fowl — the Snowbird! Festivities will include a poker run to local establishments, free entry into the state park, fishing tournament with prizes, a reduced rate to climb the Cape St. George lighthouse, a bridge walk, a tour of the Plantation and dinner in the Lighthouse Park.

**Forgotten Coast Lighthouse Mini-Challenge:** Hosted by the St. George Island Lighthouse Association from April 23-24, 2010, this is an endurance event for serious lighthouse enthusiasts. Participants will visit and/or climb each of the four Forgotten Coast lighthouses over the two-day period. Participating lighthouses are St. Marks, Crooked River, Cape St. George and Cape San Blas. Each lighthouse auxiliary will offer their own food, music, arts, crafts, etc., and will present a commemorative item to the climber, and a special item will be presented if climbers visit all four lighthouses.

# County stakeholders learn to be firewise

Franklin County Emergency Management is partnering with the Florida Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry to educate homeowners about protecting their homes from wildfire.

On Tuesday, Sept. 29, about 30 representatives of local fire departments, city and county governments and parks and communities attended a workshop on Florida Firewise Communities.

Wildfire Mitigation Coordinator Jim Harrell and Jeff Bielling of Alachua County Emergency Management discussed the role of fire in the natural world, wildfire preparedness, and the roles of homeowners and local government in wildfire safety.

The Florida Firewise Program urges local governments and developers to partner with the Florida Division of Forestry, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, the U.S. Forest Service, and other state and federal agencies to protect themselves against wildfire.

According to the state publication "Living on the Edge in Florida," a publication of DOF, homes in the wildland/urban interface "are frequently vulnerable

to wildland fires because fire departments are no longer just minutes away and are, for the most part, unable to protect homes in outlying areas from wildland fire disaster. ... Homeowners must take some responsibility for home fire safety and become partners with the fire protection agencies."

In 1985, the Firewise Communities program was born, a national initiative promoting community action and homeowner responsibility as the only effective way to protect homes from wildfire. To be designated as Firewise, communities must organize a fire advisory board, analyze risks and possible mitigation strategies, and design and implement a

plan to minimize the hazard of wildfire.


St. James Bay has already achieved certification as a Firewise Community. Gramercy Plantation and the Plantation on St. George Island also are working toward certification.

Attendees at Tuesday's workshop practiced assessing fire risk in a model community called Edgewood.

The DOF has developed a pair of CDs for persons interested in Firewise communities or in simply protecting their own home against wildfire.

## BMI, Semper Fi tapped for sidewalk construction

The county has awarded the contract to construct three sidewalk projects using federal stimulus money to BMI Construction, of Franklin County, and Semper Fi Construction, of Palmetto.

During a special afternoon meeting of the county commission held Sept. 28, the advisory committee chosen to review bids for construction of the projects announced the work would be divided between two firms.

BMI Inc., a firm based on St. George Island, won the bid to construct two sections of sidewalk

on the island. They will construct 1,400 feet of sidewalk along Franklin Boulevard between the Lighthouse Park and the Fishing Pier at a cost of \$32,000. A second 3,000-foot section of sidewalk will be constructed on Pine Street in the business district at a cost of \$70,000.

Semper Fi will construct a 2,500 foot section of sidewalk along Bluff Road in Apalachicola at a cost of \$99,000.

A third company, Black Fin Construction of Mexico Beach, offered lower bids on all three projects but was disqualified because their submission packets were incomplete. Michael Krehl, CEO of

BMI, protested the award to Semper Fi, citing a clause of the bid package in which the board reserves the right to award the contract to a company it deems a "better value." He argued that a local firm represented a better value for the county.

In an interview after the meeting, Krehl said, "There was a \$3,000 difference between us and Semper Fi. This is the first job of any substance to come into the county in at least a year."

"We added that clause to the RFP," said County Planner Alan Pierce, a member of the advisory committee. "Unfortunately, under the stipulations of the federal government, the county did not have discretion to choose a local company."

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


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## Quel dommage, "Gourmet" magazine est mort

I find myself writing time and time again about the demise of a way of life and my struggle to understand the present. After Conde Nast's announcement last week, I once again felt loss and dismay.

Despite a healthy readership, "Gourmet" magazine has ceased publication. It seems advertising revenues were down by almost half. The news has rocked the world of people who like to read about food.

