Sunday hailstorm smashes Eastpoint

Island View Seafood was badly damaged Sunday during a severe thunderstorm that generated several waterspouts or tornadoes.

Although no tornado warning was issued, National Weather Service Forecaster Ron Block said that signatures for cyclonic winds were seen on radar, and special marine warnings were issued for Franklin County at 3:31 p.m., 3:43 p.m. and 3:51 p.m.

The storms moved east at 30 miles per hour and battered both St. George Island and Eastpoint where witnesses reported quarter-sized hail. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) recorded winds in excess of 60 mph.


Emergency Management Director Pam Brownell said three older mobile homes were damaged and had to be covered with

Steam tug Lottie typifies working vessels

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Lottie is the poster girl for the 15th annual Apalachicola Antique and Classic Boat Show to be held this Saturday, April 20.

She was a working girl, a steam tug built by Master Carpenter Charles Hobart in 1882 for the Cypress Lumber Company which was owned by the Ruge brothers, Herman and George, two of Apalachicola's wealthiest residents around the turn of the 20th century.

The Lottie was 67 feet long, and 10 feet wide with a draft of just under six feet. She had a gross tonnage of 65 tons and net of 47.

Two known pictures exist of the boat, the one shown here and a privately owned print from around 1903 of her pushing a coal barge in Columbus, Ga. Although she was constructed in Apalachicola, the Lottie certainly traveled and, in the first decade of the century, her comings and goings were sometimes chronicled in the Times.

On August 11, 1900, she transported a group of partiers to West Pass for an evening picnic and a swim. The guests included children of many prominent families, the Patton sisters, Mattie, Fannie and Ella; Winifred Kimball who later achieved fame as an author; May and Irene Marks; Fannie Porter and Mssrs. Stratton, Moore,

Owen, Graves, Kimball, Cook, Floyd; John Daly and C.N. Clark.

Later that year, her crew reportedly caught a mysterious, unknown fish with sharp teeth and a tail like a rat in West Pass, possibly a deep water species.

Local waterman Joe Barber recalls hearing her name. He said, when he was a boy, around 1925, the Lottie spent most of her time in Carrabelle. In addition to pushing barges, she was used to tow deep-drafted lumber ships into and out of Carrabelle harbor for loading.

The Lottie carried a crew of eight. Her first captain was Charles Marks, who was followed by John Fisher, who

Ice machine prompts special P and Z meeting

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Tempers flared on Tuesday morning during the discussion of a possible new ice machine in Eastpoint.

During the regular discussion of Planning and Zoning (P and Z) recommendations, Bob Allen, owner of property located at the northwest corner of Highway 98 and North Bayshore Drive, demanded to know why P and Z recommended denial of his request to install an ice machine there.

Allen said his project was not

given a fair review. "People were telling us two weeks in advance P and Z was opposed to this business," he said.

He said his lot was zoned commercial and large enough to accommodate the machine and traffic.

County Planner Alan Pierce said the issue was traffic flow. "It's a very busy intersection," he said.

Pierce said the plans presented to the commission on Tuesday had been modified to address the issue of traffic since the P and Z met earlier this month.

Commissioner Pinki Jackel, whose district includes the East-

point site, said that since the plans contained new information, they should be sent back to P and Z for review.

But Allen protested. "The issue is time," he said. "This is the beginning of our season and my ice machine is sitting under a tree."

Commission Chair Cheryl Sanders asked if P and Z board members had said they were opposed to Allen's project in advance of the formal discussion. He was adamant that they had.

Pierce said P and Z should have tabled the request, and given Al-

PSC set to consider WMSI water rates

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The state's Public Service Commission is expected to consider next week in Tallahassee a series of recently-issued recommendations from PSC staff regarding increases in rates for St. George island customers of Water Management Services Inc.

The April 12 PSC staff recommendations come after their several months of review following a protest lodged by the PSC Office of Public Counsel following the PSC's initial Aug. 2012 rate decisions.

Residents of St. George Island were vocal at a Jan. 2013 hearing on the island where they confronted WMSI owner Gene Brown. The hearing was necessary because the Office of Public Counsel had protested four issues, and WMSI eight issues, arising out of last year's granting of a rate hike to WMS.

As it stands now, the PSC staff is set to recommend that WMSI receive a 45.8 percent increase in revenue, to that test year revenue of \$1.3 million be granted a nearly \$600,000 increase, to \$1.9 million.

In its filing, WMSI requested a revenue requirement to generate annual revenue of \$2.02 million, which was based on a revenue increase of \$714,035, or approximately 54.69 percent. The PSC staffers wrote that their recommendation will allow WMSI the opportunity to recover its expenses and earn a 5.61 percent return on its investment in rate base.

