Senate, House, state attorney seats up for grabs

BONIFAY — In addition to choosing local candidates, Holmes County voters will have lots of choices when they weigh in on one U.S. Senate seat, one U.S. House of Representatives seat and a universal primary for the state attorney race on Tuesday in the 2012 statewide Primary Election.

The Republican ballot offers voters the most choices, with voters getting to choose among five candidates for U.S. Senate, all challengers to incumbent Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson. In November, Nelson will face one of a packed field of Republican Senate candidates currently led by U.S. Rep. Connie Mack.

Holmes to vote on alcohol sales

BONIFAY — The Holmes County Board of County Commissioners passed a resolution July 31 to allow for the question of extending alcohol sales in Holmes County to Sunday to be placed on the upcoming November ballot.

“What has been structured here is a straw poll,” County Attorney Jeff Goodman said. “This is to get the thoughts and ideals of the residents.”

Goodman said the vote would be a way of asking residents if they agree or disagree that businesses that already hold licenses to sell alcohol should extend their hours to include Sunday.

“Right now sales are only allowed Monday through Saturday with restrictions on times,” Goodman said. “This is just allowing these businesses who already sell alcohol to extend their alcohol sales to include Sunday.”

He said the expansion wouldn’t change what stores could sell or who can sell, just the days they are allowed to sell.

“I have my own thoughts and opinions on the matter,” Commissioner Kenneth Williams said. “I’m not approving because I agree with it; I’m approving to allow the people of this county to say what they want for their county.”

Goodman said Florida statutes allow for counties to decide if their alcohol sales should extend to include Sundays and that in 1977, the Holmes County BOCC decided such sales would be prohibited.

“This is in no way us condoning alcohol sales on Sunday,” Chairman Monty Merchant said. “It’s a way of finding out what the residents of Holmes County want, think and feel about the matter.”

The vote passed 3 to 2, with commissioners Jim King and Phillip Music voting no.

Separately, the board approved of setting the tentative millage rate at 9.9353 with a vote of 3 to 2, with Williams and Commissioner Ron Monk voting no.

“We should set it higher and be able to make the cuts where need be,” Merchant said.

A budget hearing is set for 4 p.m. Sept. 10.

The board also approved to move forward with the abandonment of Kelly Lane Road. Landowner Fred Webb confirmed that Kelly Lane Road is a dead-end road that leads to the center of his property and asked that it be

closed for safety reasons.

The board approved Holmes County Emergency Management Services’ request to enter into Houston-Galveston Area Council Interlocal Contract for Cooperative Purchasing to purchase a new ambulance with a grant through a state bid. Also approved were EMS’ new non-emergency hires.

The board approved Holmes County Extension Director Shep Eubanks’ request to travel to Orlando for a three-day professional improvements convention for \$570. The board also approved to allow Eubanks to travel to Gainesville as the University of Florida screens four potential applicants for the position as the new Holmes County extension director.

He said the university would send the best candidate back to the board for approval.

The board also approved of hiring Joseph Ratcliff as the new mechanic for District 4 and approved of State Housing Initiative Partnership’s request to increase the maximum money used in the Local Housing Assistance Plan from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

“There wasn’t a good quality product for the amount of money that was offered, and every one of the applications were having to come back to the board for approval because they were so many dollars over the allotted amount,” Goodman said.

REPUBLICAN SENATE

Cornelius Harvey McGillicuddy, popularly known as Connie Mack IV, is the U.S. Representative for Florida's 14th congressional district, serving since 2005. He is a member of the Republican Party. The district includes Fort Myers and Naples.

Other Republican candidates on the ballot for Nelson's senate seat include George LeMieux, Deon Long, Mike McCalister, Marielena Stuart and Dave Weldon.

George LeMieux, a former senator, dropped out of the campaign on June 20 because of a lack of resources and put his support behind Mack, according to the Washington Post.

Deon Long was also a candidate who, though he appears on the Holmes County Republican Ballot, no longer appears on the list of primary candidates, according to Ballotpedia. Long said the focus of his

campaign is the roll back of power of Washington, D.C., back to the states as contemplated by the Founding Fathers, according to his website, deonlong.org.

Mike McCalister is a retired U.S. Army colonel, businessman, university instructor and father, according to his website. McCalister served in the Army Reserves, Army National Guard and on active duty for a total of 33 years and retired in 2005. He is a licensed and degreed agribusiness professional and owner-operator of a small tree farm. He is a university instructor in accredited MBA and DBA programs. He was the cus-

todial parent of a son from the age of 4 through college; both McCalister and his son are Eagle Scouts and earned the God & Country Award. Additionally, McCalister is a recipient of the Valley Forge Cross for Heroism.

Marielena Stuart, who also goes by Marielena Montesino de Stuart, has been in the Senate race since August and hails from the city of Ave Maria (in southwest Florida near Naples), according to tampabay.com. She has been getting regional attention but not much exposure statewide. Stuart has worked as a linguist and interpreter, speaking Spanish and French, with some

Greek and Italian. Some of her columns have appeared in the Naples Daily News.

David Joseph Weldon, who resides in Indialantic, is a politician and physician. He was a Republican member of the United States House of Representatives, representing Florida's 15th congressional district. Weldon was elected to the House in 1994 and served seven terms in Washington before announcing he would not seek an eighth term in 2008. He is a veteran of the U.S. Army.

STATE ATTORNEY

The state attorney race

between Republicans Jim Appleman and incumbent Glenn Hess will be a universal primary.