That would include me. I have subscribed to the publication on and off for over 30 years. At first, I kept every issue,

and then when I had to move, I would toss them all. How I regret that action now. In later years I came to understand that I probably would never get around to cataloging all of the recipes. I got into the habit of ripping out pages and stuffing them into my bulging cooking notebooks. The only complete issue I kept was one that mentioned Apalachicola, and now I can't seem to find it.

When a magazine arrived I settled into it the same way I would with a juicy novel. I looked at every page, and put a marker where I paused if I was called away. I loved the "You Asked For It," feature where readers asked for recipes from restaurants. I loved the letters section where readers sent in their favorites. I didn't much care for the restaurant reviews unless they were contained within a travel column.

On my budget, with my work schedule, and given my location, it was highly unlikely that I could locate ingredients or find time to cook most of the recipes. I did, however, simply love reading practically anything

"Gourmet" thought was important about food and living well.

When Ruth Reichl took over as editor a few years back, I thought the magazine improved in some areas. They took to writing articles about food sourcing and celebrating those farmers, ranchers and restaurateurs who looked beyond sauce swirls on a plate to using the freshest, most unadulterated ingredients. On the down side, the budget and time-saving recipes just seemed out of place. No magazine can be all things to all people.

You want "Taste of Home" practical recipes, you know where to go. It ain't "Gourmet."

Under Reichl's leadership "Gourmet" published my "go to" cookbook. Over a thousand recipes in a bright yellow volume came out in 2004. My sister gave it to me for Christmas, and many pages are already splattered with evidence of continuous usage.

Reichl doesn't really have to worry about losing her job. She has a public television program coming up and another cookbook already out. In fact, she was on a promotion tour when news of the death of "Gourmet" hit the press.

She is also an accomplished writer. I adored "Garlic and Sapphires: The Secret Life of a Critic in Disguise." As a food writer for a major newspaper she wore disguises to various restaurants and wrote about her treatment there, based on how she looked and acted.

Conde Nast continue to publish "Bon Appétit." I never liked it much and doubt that I will ever subscribe. After all, I have the Internet.

Lacking now is that treasured couple of hours turning thick pages of gorgeous photographs and slowly reading articles that transport me to a faraway spot with artisan food.

I will survive, but life will not be as rich.

## If you encounter a Florida black bear

As a seventh generation Northwest Florida native, I've grown up in bear country. I genuinely care about you and your child and want to give you the very best information I can on how to live safely near Florida black bears.

The Bear Safety Tip I would like to share with you today concerns the question, "What should I do if I come face-to-face with a Florida black bear?" Many people I talk to say all the TV programs tell you to play dead, so that is what they're going to do. Unfortunately most of our television comes to us from out West, and they have a different type of bear that you should play dead for out there. But we do not live out West or have those types of bears here.

Florida black bears are known for eating things that play dead or are dead. If an opossum sees a bear and plays dead, the bear sees an easy meal and "chomp" the bear will eat the opossum. If the bear comes across a deer that has been hit and killed by a car, the bear sees an easy meal and "chomp" will eat the dead deer. So if you play dead for a Florida black bear, the bear might think, "Hmm, I've never seen a dead one of these before, but OK, easy meal ... chomp."

You also should never run or turn your back on a bear. In bear language that means you are the weaker animal, and this will likely cause the bear to chase you. You are not faster than a black bear; they can run 37 miles per hour in a sprint. You also don't want to climb a tree because a black bear can climb a 100-foot tree in 30 seconds.

So at this point you are probably thinking, "Well, what can I do?" If you come up on a black bear at close range, it is best to stay calm, not make eye contact and back away slowly, keep your body facing the bear, and speak in a soft voice. In bear language, you are now using your actions and voice to communicate that you mean no harm to the bear. If the bear stands up on its hind legs while you are backing away, believe it or not this is probably a good sign. The bear is going into "telescope mode" to try and figure out what you are and likely looking for the best path to escape.

So remember: If you encounter a bear, remain calm and back away slowly, don't play dead, run or climb a tree.

As me and my ex-husband have 50/50 parental time sharing and so do many other parents, this has been an issue on the rise. My ex-husband had sent me an e-mail stating for me "Not to put our son on a bus again," but for the best interest of our child, on my scheduled time he needs to be in Apalachicola on certain days of the week.

