Man charged in carjacking

The Holmes County Sheriff's Office received a call Oct. 11 that a male subject had taken a vehicle from a female Holmes County resident by threatening her with a hammer and a box-cutter, accord-

ing to the HCSO's report.

Investigators made contact with the victim, who provided investigators with a detailed description of the suspect and details from the carjacking.

The victim told investigators she had picked up Edgar Edward Heath in Ponce de Leon after he asked her for a ride home.

Once inside the vehicle, Heath, from Lyons, Ga., continued to tell the victim that he lived just down the road and eventually took her car and money, leaving her stranded.

While in search of the vehicle and suspect, the Sheriff's Office received a phone call from a concerned citizen about a suspicious vehicle traveling

in the northern area of Holmes County that matched the description of the stolen vehicle.

Deputies then located Heath, who had ran the vehicle into a ditch and was attempting to drive away when he was taken into custody and transported to the Holmes County Jail.

Heath, 24, is charged with carjacking and armed robbery.



Phillips began her stint with Washington-Holmes Area Vocational Technical Center, when the doors first opened in 1967, as a high school senior dually enrolled in Ralph Ray's Key Punch program. After completing that program, Wayne Saunders, WHTC's first director, hired Phillips as his secretary. She remained his secretary until he retired. Phillips continued as the director's secretary during the tenure of Dr. Gene Prough and Raymond Norris.

Carol transferred to the WHTC business office in February 1999 as the bookkeeper and stayed there until her final Friday. She was joined at her retirement celebration by her husband, Bill, son Brice, daughter Leann and her three grandchildren. A gathering of her WHTC family and friends enjoyed finger foods prepared by WHTC Culinary Arts Program, and a creatively decorated cake displayed the many duties of her job.

Dr. Sandra Cook, Superintendent of the Washington County School District, presented Phillips with a clock award as a remembrance for her 43 years of time and effort. Wayne Saunders reminisced about Phillips dedication as his secretary, stating, "She kept me line, covered my back and saved my neck on many occasions. That's one reason I'm still standing here today." He then awarded Phillips with the legendary "WHTC Desk Weight." Finally, Martha Compton, WHTC interim director, gave Phillips a foundation bottle consisting of the dirt, concrete, blocks and bricks making up the foundation and structure of WHTC. Compton added, "We have none left on staff that can say they were a part of the foundation of WHTC. Carol has given many years to make WHTC the success that it is today. She truly deserves some rest and relaxation."

Bonifay woman a bluegrass celebrity

Miss Lizzie, like 'Old Slew Foot,' has done been there and gone

Miss Lizzie Lewis stopped by the other day to give me a report on her recent trip to Rosine, Ky., where she always attends the Music Festival at Jerusalem Ridge. This festival, in its 10th year, commemorates the style of music known as bluegrass, which was popularized by the late Bill Monroe. The three-day festival is held on the grounds of the Monroe home place. The restored home sits among pine and maple trees.

A main stage showcasing some of the best known talent in the nation is located just far enough from the front porch that the sounds emanating from the jam session on the porch of the old home with 10 or 12 pickers and their 40 or so listeners don't interfere with those on stage. Down the hill from the house is a smaller stage where a well-known band or a pick-up band might be performing at the same time.

This year, music fans from 44 states and several foreign countries attended the event. What is the attraction for a festival such as this?

"It's the spirit of the hill," said one attendee. Another said it's the atmosphere. Another said it's the lineup of talent. Fifty-five bands take the stage during the event with programming beginning at 8:30 a.m. and continuing throughout the afternoon and evening hours. Phillip Steinmetz exhibits the clawhammer style of banjo picking made popular by his late grandfather, Grandpa Jones. Ralph Stanley and the Clinch Mountain Boys, whose names became well known in the movie "O Brother, Where Art Thou?," add their mountain style talent to the lineup.