If all candidates for an office have the same party affiliation and the winner will have no opposition in the General Election, then all qualified voters, regardless of party affiliation, may vote in the Primary Election for that office. These contests are called Universal Primary Contests, according to Santa Rosa County's website, santarosa.fl.gov. The outcome of the primary will determine the winner of the election, although it is possible there could be run-off elections required.

Republican State Attorney Glenn Hess resigned his job as a circuit judge to run for state attorney for the 14th Judicial Circuit in 2008, he is seeking a second term. Hess lists some of his biggest accomplishments as an increased number of convictions, from DUI cases to capital murder cases. Hess is a veteran of the U.S. Army, where he was a helicopter pilot, according to his website.

Panama City Attorney Jim Appleman, also a Republican, is challenging Hess. Appleman formerly served as state attorney for 24 years, according to his website. He retired in 2005 and said he is seeking re-election to make the office more fair and to "return our state attorney's office to a winning track record."

STATE REPRESENTATIVE, DISTRICT 5

Republican voters also will choose between Marti Coley and Danny Glidewell in the state representative District 5 contest.

Marti Coley of Marianna is Florida's 7th District Representative in the House of Representatives. Because of redistricting, she is seeking election as representative for District 5. She received her bachelor's degree from Florida State University in 1984. Coley has served in the House since she won a special election in June 2005 to fill the remainder of the term of her late husband, David, who died in March at age 43.

Danny Glidewell of DeFuniak Springs faces incumbent Coley in the race for the district that includes northern Bay and Washington, Holmes and Jackson counties. Among Glidewell's biggest disagreements with the way things are done in Tallahassee are the way the state regulates school districts with mandatory teacher evaluations that affect pay, the way calendars are set and the focus on the FCAT.

The winner of the Republican race will face unaffiliated candidate Travis Pitts and write-in candidate Eddy Holman in

November.

Travis Pitts of Chipley, running with no party affiliation, will face the winner of Tuesday's primary in the November General Election. Pitts was elected three times as Clerk of the Circuit County for Washington County and was certified by the Supreme Court of Florida. He was appointed by then-Chief Justice Joe Boyd to serve on various workload committees with the Office of the State Court Administrator. Pitts attended the public schools of Washington County and graduated from Chipley High School, Chipola Junior College and the University of Florida with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration and Management.

DEMOCRATIC SENATE

On the Democratic ballot, voters will get to choose their candidates for U.S. Senator and for U.S. Congressman for District 2.

Sen. Bill Nelson is the senior U.S. senator from Florida and is a former U.S. Representative and former treasurer and insurance commissioner of Florida. Nelson was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1972. He was re-elected in 1974 and 1976. Nelson was elected to the

U.S. House of Representatives in 1978. He served in the House from 1979 to 1991. In 2000, Nelson ran for the U.S. Senate seat vacated by retiring Republican Sen. Connie Mack. He was re-elected in 2006 with 60 percent of the vote and is seeking re-election in 2012.

In addition to facing his Republican challengers, led by Connie Mack, Nelson also faces Democratic challenger Glenn A. Burkett.

Burkett was born in Thomaston, Ga., and graduated from R.E. Lee High School in 1968. In 1969, he joined the U.S. Navy and trained as a medic and is a Vietnam veteran, according to his website. He obtained an associate's degree from Pensacola Junior College and a bachelor's degree from the University of West Florida in Pensacola. His post-graduate work was at Florida State University, Tallahassee, and the University of Florida, Gainesville. He describes himself

as a Democrat (hybrid), saying he would vote for legislation with the best ideas. He is currently in the natural health business, according to his website.

U.S. REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICT 2

In the District 2 Representative race, Democrats are looking to unseat Republican U.S. Rep. Steve Southerland of Panama City, who faces no Republican challenge in the primary.

Leonard Bembry of Greenville is one candidate seeking the seat. Bembry is the Florida Representative from District 10, a seat he has held since 2008, and is the Blue-dog endorsed candidate, according to web sources. Bembry works as a farmer and is the owner of University Homes. He is a member of the Florida Manufactured Housing Association, Habitat for Humanity, Madison County Develop-

ment Council, Madison County Farm Bureau, National Rifle Association and the Wild Turkey Federation.

Alfred "Al" Lawson Jr. is a former Democratic member of the Florida Senate, who represented the 6th District from 2000 through 2010. He was a member of the Florida House of Representatives from 1982 to 2000. Lawson received his bachelor's degree from Florida A&M University and his Master of Public Administration from Florida State University. Lawson ran for the Democratic nomination in Florida's 2nd Congressional District in 2010.

Alvin L. Peters of Panama City also is running for the District 2 seat. Peters served as the chairman of the Bay County Democratic Party from 2002 to 2010. He is an attorney with Peters & Scoon, where he has practiced since 2002. He is a soccer coach with the Bay County Youth Soccer Association, president of Early

Education and Care Inc., a local Head Start grantee and president of the Panama City Marine Institute.

Mark Schlakman, another Democrat seeking the District 2 congressional seat, has worked in the administration of both presidents George W. Bush and Bill Clinton, is an attorney who has worked with the North Florida Hate Crimes Task Force, and is a self-proclaimed human rights lawyer who has

said he would work to end gridlock in Washington. In addition to working in the White House, he has held positions in the U.S. departments of state and defense. He recently returned from Afghanistan, where he worked with Afghani officials on international and domestic law. Schlakman serves as senior program director at the Florida State University Center for the Advancement of Human Rights.