I had called the superintendent immediately after receiving the news pertaining to my son. She has yet to return my messages, and she refused to see me when I went to speak with her in person about this ordeal. I was embarrassed at how rude Charlotte Smith, the superintendent's secretary, was and how short Mr. Coursey spoke with me on the phone. He stated that "He did not want to go against the code of conduct," which is irrelevant to this situation for the fact that my son does not normally get on a bus or ride a

bus to begin with.

I had already spoken to Mr. Coursey in the beginning of September about this matter, and he was very cooperative about it as long as there was a note to reinsure my son's safety for the teachers and the drivers as well. I am upset because neither one of them have any information pertaining to our custody case, just what my ex-husband has said to them and his family within the school system.

So, instead of Nina Marks meeting with me, she handed out to the school board secretary a memorandum about a workshop for transportation issues dated for Nov. 12, a whole month away. This is a situation about a child which should not be addressed a month away, but immediately! They want me to wait until then to answer any questions, give any reason as to why, or to discuss the matter with me.

As I did find out later that day, Nina had already spoken with my ex-husband Richard Smith about this matter (how ironic) and would not be discussing it further until Nov. 12. What happened to my constitutional right? What happened to my right as parent to give authority to my child?

Mr. Coursey stated that he did have authority to transport or not to transport my child if he decided.

This is discrimination; he is refusing to transport my child with all the other children who get transported. All of these people named were extremely rude to me whether it be on the phone or in person. Shouldn't the concern be about the children?

Some people have stated that my situation is complicated; well I am here to say that it is not rocket science. I am very displeased with the school system, I am very sorry that my child has to be a part of this school and the people behind it, I am sorry for trusting in you and not being able to call you the reason for the change in my child.

With this matter, you have failed, you have failed to support, reason, justify, compromise, or even face your situation, you ran ... Yes, I will be attending the workshop, but as a parent, I should not have to wait this long for answers pertaining to my child or from the people that work around my child in the schools.

I hope that this situation can be a focal point for some, and for some a solution to a problem that was on the rise for awhile. Now, we just need someone that can support us and help us resolve this issue as we know now, the ones we can trust and the ones we can not trust!

With a bright sun peeking from behind the clouds, and the rising temperature reminding the audience of about 50 people that summer weather has not entirely faded, the event celebrated the new clinic's role in serving the entire county.

"It's for all the people of Franklin County, not just the eastern end," said Commissioner Cheryl Sanders, citing the unified support for the project as an example of how "we can all live together without fussing."

Emceed by Weems CEO Chuck Colvert, sporting a tie in the outdoor heat, the groundbreaking took place about two weeks after its originally scheduled date was washed out by heavy rains.

Colvert said the project is poised to begin, although a project manager, who will be required to cover any costs exceeding the set contract amount, has yet to be selected from nine applicants.

He asked Clerk of Courts Marcia Johnson to confirm just how much cash had been put away for the project, funded from the 1-cent sales tax, of which half has been earmarked for capital improvement projects.

Johnson said the county had more than \$1 million put away for the construction.

"That's about the cost of this project, a million dollars," said Colvert, noting that the one-story building would be built in "Old Florida style" and would feature six exam rooms within the 5,000-square-foot footprint.

In addition, there will be X-ray capabilities, a laboratory for process tests and a procedure room.

"For all those people who like to go and stick fishhooks in your ear, we'll take them out for you," Colvert said.

He also noted that the clinic's proximity to the nursing home at St. James Bay will make it easier to transport patients to get X-rays.

Although there is no hard and fast construction schedule yet, Colvert guesstimated that the project would be complete no later than the Fourth of July.

From the Rev. John Sink's opening prayer, in which he urged God "to make this place a place of healing, love and mercy," the groundbreaking evidenced a tone of a faithful promise being kept.

"I think this is what the people asked for,"

said Commission Chairman Smokey Parrish. "We promised people we would do what we said we'd do. This is a win-win situation for everybody."

Parrish praised Weems' plans to rotate in specialists from Tallahassee Memorial Hospital to the new clinic and, like the other speakers, expressed gratitude to the many health care providers, such as Dr. Nancy Chorba and her staff and Dr. Stephen Miniati.

"If we didn't have dedicated nurses and doctors in the county, I don't know what we'd do," Sanders said.


Gayle Dodds, chair of the hospital board, was en-

thusiastic about the new clinic in her brief remarks. "This has been a great day and a great time for us," she said. "We're looking at great, great things."