If adopted this will mean based facility charges will rise for 5/8" X 3/4" meters to \$36.60, less than WMSI's recommendation of \$43.06 but slightly more than the rate adopted on a temporary basis in January. For 3/4" meters, the rate would get to \$54.90, also slightly

Workshops offer disaster preparation

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On Friday, April 5, about 40 volunteers gathered at the Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve headquarters to experience a mock disaster.

Trainer Adriane Kreglo, a consultant provided through the Volunteer Florida's Best Neighborhoods grant awarded to Franklin's Promise Coalition, led the exercise.

Kreglo has run a volunteer center in Manatee County for more than 30 years.

Participants were introduced to "Stormsmart Coast" internet resource and briefed on techniques for dealing with spontaneous volunteers.

Kreglo explained that in some situations, volunteers can become a liability rather than an asset. Often, limiting access to chaotic post-disaster areas is more important and difficult than

finding willing workers. She said that even if asked to stay away, people with affection for the area may arrive on scene wanting to help.

An overabundance of some supplies, looters and people who are confused or distraught also present

challenges in the aftermath of a storm or other disaster.

Kreglo said she prefers open and paper communication during training sessions to high-tech tools because electricity is so frequently lost during disasters. "In some cases I

have literally had to use runners for communication," she said.

The importance of safety briefing and proper clothing and equipment was also emphasized.

Volunteers played the rolls of dispatchers and "problem volunteers" as the community prepared to deal with the aftermath of Hurricane Zeke.

"Our goal is to bring together a network of volunteers from across the county to assist in planning for, responding to and recovering from disasters," said Franklin's Promise Executive Director Joe Taylor

The next training opportunity will be at 9 a.m. April 30 at Carrabelle City Hall, where points of emergency food and material distribution will be designated in Lanark, Carrabelle, Eastpoint and Apalachicola.

piloted her for 15 years, and Dan Gillis.

The Lottie was hard at work for at least 40 years around this area and if that seems like a long time, think again. Barber said there were a number of operating wooden vessels harbored here that were more than 100 years old when he was a child.

more than the temporary rates now in effect, but less than the \$64.59 WMSI sought. For 1" meters, the rates would go to \$91.50, and for larger meters they would go to \$183, each less than what WMSI sought, but more than the temporary rates now in effect.

PSC staff also plans to recommend a hike in the plant capacity charges, for residential customers to \$3,387 and for all others to \$9.68 per gallon per day. The main extension charge for residential customers would be \$1,523, and for other \$4.35 per gallon per day. The cost of residential meter installation would rise to \$400.

In the highly controversial issue of advances made by WMSI to other of Brown's companies, which he argued were necessary to maintain sound fiscal management, the PSC staff wrote that "By advancing funds to the utility's president and associated companies while it already was in a financially precarious situation, WMSI exacerbated its financial distress and delayed necessary infrastructure improvements. Advancing cash to the president and associated companies in lieu of making required debt service payments and needed capital improvements has degraded the credit profile of the utility and adversely affected the utility and is contrary to operating in the public interest.

"WMSI's failure to replace the water storage tank has threatened utility operations as well as the safety of the ratepayers. Based on the foregoing, staff recommends the president's salary be reduced by 15 percent. Furthermore, absent (PSC) authority to prohibit advances to the president and associated companies for non-utility purposes, the PSC should require WMSI to file quarterly reports delineating all advances, loans, investments, notes receivable and accounts receivable between WMSI and the president and associated companies including the date, amount, and reason for the transaction(s)."

len an opportunity to make changes to his plan rather than deny it.

Pierce said the plans presented may have been vague and confusing to P and Z board members.

"We showed them the site plan and were told it was appropriate before the meeting," said Mike Hobson of Port St. Joe, whose company builds the ice machines.

"I think it needs to go back (to P & Z) with the new information," said Commissioner Smokey Parrish.

Sanders told Pierce to arrange an emergency meeting of P and Z to ad-

dress Allen's request.

"P and Z members should be told to refrain from public comment," she said. "If they can't do that, we need to find new board members."

Pierce said because P and Z is a volunteer board, he couldn't say exactly when it would be possible to obtain a quorum. He said he would have to call individual members.

Parrish asked that Pierce attend the emergency P and Z meeting. Jackel said Preble Rish; the county's engineering consultant, should send a representative as well.

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


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Please remember, springtime is for the birds

It's spring in the Florida Panhandle, and that means it's nesting season for many species of shorebirds and seabirds.

Franklin County contains some of the most significant nesting areas in the Panhandle, including the old St. George Island

bridge causeway and "Bird Island" dredge spoil island, both managed by the Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve. From April 1-August 31, both areas are closed to all human and animal traffic.