Cookbook collection spans almost 60 years

When "Perry's Prattle" column began in April 2003, the writer's wildest imagination would not allow him to believe the variety of topics he covered in the next 10 years.

Hester has collected cookbooks throughout our almost 60 years of our marriage. A wild guess would list the number at more than 100. Her collection includes everything from Southern Living to various other national magazines. She has supported and purchased books on cooking from many churches, civic and festival organizations, including the one titled "The 'Possum Cookbook" from Wausau's Fun Day.

It was in January 2007, while attending a two-day bluegrass festival in Andalusia, Ala., that I bought my first cookbook. It was in a Goodwill Store, and the fact that it was sponsored by Peoples First Community Bank of Panama City made the \$2 purchase easy for me.

The first page contained a letter from the chairman of the board, Joe Chapman, with a personal handwritten note: "Thank you for your business!" As residents of Panama City during the early years of our marriage, we watched Joe grow into manhood, excel in many facets of life, finish high school, enter law school and become an attorney. Back in his hometown, he engaged in many businesses. His mother, Mrs. Gladys


Chapman, a school teacher before entering the political arena, served many years as supervisor of elections in Bay County.

Hester and I knew many of the contributor's names, from our days in Panama City.

Three years later, I saw a cookbook advertised by Zion Primitive Baptist Church in Brunswick, Ga., as a fundraiser for building a dining hall to the meeting house. I recognized recipes from across the southland of people I had come to know in attending church meetings.

The heading for each type of food included a scripture quote. Under Appetizers and Beverage, the Bible reference was "If any man thirsts, let him come unto me and drink. He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water (John 7:37-38)." The Vegetables and Side Dishes began with this quotation: "The meek shall eat and be satisfied: they shall praise the Lord that seek him: your heart shall live for ever (Psalm 22:26)." Desserts give us this quotation: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance, against such there is no law (Galatians 5:22-23)."

The cook book is filled with quotes from philosophers and politicians. "I don't know the key to success, but the

key to failure is trying to please everybody," from Bill Cosby. "Too often we enjoy the comfort of opinion without the discomfort of thought," by John F. Kennedy. From Thomas Jefferson: "I'm a great believer in luck, and I find the harder I work, the more I have of it."

This light-hearted recipe in the church-sponsored cook book is for Elephant Stew — one med. elephant, salt and pepper, one small onion and two rabbits (optional).

Note the comical preparation instructions. "Cut elephant into bite size pieces. This will take about 16 days. Cover with rich brown gravy and simmer over open flame, about two and a half weeks. This should feed about 3,002 people, but if more are expected, add the 2 rabbits. However, add only if needed, as most people don't like hare in their stew".

The Minnie Pearl Music City Cook Book was purchased in a thrift

store. Aside from the recipes for down home cooking, Minnie's home spun tales and characters from Grinders Switch, including her boyfriend Hester and Uncle Nabob along with brother are included in her stories.

The Aunt Bee's Mayberry Cookbook in our home was given to Hester as a birthday present from Tim, Debbie, Laura, Julie and Perry II on Nov. 12, 2010. I don't think either of us has gotten serious with trying any of the delectable dishes submitted by real people who were invited to participate. The book is filled excerpts from Andy Griffith shows of the past and will bring to mind many characters that could will be lost to time now that Barney, George (Goober) Lindsey, Aunt Bee and Andy have passed from the scene of time.

Our special, The Bubba Gump Shrimp Co. Cookbook, was purchased recently, also in a bargain store. It came to us just after we had seen the rerun of Forrest Gump on television, which made it more special. Aside from the all-shrimp recipes, the booklet is filled with the philosophical sayings of Forrest that will be remembered from the movie. Here's some: "They asked me if I was runnin' for women's rights — women are always right." "Well, destiny is when you're born to do something, but you don't

know what it is." "Bubba was my best friend, and you don't find that very often." "Remember what I told you? Don't let anybody tell you they're better than you." And finally, "I happen to believe we make our own destiny. We have to do the best with what God gave us."

The last cookbook for review today has been in our household since the days when the Rev. Tommy Brill was pastor of Blue Lake Baptist Church. This book was prepared by the WMU of that congregation and brought back many memories of those who have since died that submitted favorite recipes. A quick glance will show Pop-Up Bread by Ruby Zumstein, Angel Biscuits by Inez Morris, Fresh Apple Cake by Louise Tharp, Green Bean Salad by Civie Speights, Rocky Road Candy by Margaret Kent and Molasses Cookies by Fannie McGuire.

With all the cookbook reading, I had to resist referring to myself as a gourmet cook after reading the dictionary definition as "a person who knows and appreciates fine food and drink, an epicure." I still know full well that my menu is limited to seafood gumbo and chip steak and gravy, served open-face style, along with potatoes sticks from a can.

If I allow one in my yard for someone I support, does that give others the right to put one there too? If not, is it legal for me to remove unwanted ones?

Who is responsible for cutting the grass around them wherever they are? Or straighten them up when the wind blows them over?

What about those on highway rights of way? Telephone or light poles? I suppose the candidates know the answers to these questions, but I don't know that they or their

supporters abide by the rules.

I haven't traveled the rural areas of our county much this election year, so I can't comment on the sign situation. Nor have I traveled out of Holmes, Washington and Bay counties. But Washington County seems to have as plentiful a supply of them as we do. One innovative contender there has individual hand painted signs that I have noticed.