Other county officials in attendance included Supervisor of Elections Ida Elliott, Rhonda Skipper, deputy property appraiser, Commissioner Bevin Putnal, Sheriff Skip Shiver and County Attorney Michael Shuler.

"This facility is made possible by you," stressed Colvert, pointing to the audience.

"Most of all, I want to thank you, who helped pay for this, most of all," said Messer.

will have signed off on a contract for them to start work. It looks like a summertime event to open the new bank."

Plans drawn up by Panama City architect Bozarth and Associates were approved by Apalachicola city officials earlier this summer. The project is expected to cost in the \$2 million range, funded from insurance money Coastal received to cover its total loss last November.

On Nov. 15, Joseph Mixon rammed a truck into the corner of the bank at Market Street and Avenue E, which set it ablaze and led to its having to be razed to the ground. Mixon is now serving

prison time for the incident.

DuBose said the current delay arose after general contractor, GAC, and engineer, Preble-Rish, had both completed drawing up building plans, addressing such cost factors as stormwater drainage for the bank, which sits only about two blocks from the river.

They solicited subcontracting bids and found they were higher than the projected budget amount, DuBose said.

"We added them all up for a total cost, and it came in a good bit higher than we expected it to," he said.

GAC and Bozarth then met with bank staffer Troy Campbell

to see what could be done to keep the project under budget.

"They sat down and went through the subcontractor bids that seemed to be the highest ones, that we had the best shot of getting cut down," DuBose said.

"We asked 'What can we do without hurting the looks or integrity of the building in getting the cost down?'" he said. "Some of that was simple stuff."

DuBose said two of the original-looking tall arched windows were moved, saving the project \$40,000, for example.

"The two stuck in on the corners were actually not windows, and were just for aesthetics," he

said. "They were fake windows on cement blocks and were just cosmetic."

DuBose said the company is trying to keep the construction costs in the \$1.5 million to \$1.6 million range, but there are fixed costs, like a baffled stormwater system, generators and hurricane-proof glass and shutters, that can not be altered.

"Now we're trying to get the price right so insurance does cover it all," he said.

DuBose said he doesn't expect there to be much, if any, reduction in size to the two-story, 6,400-square-foot structure.

"We could take the upstairs

portion and not finish out the upstairs, but we'd rather not do that," DuBose said. "It was built to have only the number of offices in it. It may be possible to cut a few feet, but probably not enough feet to matter."

The company still plans to use some of the bricks salvaged from the old building to enhance the courtyard and other areas. Also, the door of the old vault door will be used in the new building.

DuBose says GAC has assured him it will take them about six to seven months to complete the project once work begins.


"We mainly want to do it once and have it done right," he said.

## Poloronis awarded Lombardi contract

On Oct. 6, the county commission voted unanimously to award Poloronis Construction of Apalachicola the contract to build restrooms and a handicap access ramp at Seafood Worker's Park, site of the old Lombardi seafood processing plant on the west end of town.

The firm will also repair the roof on the old plant. Poloronis bid \$46,500 on the entire work, about \$1,500 lower than the next lowest bid.

Commissioners initially believed there was \$65,000 in Flor-

ida Recreation Development Assistance Program (FRDAP) grant money available to pay for the work, but County Planner Alan Pierce said the FRDAP money cannot be used to repair an existing structure.

Pierce said the restrooms must now be constructed as a freestanding building. He said he believed there was about \$15,000 remaining from a Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services grant. The lowest bid given to repair just the roof of the existing building was \$16,000, from Riverside Construction Inc. of Apalachicola.

## Commission orders streets cleared

On Oct. 6, the county commission ordered Miller and Enabob streets in Lanark Village to be cleared for through-traffic. The order came after the sheriff's office told County Planner Alan Pierce that they could not end an ongoing neighborhood dispute over the two streets. A load of dirt that currently blocks Miller Street will be removed, and a tree in the middle of Enabob is to be taken down.

The H1N1 vaccinations are free, to children as well as adults, and are administered within the health department either by a physician, such as Dr. Ivan Backerman in Carrabelle; a nurse practitioner, such as Dana Whaley, ARNP, also in Carrabelle, or an RN, a registered nurse, or LPN, a licensed practical nurse.

Health employees at the Franklin County School include three LPNs and Willis, who is an RN.

"Once we get the injections, we'll offer it to the children who are at high risk first," Willis said, noting that depending on how large the shipment is, the school may schedule a mass immunization clinic.