The old causeway is conferred the special designation of being a "Critical Wildlife Area" due to the high number of threatened and endangered birds that nest here and marine patrol will enforce this designation. Least terns, gull-billed terns, sandwich terns, Caspian terns, royal terns, black skimmers, American oystercatchers, and laughing gulls nest on the causeway and all species but the laughing gull are protected by state or federal law.

In the past decade these birds have laid more than 3000 nests per year in this area. Brown pelicans and American oystercatchers nest on Bird Island and are also both protected species. The brown pelican colony on Bird Island has grown in size in recent years and last

year 700 nests were laid by the birds.

Bird nests and colonies are very susceptible to human disturbance. Even if you aren't physically harming a nest, a nearby presence can cause damage. If parents are scared and fly off of their

nests, eggs and chicks are vulnerable to harm from species such as laughing gulls and ants. At their young age, eggs and chicks can also be overexposed to the hot summer sun and suffer from dehydration and death.

This is why areas that

are posted with bird signs leave a wide buffer around nesting areas. If solitary nesters are disturbed repeatedly, in addition to predation and exposure threats, the adults may abandon a nest and any eggs in it. These eggs will not hatch without

the parents' help. If you are near a bird nesting area and observe parents flushing off the nest, please back off until you are far enough away that the parents settle back down on their nests, and respect bird signs in posted areas.

Many bird species have lost nesting habitat due to human development on our beaches. For this reason it is very important that we give these birds a chance to nest undisturbed in their remaining nesting areas. In addition to these areas managed by ANERR, Franklin County contains many additional important nesting areas including Flagg Island, Lanark Reef, parts of Dog Island and the St. George State Park, and more. Please respect all areas posted with bird signs and areas where birds are nesting.

Electronic filing switch successful

Marcia Johnson, Clerk of the Circuit Court, announced the April 1 mandatory date for electronic filing of court documents in civil, family law, dependency, and probate cases, was very successful. More than 27 filings totaling 31 documents were electronically filed on

the first day, Monday, April 1, and the documents continue to come in.

Supreme Court Rules Opinion No. SC11-399 implemented mandatory electronic filing procedures for all documents filed in Florida's courts. While attorneys are required to electronically file case documents in any civil, family

law, or probate case with the Clerk of Court, those parties who represent themselves will still file paper documents. Electronic filing will become mandatory in criminal cases starting October 2013.

Johnson reported her office staff has been busy adapting to the new electronic filing (E-Filing) process and working

diligently to ensure lawyers have an easy transition as well. She has updated her website to provide a link to E-Filing information. Electronic filing will hopefully enable clerks throughout the state to increase timeliness in the processing of cases, and provide improved service to the public and the judiciary, as the courts move toward

a paperless system in the future.

Lighthouse association annual meeting

Jonathan Kelley named acting mechanic

At Tuesday's meeting, at the request of Solid Waste Director Fonda Davis, county commissioners voted unanimously to appoint Jonathan Kelley to the position of mechanic for solid waste until regular

mechanic Leonard Brannan recovers from a work-related injury. Davis said Brannan has been on leave since March 21 and it is unknown when he will return to work. Kelley will receive an additional \$2/hour while working as mechanic.

Emergency management contracts approved

At their Tuesday meeting, county commissioners approved contracts with The Management Experts (TME) and Emergency Disaster Strategies LLC for services related to emergency management.

Director Pam Brownell said TME has been the training and exercise coordinator for the county for three years and is paid out of the Homeland Security Grant.

Emergency Disaster Strategies, LLC (EDS) will act as the debris project manager for the county during a declared disaster, which is FEMA reimbursable. Phil Worley, owner of EDS, is an Alligator Point resident, and was the debris specialist for the State of Florida before retiring.

Commissioners also tapped EDS to develop an approved FEMA Debris Plan for the county. The firm will be paid \$5,000 to be paid out of FEMA funds received for last year's storm damage. Brownell said since Hurricane Sandy, a county debris plan is required by FEMA.

Two emergency workshops planned

A workshop for the providers serving our special needs population is scheduled for April 24 at 10 a.m. at the Emergency

Management office.

Emergency Management office will conduct a "Points of Distribution" training at the Carrabelle City Complex 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on April 30 for the two municipalities and the local food pantries and other volunteers.

Observation pier approved

Following the P and Z recommendation, the county commission Tuesday unanimously approved the construction of an observation pier submitted by Chester Creamer of Coastline Rentals, LLC. The pier will be 80' x 5' with a 10' x 10' terminal platform and will be located on the south side of 957 US 98 in Eastpoint. County Planner Alan Pierce said no boats will be moored to the pier.



MBARA deploys artificial reefs

Anglers and divers have 19 new reefs to visit thanks to the efforts of the Mexico Beach Artificial Reef Association (MBARA), Mexico Beach, and support from numerous organizations and members.