The primary voting will be Aug. 14, and we have the mail-out from our efficient supervisor of elections, Debbie Morris. Some of the important offices will be decided then, while others will wait until the general election on Nov. 6 to be decided. I urge you to read what the candidates have to say and decide who appears to have the best handle on the responsibilities of the office. Attend a "rally" and listen to the candidates, and meet and talk with them. Then decide if they

have the qualifications to carry out those responsibilities.

That brings up another question: Who is responsible for removing the signs and how long after the election do they have to do it? Is there a penalty for not doing so? Who enforces that?

Personally, I don't think I have ever been influenced to vote for someone based on their political sign. However, it is a First Amendment right to free speech, and I would not discourage candidates from posting them. They certainly give those in that kind of business a boost and generates interest in who is running.

I am proud that we in the small counties put the larger counties to shame when it comes to our voter turn-out percentages. That makes our votes in the statewide elections a significant factor. Early voting and absentee voting are going on right now. If you put it off until Aug. 14, you can still vote. But don't miss out on the opportunity to exercise your right as a citizen.

DOUBLE UP

New regulations increase redfish daily limit to two

Some people love the new FWC regulation allowing a doubling of the daily redfish harvest from one to two per person in the northern zones; others hate it. But it is the rule for all state waters except the South Zone, and for those who love to eat redfish — and think there are plenty of them — this fall should provide some prime fish fries.

Classic wisdom is that king mackerel appear along Florida's West Coast when water temps reach 68, and redfish, AKA red drum, appear when they rise to 86. That means August is kickoff time for prime redfishing that will extend through October, especially for the giant "bulls" (which are actually females, by the way) which can weigh 30 pounds and up.

There are fair numbers of redfish in Panhandle waters year around these days, but late summer through fall is prime time. Big spawners, some more than 50 pounds and approaching 4 feet long, travel into the sounds and bays from their usual offshore locations. The fish drop their eggs around the larger passes, typically around the new and full moon major tides. Meantime, they prowl nearshore reefs, riprap cuts and the edges of the flats to feed, adding a whole new element to inshore fishing.

Tailing fish on the flats are not as abundant in August as they will be my mid-September and on into early November; but there are enough around to make the pursuit worthwhile, especially early and late on days with dawn or dusk low tides.

Many of the reds found on most flats at this time of year are likely to be somewhere near the 18 to 27 inch legal slot, though there are plenty of 30-inch fish that will join the migrating schools and leave the shallows as adults when fall turns to winter.

Reds often are scattered in summer, but as fall approaches they gather up in big schools, and occasionally anglers are treated to the sight of a "red wave" crossing the flats, easing along the beach or moving through the larger passes as hundreds of fish come to the surface and literally turn the water red as the sun glints off their rose-colored backs.

Some of these jumbos are caught by anglers towing large spoons, diving plugs or big live baits — often fishermen after kings or grouper connect with the lunker reds. They can also be caught by casting a big topwater plug or any live baitfish into a visible school; hits are instant. All of these fish far exceed the maximum legal size and must be released, but they put on a wonderful battle. (Use debarbed hooks if you target oversized reds, so that they can be released without injury — remember these are the

mommas and poppas that create the smaller ones we chase on the flats the rest of the year.)

Jumbo reds are all catch-and-release — no harvest is permitted. But if you want to tangle with some of these giants, one likely tactic is to set up on any Panhandle pier or the rocks of any Panhandle jetty and soak a slab of fresh-cut mullet or pinfish, or even better free-line live pinfish, grunts or finger mullet. This is heavy tackle action—you'll need at least 25 pound test line and a reel that holds a couple hundred yards of it to prevent a giant red from running off with your gear; but it's a unique opportunity for really big fish from shore.

On the flats

On the flats, reds can be considerably more challenging. There is a lot of pressure on shallow-water fish these days, and a noisy or careless approach often sends an entire school fleeing before you can catch even one.

Spotting the fish is the first challenge. Often, you will see only the tip of a tail or dorsal fin or the jump of fleeing finger mullet to let you know they are close. Or, you might see a moving vee wake as a school pushes across a shoal. (They look a lot like the vee that mullet schools make, but are usually somewhat larger.)

In calm, clear water, you sometimes can see individual fish as they cross a white patch of sand, but it requires Polarized glasses and a good eye.

The best strategy is to get ahead of a moving school and then cast your bait or lure well in front of the lead fish. Let them swim up to it and hopefully you get a bite. Casting into the middle of a school these days usually sends the entire bunch racing for deeper water.

Wadefishing for tailers on the last of the low tides around new and full moons can also be great at this time of year. When the water gets to around 12 inches deep over the grass, fish start to tail in many areas.

Most wadefishers use artificials, either soft jerkbaits, DOA shrimp, swim baits or topwaters. The trick

is to make a delicate presentation and bring the lure just near enough to the fish for it to spot the movement.

Hard-pressed reds may refuse most artificials, but a tactic that often fools them is to use a scented lure like a Gulp!Alive! crab, cast it close and uptide of the fish and simply let it sit; they soon follow the scent trail to the bait. Chunks of fresh mullet or ladyfish work just as well.

It's also possible to catch plenty of reds with the now-classic tactic of anchoring in sloughs or large holes and chumming with crippled sardines. The reds find the sardines and follow them to the source — your boat — where you offer them one with a hook in it.