"Then as the vaccine becomes available, we're looking at adults over age 24 and up to age 64 with

chronic medical conditions," she said.

So far this year, the county has recorded only one lab-confirmed case of H1N1, and that was determined by a private lab and not through the state processes.

The incidence of the H1N1 flu, however, is likely more widespread. State health officials deem it too costly to test all suspected H1N1 cases, and instead are advising medical personnel to assume that all patients who test positive, by a swab, for influenza A have, in fact, the H1N1 flu virus.

"If we get three unrelated cases, we may send them out, but right now the assumption is H1N1," Willis said, noting that she estimates the county has had "10, maybe 15 cases" of H1N1.

"In school, there's more strep

throat, ear infections and intestinal bugs," she said. "Our activity on the flu level is pretty sporadic. It's just the time of year, and perhaps we're a little more attuned, and the kids are aware of it, that it's out in the communities."

Regardless of precise test results, health officials are sending home young people with a temperature of 100 or more, and recommending they go to their doctor.

"We're recommending siblings be kept home for five days and the kid kept at home until he or she is fever-free for 24 hours," Willis said. "It helps stop the spread, if people are adhering to the advice."

"Everyone's more aware of hand washing, and everything else, and they are more conscious of it and they're doing it,"

she added. "Hand sanitizer, in addition to normal hand washing, it's a good awareness to put out."

The health department has a limited shipment on hand of the regular seasonal flu shot, and several local providers, including pharmacies, have them available.

"Right now we've only received a limited shipment, and we have very few in stock," Willis said. "Normally we get all of it at the beginning of the season, but now it will be mid-November."

The health department charges adults for administering the seasonal flu vaccine, which also comes in a nasal spray, but it is free to children, Willis said.

Since the health department has had to shut its doors in Apalachicola because of air conditioning problems, services have had

to be moved to the former Chapman School, at the corner of 12th Street and U.S. Highway 98.

"Right now we're not seeing patients in Apalachicola," said Wesley Tice, administrator of the health department, adding that the new site should be up and running within the next two weeks.

Meanwhile, Whaley and Backerman are both seeing patients in Carrabelle, Tice said, and residents are urged to call the health department to schedule an appointment.

"Call the health department, and if you can't get to Carrabelle, we'll make some kind of arrangements," he said.

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
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

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

Senior defensive end A.J. Arnold had nine solo tackles and seven assists, plus one pass deflection, in the Seahawks' game Friday against Port St. Joe.



Pryor turned a physically entertaining tussle into a romp over the middle two quarters.

With a pair of perfectly executed gimmick plays, Franklin County kept the score close through most of the first 24 minutes, but Pryor and the Tiger Shark rushing attack, which rang up over 280 yards, were the difference from the 10:34 mark of the second quarter.

It was at that point that Pryor turned a dump pass in the left flat from Trubias Hill, who alternated with Pryor at quarterback, into a 41-yard touchdown pass, slipping from the grasp of three tacklers while sprinting down the left sideline.

Daniel May's extra point kick made it 21-7, though the Seahawks used a long kickoff return by sophomore Trakel Turrell to set up a four-play, 56-yard drive, with senior D.J. Lane busting over left guard wide open from the Port St. Joe 18 to score.

Freshman Elton Olvera's extra point kick made it 21-14, but Franklin County would get no closer.

The Tiger Sharks took the ensuing possession 57 yards in seven plays, Pryor hitting Hill from 29 yards for the touchdown and May making it 28-14.

After holding the Seahawks to three-and-out, Port St. Joe went 69 yards in six plays, the last play a 46-

yard scamper by Pryor, who appeared to be stopped on an option keeper to his right only to wriggle free from two tacklers, cut back against the grain and out-run everybody down the left sideline to the end zone.

The extra point was blocked but the Tiger Sharks went into the locker room with command of the lead, 34-14, and the total offensive statistics, 334-111.

Pryor, the game's leading rusher with 98 yards on 12 carries and 2 for 3 for 46 yards passing, owned the third period without touching the ball on offense.

On the opening drive of the second half, the Seahawks were three-and-out and Pryor handled the resulting punt at his 45, sprinted to his right to pick up a block on the outside seam and went untouched to the end zone, May's extra point making it 40-14.

Less than three minutes later after his punt return, Pryor intercepted a Dalin Modican pass in the middle of the field at the Tiger Shark 54 and ran right down the sideline, his speed aiding in avoiding any prospective tacklers. May's extra point made it 47-14.