The six-day festival from Sept 27 through Oct 2 celebrated what would have been the 100th birthday of Bill Monroe so this year's festival was extra special. How did a little lady from Holmes County become a celebrity at such an event? Since 1981, she has been the honorary chairman

of the Bill Monroe Fan Club and hasn't missed many of his appearances or the Rosine festival since. She appeared on the Grand Ole Opry with him. She sits on the stage with the performers. She is treated royally at the festival. The motel where she and her family stay when they go to Kentucky has a room designated "Miss Lizzie's Room." The Owensboro, Ky., newspaper, The Messenger-Inquirer, carried a picture last week of 90-something-year-old Lizzie dancing to the music of Darrell Winkelman and the Mountain Echoes, along with daughter Mattie Scarvey and a lady from New York, Mary Yates, who has become a close friend of the Lewis family.

Probably the biggest attraction for this type festival is the relaxed atmosphere where everybody knows, or gets to know, everybody.

"You get to enjoy the beauties of nature, soak up your fill of the toe-

tapping, fast-driving tunes of the fiddle, banjo, mandolin and guitar. You get to meet people from all walks of life living in their campers," said one couple. And they enjoy the clean family environment where no alcoholic beverages are allowed.

Barry and Helen Daughdrill of Atwater, Calif., summed it up, "I just love this atmosphere. It's very picturesque. We've met nothing but sincere folks here." Barry Daughdrill said the quality of the music is high. "It exceeded my expectations. We haven't heard a bad band yet."

The festival is produced by Dr. Campbell Mercer, a local veterinarian whose mandolin picking might be heard with the Cumberland Highlanders show on Saturday nights on RFD-TV.

On most of the shows, you will see Miss Lizzie Lewis sitting on a bench at the back of the stage surrounded by musicians and music lovers. Look for her in the red dress.

Red Ribbon Week offers new contest

Students can win \$1,000 for their K-12 schools and an iPad 2 for themselves.

The 26th annual Red Ribbon Week features a new national contest this year: "It's Up to Me to Be Drug Free." Winners from ten regions across the U.S. will receive \$1,000 for their K-12 schools and an iPad 2 for themselves from the National Family Partnership (NFP).

"As schools across America celebrate Red Ribbon Week this year, with this new contest, students will take the message home," said Peggy Sapp, NFP's volunteer president and CEO of Informed Families. "By decorating their homes together, families carry the message to their communities." Recognized as the nation's oldest and largest drug prevention campaign, Red Ribbon Week reaches more than 80 million people nationwide every year from Oct. 23-31.

How the contest works: Students (K-12) can enter from now through Oct. 31 by decorating their homes together with their parents — mailboxes, front doors or fences. Parents (18 or older) can upload photos to www.redribbon.org/enter or www.facebook.com/RedRibbonWeek. Then, friends and family can vote for their entry from Nov. 1-15. The entries in each region with most votes will win.

Two new online resources from NFP debuting this year are www.redribbon.org and www.facebook.com/redribbonweek, which provide valuable tools for families, and showcase schools, organizations and individuals supporting Red Ribbon Week.

The U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is co-sponsoring this year's national contest.

"SAMHSA is honored to have been part of this effort for many years, and we hope together we will continue to help prevent substance abuse within our families, schools and communities," said Frances Harding, SAMHSA's director of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention.

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency has also supported the campaign since its very beginnings: "Wear the Red Ribbon to show you care about having a healthy body and a clear mind free of drugs," said Michele M. Leonhart, DEA administrator. "Take the pledge, because it's up to you and me to be drug free!"

Here's some more about Red Ribbon Week and NFP.

Red Ribbon Week is the nation's largest and oldest drug prevention campaign, reaching 80 million people every year from Oct. 23-31. NFP created the national campaign in response to the 1985 death of DEA agent Kiki Camarena, who was abducted and murdered by drug traffickers in Mexico. The NFP was established in 1980 and is a national leader in drug prevention, education and advocacy. Its mission is to lead and support our nation's families and communities in nurturing the full potential of healthy, drug-free youth.

Here's some more about Informed Families and the Florida Family Partnership.

Informed Families and the Florida Family Partnership is a broad-based, grass roots volunteer/parent organization that is affiliated with the National Family Partnership. Informed Families is an education, training and support

center for Florida parents, schools and communities to help raise safe, healthy and drug-free children. The organization educates thousands of families annually about how to stay drug and alcohol free through networking and a variety of programs and services.