Expert guides are skilled in putting just enough bait in the water to keep the reds actively feeding, but not enough so that they get full and move on. With this tactic, it's sometimes possible to set in one spot and catch a dozen or more reds, luring the school back each time it flushes away by tossing out more sardines.

Redfish regs

The bag limit on redfish in the Panhandle is now two per person per day, and there's no closed season. The slot limit is 18 to 27 inches; larger or smaller fish must be released immediately. Excellent fishing usually continues until the first cold front in November sends most of the fish to deeper water — but if you know where the holes are inshore — or fish the warm water outflow of powerplants — you can find plenty of "eating size" reds all winter.

Reds on the table

Redfish filets are moist and tender, good in a variety of recipes. However, the species does have a pronounced "red line" down each side, and unless that line is removed, it adds a somewhat "fishy" taste to the meat, which some people don't like.

One of the best recipes for reds is baked, "in the shell", which means the gutted carcass, head on, is wrapped in foil and placed

TIPS FOR SPOOKY REDS

• More elevation means you can see flats reds farther away, which is why poling platforms and casting towers are found on many flats rigs. However, the higher you are, the father away a redfish can see you. It's good to use the tower to locate the fish, but sometimes you'll have to step down and crouch on the deck while casting if you want to get them to eat.

• If you fish from a boat, use the pushpole and the Power-Pole or Talon rather than the trolling motor and anchor when ever possible. With light winds, simply drifting or letting the tide carry you can be the best possible approach — but be ready to stop the boat immediately when you see fish ahead. Otherwise, you'll drift too close and spook them.

• When possible, let the fish come to you; determine their direction of travel, get the boat well ahead of them and sit in silence while they feed into casting range.

• When fish chase your lure close, get small—crouch down so that he can't see you up there manipulating that rod.

• While a silent approach in a flats boat is good, a silent approach while wading is much better; there's a lot less for the fish to see, and that means you can get closer most of the time.

on the grill or in a 350-degree oven. Stuffing the cavity with sliced oranges or lemons adds a nice extra tang. Cook until a fork passes easily through the thickest part of the shoulders.

When the fish is cooked, slide a knife just under the skin and run it down the backbone, then peel away the skin. This reveals the fillet and the red line. Slip a spatula under the red line and lift it away, and the fish is ready for the table. Serving-size portions lift easily off the bones.

Reds are also good just plain fried; fillet, skin, cut out the red line and section the fillets into eating-size pieces. Dip in cornmeal or crushed corn flakes, then drop into hot vegetable oil or peanut oil. Cook until the coating turns light brown, then drain on layers of paper napkins and serve.

Last but not least is blackened redfish, a dish made up to create a tasty dish from less palatable fish. But there's no question that it's darned good. Basically the routine is to dip the fillets in Cajun seasonings — available at any grocery store these days — and then fry it in a very hot cast iron skillet with butter. The mix of seasoning dust and butter quickly forms a blackened crust on the outside, while the flesh inside remains moist and tender. (Leave it a minute too long and all you have is burnt fish, but done right, this is a great dish.)



DOG DAYS OF SUMMER: PART 2

'You don't know until they go around the track'

EBRO — It isn't meant as a slight to either party when saying that Joe Watson would have fit nicely with the cast of "The Andy Griffith Show."

Watson's unassuming demeanor and down-home work ethic are virtues embodied in the long-running staple of American television.

He doesn't make a grand entrance or command a room. More than likely, he could be the one over in the corner getting the job done.

Now 49, the Caryville resident is in his first year as sole owner of a greyhound racing kennel, AJN, which occupies kennel No. 5 in the compound in the northwest corner of the property at Ebro Greyhound Park. The 'J' and the 'N' represent Joe and wife, Nita, who is a retired colonel in the state corrections system.

Watson's current status reflects an evolution that began when he was a teenager growing up in Bonifay. He had a friend in school, Floyd Harcus, who was involved in the industry and first got him involved.

"He was raising greyhounds, so I've been coming here since I was 18," Watson said of the Washington County track.

Eventually he became partners with Sarah Lucas for four years in SL Kennel. Watson had another partner last year who he said decided to follow a trail of larger purses at a track "up north" affiliated with a casino.

Watson has had a hand in the kennel end of the business for eight years.

Relationships forged over time have had a direct bearing on how he conducts the enterprise.

As example:

On his friendship with Ebro administrator Teresa Duncan, dating to when she started in customer services six years ago, Duncan recently became a first-time owner of a racing greyhound, AJN Sweet Smoke:

"I know'd how she was. Know'd she be a good owner. I didn't mind getting her involved. I knew it would be a good thing."

On Thomas Suggs, age 22, who is in his first year as a trainer and handles the greyhounds for AJN:

"He started in Sarasota and has been with me eight months. (Kennel owner) Ray Thurber asked me to give him a shot. Said he had potential. ... He's got his own ways. If I see we're not winning we might sit down and talk and make an adjustment. He's doing real good. He's 22 years old and in second place (kennel wins), which is real good."

On his bond with owners of dogs that represent AJN Kennel:

"You can tell in how they handle theirself and their dogs" that it will be a positive experience.

In addition to time spent tending to kennel-related business, Watson delivers the ground beef used as feed to kennel compounds located in Pensacola and as far away as Monticello. He also has a lumber yard and sawmill located on his 15-acre farm, though he admits since the downturn in the economy he operates the mill mostly by appointment these days.

Still, Watson's work week can approach 70 hours during Ebro's live racing season that runs May through September. He also spends

11 weeks in Melbourne and races his dogs during the winter-spring meet in Sarasota.