Franklin County would not go quietly into the hot and muggy night. The Seahawks converted the first of two Port St. Joe second half fumbles — the only turnovers in the game for either team — into

a 61-yard drive capped by Turrell's 1-yard touchdown run.

The run failed on the extra point and the scoring was over, the Tiger Sharks liberally substituting at that point.

"We battled, the kids refused to give up," Franklin County first-year coach Josh Wright said. "We gave them a fight and we did it the right way, we acted right, we played the right way.

"We grew up tonight. We have a lot of young kids and they played hard tonight and played hard against a tough team," he said.

Modican led the Seahawks with seven carries for 108 yards and one touchdown. Lane ran for 35 yards on 10 carries, with one touchdown, and Turrell had nine carries for 28 yards and one touchdown. Senior Arron Prince added three rushes for 28 yards, junior Dale Butler one carry for 14 yards and junior C. J. Barnes one carry for nine yards.

In passing Modican was 1-for-5, for 16 yards and one interception, while Prince threw one 30-yard pass to junior Adam Joseph. Prince had one reception for 16 yards.

On the defensive side of the ball, senior AJ Arnold led with nine solo tackles and seven assists, with one pass deflection. Senior Chase Richards had nine solo tackles and three assists plus

one fumble recovery. Senior Garry Larsen had 10 solos and two assists, while sophomore Chris Granger had five solo tackles and four assists. Prince recovered a fumble, and freshman Cole Lee caused a fumble.

The Tiger Sharks dominated the opening period but one play kept Franklin County within 14-7.



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

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# Crooked River Lighthouse plans spooky Halloween

Carolyn Ilardi, dressed up in her role as docent at the Raney House, has authored a ghoulish play for performance at the Crooked River Lighthouse's Oct. 31 festivities.

Carrabelle Lighthouse Association hopes to bring a bit of enchantment to this year's All Hallow's Eve on Saturday, Oct. 31 from 6 to 10 p.m.

But it's not actually Halloween the association will be celebrating — it's the 114th birthday of the Crooked River Lighthouse. At precisely 5:12 p.m., according to watch book records, the lighthouse was first lit on Oct. 28, 1895.

Lanterns and jack-o-lanterns will be arranged around the lighthouse park grounds, at 1975 U.S. 98 West, to create a magical atmosphere in which to tell tales of ancient shipwrecks.

"We are very excited to have our area's talented Panhandle Players presenting a true and tragic tale," said Joan Matey, curator of the lighthouse museum.

In 1767 a ship headed to New Orleans was wrecked off Dog Island. A French man who survived 81 days of being stranded described his ordeal in a manuscript two years after.

Caroline Ilardi has adapted this historic event into a short play.

"Our stage will be our 70-foot wooden pirate's ship, a popular play area in

our picnic area," said Matey. "Sorry kids, you won't be able to take over the ship that night, but there are plenty of other fun things to see and do!"

This will be the one special night each year that we will have night time climbing of the lighthouse. The lighthouse stairs are well-lit, but for your safety please wear supportive shoes. The moon will be nearly full. This evening is a fundraiser for the lighthouse, and the usual fee of \$5 is required to climb. The association is also asking for a contribution of \$1 per person for admission to the event.

The association invites everyone to bring a lantern (there will be places to hang them or place them) just for the evening, to see what a beautiful glow we can create. Folks will be carving pumpkins on the Keeper's house porch and kids can make their own paper lanterns. The Keeper's House Museum will be open, with exhibits on the history and science of the lighthouse.

A state archaeologist, Franklin H. Price, will share his knowledge of shipwrecks from the past. Other special guests will include historian Andy Edell who will tell us about historic

hurricanes from a lighthouse keeper's point of view.

The gift shop is full of souvenirs, nautical jewelry, lighthouse T-shirts and caps, fascinating books and great gift items.

Enjoy something different for Halloween at the Crooked River Lighthouse. There will be food available from Hog Wild Barbecue and old maritime music, too, from banjo player Howard Pardue, and a scrimshaw demonstration. (Participants might want to bring a chair. This is the association's first event and members are not sure how many visitors to expect.)

During the day, conditions permitting, chartered boat cruises with Natural World Charters will explore the actual locations of these shipwrecks and the Dog Island Lighthouses, destroyed by hurricanes in the mid-1800s.