Some information about the history of Red Ribbon Week:

The National Family Partnership (NFP) organized the first nationwide Red Ribbon Campaign in 1988, and since that time has reached millions of U.S. children and families.


NFP and its network of individuals, schools, law enforcement agencies and organizations continue to deliver this message of hope to more than 80 million people every year,

through Red Ribbon Week (Oct. 23-31), the nation's oldest and largest drug prevention campaign.

In 1985, Enrique (Kiki) Camarena was a Drug Enforcement Administration Agent who was tortured and killed in Mexico.

In honor of Camarena's memory and his battle against illegal drugs, friends and neighbors began to wear red badges of satin.

Parents — sick of the destruction of alcohol and other drugs — began forming coalitions. Some of these new coalitions took Camarena as their model and embraced his belief that one person can make a difference. These coalitions also adopted the symbol of Camarena's memory, the red ribbon.

Hooked on Outdoors

You're walking down the beach and you see what looks like shells in the surf. As you approach, hundreds of tiny white objects that resemble small crabs take off with the retreating wave. You have just walked up on feeding sand fleas.

This isn't a flea you might find on a dog. It is a crab, and one out of every thousand you pick up will bite. Those we call rooster fleas, indicating they are the male of the species.

If you discover a male sand flea, be sure to throw it back because it is very busy

trying to fertilize all the females so there will be a good crop next year.

Sand fleas are the No. 1 bait for pompano fishermen simply because they are the food pompano survive on. Sand fleas are not only found in the surf and beach areas, but no one knows just how far out a sand flea will travel away from shore.

I caught one while fishing in Louisiana in 240 feet of water. The flea was in a red snapper's belly when I cleaned it, so we do know they will travel that far from shore. Louisiana is not famous for its beaches, so that flea could have come from anywhere.

Where these mature females winter is a mystery. They seem to leave the shore, probably heading for deep water. It is possible they go into a form of hibernation until the water warms.

In the spring, mature females are hard to find, but we know they are here because of all the juveniles we start seeing in March when the pompano show up. Although pompano eat thousands of sand fleas, they are not the main detriment to their survival — man is.

If you would like to see millions of sand fleas being destroyed go down to Laguna Beach and watch them pump sand on the beach. Beach renourishment has wiped out the last several generations of sand fleas there.

Pompano depend on the sand fleas to survive. Motels depend on the fishermen to come to the beach to catch the pompano. I'm not sure who the big loser is in that equation, but I'm putting my money on the pompano and sand flea.

Early season best time for bow hunting

In Northwest Florida, the third week of October marks the opening of archery season for deer — antlered or antlerless — offering what is widely regarded as the most fertile hunting period of the season.

With most deer still in their summer patterns, the early archery season allows hunters to pattern deer more easily than during the latter stages of the hunting season, when deer have had far more encounters with humans. For a bow hunter, there is nothing like the early archery season, which this year opens Saturday, Oct. 22, and runs through Nov. 23.

"There's not a lot of human confrontation during the off-season, so your chances of getting closer (to the animal) is at the

first of the season," said Craig Wittmeire, president of the Choctaw Bowmen Archery Club.

But to increase your chances for a successful hunt, there are a few things to consider — namely, ensuring that you are properly outfitted with a bow that fits you and selecting the correct draw weight and length. One way to measure your draw length is by standing with your arms spread out, palms facing forward. After measuring from the tip of one hand to the other, divide that number by 2.5.

Generally speaking, a man weighing between 150 and 180 pounds can use a draw weight of 55 to 65 pounds. Most important, however, is ensuring that it is a proper fit.

"You can kill anything with a 40-pound bow that somebody can with a 70-pound bow," Wittmeire

said. "The idea is to shoot accurately and hit what you're shooting at."

That's where practice — and lots of it — comes in.

"To be a successful bow hunter, you have to put in the work," said Nick Whitney, a local bow hunter. "It's the long shooting practices during the summer when you would rather be at the beach. It's getting into the woods and scouting the area for signs of deer and making sure you have all the proper equipment to be safe in the stand so you can enjoy future hunts."