Watson currently has 80 greyhounds in his kennel, of which 60-65 are active and the other are young pups getting ready to race for the first time.

"You can tell" when a dog no longer is going to be competitive, he said. "Then you got to get somebody else in their place."

In doing so, Watson said he makes sure where his dogs wind up following the end of their racing careers.

"I pet them out," he said. "I pick out where mine go. I know the people. I know they're taken care of."

In that sense, the kennel is in a state of yearly replenishment. New puppies are acclimated into racing routine, while non-productive and often older dogs get new homes. Watson said that a greyhound's career usually is capped when reaching age 5 or 6, and often well before then.

Watson said he keeps three or four female greyhounds as "broods" to mate with male racing greyhounds. He's of the opinion that the female's genetics and racing history play the most prominent role in producing offspring that mature into top-flight

performers.

"You have to keep blood lines spread out, know who crosses with who," he said. "If the line is bred too tight it makes them act crazy."

Watson has a working relationship with a kennel in Fort White where his puppies are trained for the racing life. Until then, he said, you can't determine which dogs will be productive.

"You don't know until they start training ... about 14 months old," he said. "You don't know until they go around the track"

Watson estimated his expenses at \$6,000 per month in operating the kennel. His greyhounds have to deliver, finishing either first, second or third in a race, to earn points by grade of race to add to the payoff kennel owners receive. The money bet during an entire racing program, either evening or matinee, goes into the pool as well as the handle bet on simulcast races aired at Ebro as well as a percentage of the take from the Poker Room.

From the purse money AJN Kennel receives, Watson pays individual greyhound owners 35 percent by race, and 50 percent of money earned in stakes races. Ebro annually runs the Mega Morris Stakes each summer for grey-

hounds that break their maiden or win their first official career race at the track.

That is another carrot for Watson to start his puppies racing here.

"One reason is the Ebro Puppy Stakes," he said. "If you start them here, they have a chance to compete in the Puppy Stakes, which usually is \$5,000 to \$7,500" payoff.

In addition to compensating owners, Watson pays Suggs a weekly salary plus a \$100 bonus based on points earned for top. A kennel helper and additional part-time workers can be on the payroll, and Watson covers the cost of all meat, meal, supplies and extended veterinary services not provided by the track veterinarian.

Suggs was raised in the vicinity of Ebro Greyhound Park and attended Vernon High School before finishing his last two years at Freeport. He said that maintaining a daily routine in the kennel is important. It may vary by trainer, he said, as each has preferred ways of doing things. But repetition is important in helping the animals adapt and remain in a positive rhythm.

AJN Kennel was coming off a strong month when Watson was interviewed for this series. He estimated a profit of about \$5,000 during that time.

Soon afterward, AJN greyhounds won only three of the next 48 races held at the track, but that doesn't stop curious onlookers from asking the obvious question.

"Every time you walk around people, they ask me who is going to win," Watson said. "You might be dealing with one-hundredth of a second (for a 5-16 mile race usually decided in about 31 seconds) but people think that all trainers know."

Kennel owners and trainers do understand when dogs that have fared

well in the past suddenly aren't performing, however. At times, injury or illness can be the culprit.

"You might take him off and give him a rest," Watson added. "And when they see other dogs going to the races without them it can put the desire back in them to race."

Watson said that he was en route to Hollywood, Fla., in October 2010 when he received the phone call on the day that forever changed how the kennels in the compound at Ebro were scrutinized.

The bodies of 34 decomposed greyhounds were found dead of starvation during the off-season in one of the kennels, long after the racing meet had concluded.

Watson said that initially he couldn't believe the news.

"I never thought that would happen here," he said solemnly.

As a result, Ebro Greyhound Park has changed its operational procedures to ensure that it never does. Assistant manager Mark Hess explained that the track altered its policies to exceed state regulations and to emphasize "we're doing everything we possibly can to make sure that never happens again."

"Now anytime there is a racing greyhound in our facility we have 24-hour security," Hess said. "We know the comings and goings from a log-in sheet kept in the guardhouse. That's the major changes that we did in addition to weekly and random checks."

Five of the abused animals were able to be saved, Hess said. They were rehabilitated and adopted as pets.

are given Monday through Friday at WCHD.

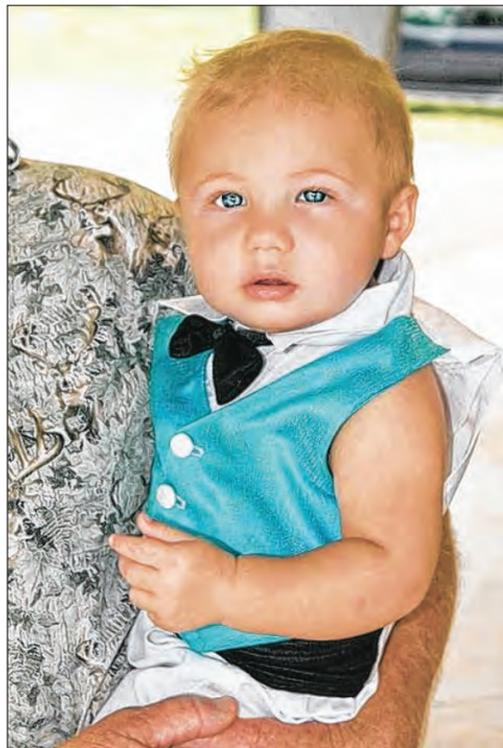

Talk to your doctor or nurse to find out which immunizations you need. For more information, call WCHD at 638-6240.