On Saturday, 62 reef modules worth more than \$91,000, found new resting places off the shores of Mexico Beach. Mexico Beach received a \$60,000 grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration Fund and

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. The rest came from donations, membership, fund raising and three fishing tournaments — the annual MBARA Kingfish Tournament, the Mexico Beach Marina Offshore Classic and the 98 Real Estate Group Ling Ding.

Reef modules of varying design, each weighing more than 5,000 pounds, were placed in 19 locations, with one to eight structures submerged at each site. The reef modules, all made with steel reinforced concrete and limestone

rock, include pyramids, rectangular grouper modules, layer-cake shaped ecosystems and a new hybrid reef that consists of a grouper module topped by a small ecosystem.

This is the first time the hybrid reefs have been deployed in Florida, and MBARA research divers are anxious to find out what type of marine life will be attracted to them.

According to MBARA research diver Carol Cox, “Different structures attract different fish. Amberjack and red snappers are attracted to taller structures such as the pyramids, the grouper units act as low limestone ledges that are preferred by groupers, and ecosystems are a magnet for black sea bass. We find that placing different types of structures together has a dynamic effect, greatly increasing diversity on the reef. We hope the hybrid reef with its height, ledge and crevices will attract the greatest diversity we have seen on any single artificial reef.”

During this deployment, MBARA

added reefs to six existing sites that have become difficult to find over the years. MBARA president, Bob Cox, said, “It is important to maintain these reefs in honor of the people they were named after.”

Older reefs often were made with lighter or smaller materials that could be moved by powerful storms or covered by sand.

The deployment was overseen by Bill Horn of the FWC along with MBARA volunteers Bob and Carol Cox, Ron Childs, Jimmy Nicholson, and Captain Charlene Burke. MBARA volunteers were involved in every step of the artificial reef deployment—applying for permits, writing grants, and raising matching funds to earn points when competing for grants.

According to Horn, “Excellent planning by MBARA and excellent execution by Walter Marine” made the project a great success.

Migration for buntings

Beautiful indigo buntings have been spotted across the county this month during their spring migration. I am hardly an expert on birds to learn more, I thought I’d share my research with the readers of this column.

The indigo bunting (*Passerina cyanea*), is a four to five-inch long, seed-eating bird in the same family as cardinals. Carrabelle’s Rod Gasche sent the newspaper photographs he captured of a male indigo bunting and they are lovely.

complex songs, especially during the early morning hours when, according to Cornell University’s Allaboutbirds.com website, they may produce up to 200 songs per hour. By the way, you can hear some of those songs at both Allaboutbirds and Whatbird.

Indigo buntings migrate to South Florida and South America during the winter; but can be found almost anywhere in North America east of the Rocky Mountains during the warm months.

Earlier this month, a large group reportedly passed through the Sugar Hill Campground in Dr. Julian Bruce St. George Island State Park.

By the way, according to Whatbird.com, a flock of buntings is called a “decoration,” “mural” or “sacrifice” of buntings. I can certainly understand the first two names. Female indigo buntings are a mousy brown color, but the males are real show-offs.

During spring and summer, when they are trying to attract a mate, the males sport iridescent black plumage. Depending on the angle of the light, they may appear turquoise, black or any shade in between. This is an optical illusion caused by light diffraction.

The males are also very vocal and sing long,

These birds often migrate at night, navigating by the stars, and can become confused under overcast conditions.

Preferred habitats include brushy slopes, old pastures and fields grown to scrub, woodland clearings, and forest edges adjacent to fields. During migration large flocks may feed in agricultural fields or on lawns.

The diet of the indigo bunting consists primarily of insects during the summer and seeds during the winter. They forage in trees, shrubs and on the ground. Researchers at Cornell tell us that you can attract indigo buntings to your yard with feeders containing small seeds such as thistle or live mealworms. They will also readily feed on safflower, apple, suet, millet and peanuts.

Hog hunting

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission has several upcoming opportunities to hunt wild hog on public lands that you won’t find in printed brochures for wildlife management areas.

On the Joe Budd Small Game Area, still hunters can hunt hogs May 3-5 without a quota permit. Additionally, the hunter quota for hog hunts using dogs has been increased to 10. Wild hog-dog hunts on Budd are set for May 16-19, June 20-23, July 18-21, Aug. 15-18 and Sept. 19-22.

On the nearby

Ochlockonee River SGA, the still hunter quota has been increased to 50 hunters per hunt, and the hunt area now includes the area south of Interstate 10. This year’s open hunt dates are May 10-12, June 14-16, July 12-14, Aug. 9-11 and Sept. 13-15.

Hog hunts also are set for the Aucilla SGA in Jefferson County and Blackwater SGA in Okaloosa and Santa Rosa counties.