Whitney was first introduced to the sport five years ago while stationed at Keesler Air Force Base in Mississippi. Despite a rather uneventful first hunt — "I sat for five hours ... the most boring thing I have ever done" — Whitney became hooked one year later when he

saw his first deer. His shot missed its intended mark, but a bow hunter was born.

"I went from staring at an ant crawling across my hand, bored out of my

mind, to extreme adrenaline overload in a matter of seconds," Whitney said.

"Everything I felt in that short six seconds is why I am so passionate about bow hunting."

BOW HUNTING FACTS

- The bow and arrow pre-date recorded history. A shaft with fletching, or feathers, bound to it was dated to 16,000 B.C.
- An arrow fired from a compound bow — favored by today's hunters — can travel up to 300 feet per second, or 200 mph.
- **Pros of bow hunting:** Fewer hunters in the woods; deer are not yet "spooked" because bow season comes before gun season; better chance of seeing a buck; more skill is required; you are much closer to the deer than when you are hunting by rifle.
- **Cons of bow hunting:** Much shorter shooting range, meaning a nice buck at 200, 150, 100 or 75 yards is going to be out of range; the equipment is bulkier and more movement is required to use it; you need more hunting "area" to draw back a bow; there isn't much room for error whether it be nervousness or aim; tracking is often more difficult as the deer tend to run further.
- **Why hunt by bow?** It's a challenge. Because you have to wait for the deer to get very close, you are more likely to be detected either by scent or movement, evening the odds compared to hunting by gun.
- **The cost?** You can expect to spend from \$300 to \$700 for a decent compound bow, though there is a corresponding rise in price as the quality rises.
- **Where to get advice?** C&G Sporting Goods in downtown Panama City carries regular, compound and crossbows in stock, repairs bows and custom-makes arrows, and has staff on hand to answer bow hunting questions. You can also find equipment and advice at Kings Discount Drugs in Chipley, which as its name implies is not only an outdoors store, but can also provide you with some BC Powder after you shoot an arrow four feet over the back of a monster buck.

Russ leads Holmes to Homecoming victory

BONIFAY — An opponent can benefit only so much by watching game tape of Holmes County running back Kodi Russ.

Russ again showcased his uncanny ability to make players miss Friday night, juking and weaving his way through Vernon's defense for 175 rushing yards in a 21-6 Homecoming victory Friday night at Memorial Field.

Ranked second statewide in Class 1A, Holmes County improved to 6-0 overall with the non-district win. Vernon fell to 2-4 overall, 0-4 outside of District 2-1A.

The Yellow Jacket defense often had players in position to tackle Russ, but his ability to change directions, reverse field and outrun defenders foiled Vernon's best efforts to slow him down. Russ, a 5-foot-7, 170-pound junior, finished the night with 23 carries. He ran for 142 yards and two touchdowns in the first half to give the Blue Devils a 13-0 lead at halftime.

"He's unreal," Holmes County coach Brad Johnson said. "I remember against Bozeman and they were ready for the toss and the power. He has such great vision and makes such great cuts that he makes something when there's nothing there. It forces us to block everywhere. Even if (the play) is called to the right, it could come back left."

Russ also made a huge interception on the goal line for Holmes County, turning back a Vernon drive early in the fourth quarter as the Yellow Jackets were trying to carve into Holmes County's 13-point lead. Vernon quarterback Dylan Kirk tried throwing back across the field on fourth-and-goal, but Russ stepped in front of the throw for the interception.

That play, which Russ made with just over 10 minutes left in the game, all but sealed the outcome and marked the third time Vernon had the ball inside the Blue Devil 10 and failed to score. Holmes County scored on the ensuing drive on a 4-yard touchdown run by Russ with 7 minutes left in the contest for a three-touchdown lead.

Russ capped Holmes County's first possession of the game with a 4-yard touchdown run for a 6-0 lead. He carried the ball four times in a five-play drive that covered 62 yards in 1 minute, 47 seconds.