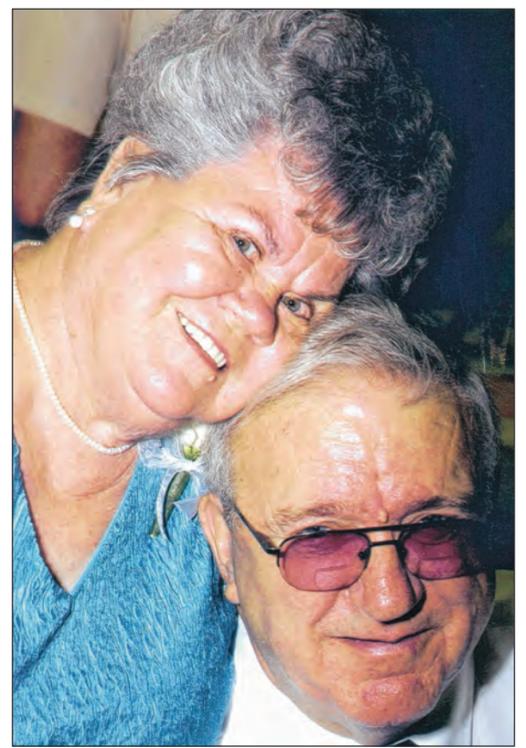

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Department of Education Commissioner Gerard Robinson submitted a letter of resignation on June 31 to Gov. Rick Scott and State Board of Education Chairman Kathleen Shanahan.

Robinson has served as head of one of the country's largest state school systems since August 2011. Under his leadership, Florida's school system has realized some

major milestones, including raising achievement levels for the first time in a decade, obtaining a provisional flexibility waiver from the U.S. Department of Education from the Elementary and Secondary Education Act — one of the first 11 states to receive notification — and earning national recognition for accomplishments from early childhood learning to the Florida College System.

"The board is extremely grateful for Gerard's leadership this

past year," Shanahan said. "He has worked with the board as we have raised standards for our students and our schools. He is a leader who embodies and understands the importance of education reform. We wish him the best as he makes the decision that is best for his own young children."

Shanahan said the board will be working closely with the governor to identify a replacement. Robinson's resignation will be effective Aug. 31.


CHIPLEY — The local craft group Kraffy Katz made a trip to Scared Heart Children's Hospital in Pensacola July 30 to deliver blankets to the children in the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit), PICU (Pediatric Intensive Care Unit), the Infant and Toddlers Unit and the School Age Unit.

The group, consisting of Vicki Lamb, Linda Bybee and Cathrine Lamb, took more than 50 blankets, six journals and three hats to the children. The blankets were split between all of the units, the journals went to the school age unit for the children to keep a written statement of their day-to-day life as they are in the hospital, and the hats were given to the oncology unit.

Marina Holley, foundation development coordinator for Scared Heart, gave the group a tour of the different units. Children as they about to be released from Scared Heart Children's Hospital are given the opportunity to paint a ceiling tile to be placed on the ceiling. These tiles are placed on the ceiling in the hallways so the children have something to look at as they go for procedures. Marina showed the ladies the new Healing Garden that was just opened in March 2012.

This is an outside area that has been built between to wings of the hospital to allow patients to get fresh air and do physical therapy without being around other people, which would put the children with immune disorders at risk for becoming sicker.

Linda and Cathrine, the two members that were able to make the trip, were in the company of Vicki

Kirkland, the Walmart fundraising coordinator.

The Scared Heart Children's Hospital is located in Pensacola. The hospital is the only pediatric hospital providing care to children regardless of ability to pay in Northwest Florida. SHCH is currently serving children from Northwest Florida and south Alabama. The state-of-the-art hospital boasts 106-beds for children, with 55 of those beds being in the NICU. The hospital has been designated by the state of Florida as the only pediatric trauma referral center in Northwest Florida.

Scared Heart Children's Hospital is the area's only Level III NICU. The nurses and doctors are on standby to take care of and treat these critically ill children and to take care of any problems that come

up from these babies being sick and/or premature. SHCH also boasts the areas only PICU. The PICU is a 10-bed unit where they take care of the most critically ill or injured children. There are 50 other beds outside of the NICU and PICU for sick children or for those children who have cancer.

The hospital has a "one-room school," where children can complete their school work so they do not fall behind. There is also an age-appropriate playroom in each of the units, so the children may interact with one another if they are able to.

The Scared Heart Children's Hospital provides pediatric physicians who specialize in the following areas: cardiology; critical care; emergency; gastroenterology; general sur-


gery; hematology/oncology; nephrology; neurology; neurosurgery; orthopedics; otolaryngology; pulmonology; rheumatology; surgery and urology.

The hospital also offers the following outpatient services with a pediatric specialists: dental clinic; ambulatory care center; emergency department; Nemours Children's Clinic; Developmental Evaluation and Early Intervention Program, and a dialysis unit. PET TALK

Human medicines can be poison to pets

This week Dr. Dorothy Black, clinical assistant professor at the Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences (CVMM), discusses some common over-the-counter and prescription medications that are toxic to pets.

"Many homes have these medications, and it can be surprisingly easy for pets to get a hold of them," Black said. "Whether pets open bottles, chew on tubes, lick topical medication or just pick up dropped pills off the floor, these medications pose particularly dangerous threats."

Even the most common over-the-counter medications can be dangerous. Non-steroidal anti-inflammatories, NSAIDs, such as naproxen, ibuprofen, acetaminophen and aspirin, can be highly toxic to dogs and cats. These human medications can have profound effects on the gastrointestinal tract, kidneys, liver and hemoglobin in red blood cells. Unfortunately, there is no specific antidote, and an overdose often requires hospitalization

and supportive care. Most cases of NSAID toxicity have a prognosis of "good" to "guarded" depending on clinical signs.

"It is best not to give any NSAIDs to pets, unless under the direct supervision of your veterinarian," Black said. "And keep medications out of the reach of pets. Pets are naturally drawn to objects that we touch often and pill bottles are regularly handled, so they carry our scent."

"We typically use terms of 'excellent, good, fair, guarded and grave' to give odds of survival in these types of cases. Excellent indicates we have little doubt that, with appropriate care (typically very minimal care), their pet will return to normal function," Black said. "Guarded prognoses usually have a fifty-fifty chance for survival with aggressive treatment, and the pet may not recover to 100 percent of what they were before poisoning. Without treatment the pet is likely to die."

Vitamin D analogs, which are used topically to treat psoriasis, also top Black's list of toxic medicines.

If pets lick the product off the skin, kidney failure could occur. Signs of poisoning are vomiting, diarrhea and increased urination and drinking. As with NSAIDs, there is no antidote. If the pet is decontaminated before clinical signs emerge, the prognosis is good. However, if clinical signs occur, the prognosis is guarded.

"The topical medications are particularly alarming, because if your pet licks the application site on your body, they can unintentionally ingest the medication," Black said. "Many people don't realize the danger that poses to pets."

Medications containing progesterone, such as birth control pills and some topical cancer medications, are also dangerous. If ingested in large quantities, these medications can lead to bone marrow toxicity and seizures. Since there is no antidote for progesterone poisoning, supportive care is the only treatment option if clinical signs are presented, and at that point the prognosis is guarded.

Amphetamines, which

are commonly used to treat Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) can also have alarming effects on pets. If ingested by cats or dogs, amphetamines can cause hyperactivity, aggressive behavior, vocalization, elevated body temperature, heart arrhythmias tremors, and seizures. Although supportive care is usually successful, high-dose intoxications carry a guarded prognosis.

"It should be noted that supportive care can lead to successful recovery, but it is rather expensive and can force some pet owners to make tough decisions," Black said. "This is one of those times that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. It's best to protect your pets from the outset. Keep medications contained and beware of topical applications."

What employers want from job references

A great resume and solid interview skills may place job seekers in the running for a position, but a survey conducted by OfficeTeam, a leading staffing service, finds that the results of a reference check can really be what makes — or breaks — a job search. Hiring managers interviewed for the survey said they remove about 21 percent of candidates from consideration after speaking to their professional references.

Managers also were asked, "When speaking to an applicant's job references, what is the most important information you hope to receive?" Their responses:

- Description of past job duties and experience: 36 percent
- A view into the applicant's strengths and weaknesses: 31 percent
- Confirmation of job title and dates of employment: 11 percent
- Description of workplace accomplishments: 8 percent
- A sense of the applicant's preferred work culture: 7 percent
- Other/don't know: 7 percent

"When hiring managers narrow the field to a few potential candidates, the reference check often becomes the deciding factor," says OfficeTeam executive director Robert Hosking.

"To distinguish themselves from the competition, job seekers should assemble a solid list of contacts who can persuasively communicate their qualifications and professional attributes."

OfficeTeam offers five tips for creating a reference list that works in your favor:

Choose Wisely
Select people who can discuss your abilities and experience that directly relate to the position, not just those with the most impressive job titles. Offer a mix of contacts who can address different aspects of your background; for example, a former peer may be able to describe your interpersonal skills, while a past direct report can talk about your management style.

Check in Beforehand
Always call potential references first to get their permission and evaluate their eagerness to talk to hiring managers. Be sure to give all references a copy of your resume, the job description and the name of the person who will likely call.

Be Prepared
Provide clear contact information

for your references, including their names, titles, daytime phone numbers and email addresses. Also, offer a brief explanation of the nature of your relationship with each individual. Consider supplying more references than are requested, so you won't miss out on the job offer if the hiring manager can't get in touch with one of your contacts.

Think Outside the Box
It's common for employers to seek out additional references for new hires — either online or through their own networks. Since you never know to whom a hiring manager might reach out, you should not only remain on good terms with your past supervisors and colleagues (if possible), but also be selective about who's in your online network, on professional networking sites such as BeKnown and LinkedIn.

Give Thanks
Express your gratitude to people who agree to serve as references, even if they aren't contacted by employers. Keep them updated on the progress of your job search and offer to return the favor by providing a recommendation should they need one.

Clerks around the state are having to cope with a significant budget reduction from the legislature in the 2012-2013 budget year. Changes in the use of technology are currently being phased in, with existing e-recording of official records (deeds, etc.) and e-filing of court cases, which will soon be mandatory. The next legislative session will likely bring even more budget cuts, forcing the next clerk to work with the reduced funding while still maintaining a well-trained staff, staying abreast of up-to-date technology, and offering the public the quality service they deserve.

When choosing the next clerk, voters should consider qualifications and demeanor. I have a unique understanding of the court system, which no other candidate has. With both the current clerk and the chief deputy clerk retiring at the end of the year, almost 80 years of experience will be walking out the door.