The Blue Devils struck quickly midway through the second quarter to extend their lead to 13-0. Jacky

Holmes County's Kodi Russ ran for 142 yards and two touchdowns in the first half to give the Blue Devils a 13-0 lead.

Miles Jr., who complemented Russ with 95 yards on only seven carries, broke off a 22-yard run to move the ball into Vernon territory. Russ streaked 32 yards two plays later for a touchdown with 6:23 remaining in the half.

"It's tough to get them both the ball enough," Johnson said of Russ and Miles Jr. "We want to throw the ball some, but they're such great runners."

Vernon's offense had possession in Holmes County territory three times in the first half and came away empty. The Yellow Jackets twice had the ball inside HC's 10 before halftime but turned the ball over both times.

"I don't know if they self-destructed or if we were whoopin' blocks when we needed to," Johnson said.

Hunter Dobbs led Vernon offensively, splitting time between quarterback and tailback. Dobbs rushed for 165 yards (89 before halftime) and also completed 9 of 14 passes for 104 yards. He rushed for a 2-yard touchdown with 5:03 remaining to pull the Yellow Jackets within 21-6, but HC's Garrett Gardner recovered an onside kick afterward to help the Blue Devils drain the clock.

"They've got such great athletes," Johnson said of the Yellow Jackets. "Their quarterback, Dobbs, is phenomenal. We thought we had him hemmed in several times."

Vernon got the ball back with 3:25 left, but a fumbled snap at the HC 35 was recovered by the Blue Devils.



DEFUNIAK SPRINGS —Rep. Brad Drake (R-Eucheeanna) has filed HB 325, which amends Florida Statutes to only allow execution by means of electrocution or firing squad.

HB 325 would remove the option for lethal injection by the executed.

Rep. Drake said, "Over the past few weeks there has been much discussion and debate regarding the effectiveness of certain medicines used as preferred method for execution. So, I say let's end the

debate. We still have Old Sparky. And if that doesn't suit the criminal, then we will provide them a .45 caliber lead cocktail instead."

Recently in Florida, doctors and legal experts were petitioning Gov. Rick Scott to delay and or not use his executive authority to order execution by using Pentobarbital as one of the drugs mixed into the lethal injection. They were fearful of extreme suffering of the 61-year-old convicted murderer, Manuel Valle.

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

Florida 4-H is wired for wind power

WASHINGTON COUNTY — On Oct. 5, millions of young people across the nation became scientists for the day during the fourth annual 4-H National Youth Science Day. NYSD is the premiere national rallying event for year-round 4-H science programming, bringing together youth, volunteers and educators from the nation's 111 land-grant colleges and universities to simultaneously complete the National Science Experiment. The 2011 National Science Experiment, Wired for Wind, explored how to engineer renewable energy technologies and the positive effects they can have in communities across the country and the world. Energy is one of the top concerns for our nation today. The United States consumes 22 percent of the world's electricity, yet represents only 4.5 percent of the world's population. Most of energy we use today comes from nonrenewable



resources. The United States produces most of its electricity (almost half) from coal.

Wind power is a clean, renewable energy source. In fact, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, wind power has been growing at an average rate of 25 percent per year, making it the fastest



growing source of energy today. Nearly all states have locations that could be good for the development of wind power. Although Florida is not considered a wind power state, there is still potential for the technology. In the U.S., most wind farms are located on land, but in Europe, scientists are

experimenting with wind farms located in the ocean to capitalize on offshore winds. In addition, wind turbines are very similar to the turbines that help generate hydropower, which also has potential for our state.

Though many young people today are aware of the issues associated with carbon-based

fossil fuels and the dangers of our nation relying on foreign oil, they might not fully understand how scientists and engineers decide how to design and deploy alternative energy sources. Wired for Wind provides young people with an engaging, hands-on introduction to the engineering design process utilizing renewable energy as the centerpiece.

"NYSD gives youth the opportunity to be engaged in science and explore real-world, relevant issues," said Heather Kent, a University of Florida extension agent, "and it is only one of the many ways to learn about science through the 4-H youth development program."


