Council: Replace manhole covers

BONIFAY — The Bonifay City Council approved to pay \$2,300 to replace manholes on McGee Street during their regularly scheduled meeting Monday.

City Grant Writer Bob Jones told the council they were under budget so far. They were awarded \$566,000 and have spent \$480,000. Jones said if this continued it was possible to expand to add an additional area to the project, however advised the Council

that it still was too much that could happen between this area and the next.

One of the best occurrences because of the grant, Jones said, was the replacement of the asbestos water line on Weeks Street.

City Superintendent Jack Marell asked if it was possible that they would be finished by April 7, saying it didn't seem possible to him.

Jones assured him if the progress remained steady the deadline was more than possible.

Council member Adren Granger

Jr. asked if anyone else was receiving complaints about water containing fluoride, becoming brown or containing dirt.

"That's something commonly found when water lines are being replaced," Mayor Lawrence Cloud said. "More then likely the sediment they are seeing is chlorine sediment that has been knocked loose during the pipe replacement."

Cloud also said some were complaining about water slowing down in their sink tap, so he advised that if they were to unscrew the nozzle and knock out the sediment then it

would fix that problem.

City Superintendent Jack Marell asked that any if any council member receive a complaint to contact him and he would see what he could do to alleviate the problem.

"Bear with us a couple of days and we'll have it cleared," Marell said.

The council approved to pay Bush's Paint \$1,342 to replace the carpeting in the council chambers and replace the tile in the council's kitchen.

Local deputies arrests 3 on drug charges

HOLMES COUNTY — Holmes County Sheriff's Office arrested multiple people on drug charges following a Jan. 18 tip about illicit drug activity in the Poplar Springs community.

When deputies arrived, they observed a van in the driveway. Deputies made contact with the driver of the van, Melissa Hayes, 33, of Bonifay.

Deputies received consent from Hayes to search her vehicle and found a small amount of methamphetamine in her purse, according to the report. Hayes was placed under arrest for possession of methamphetamine.

Also on Jan. 18, Deputies received another call of illegal drug activity at a residence in the Hickory Hill community. When Deputies arrived, they made contact with Lorraine Renee Kilzer, 38, of Westville.

Deputies found several used syringes with methamphetamine residue, according to the report. Kilzer, who is currently under the supervision of the Florida Department of Corrections, was placed under arrest for possession of drug paraphernalia.

On Jan. 21, a Holmes County Deputy conducted a traffic stop in the Gritney community for a registration violation.

The driver of the vehicle, Donnie Ray Calhoun, 38, did not have a valid driver's license. During a subsequent search, a small amount of methamphetamine and a glass pipe with burnt residue were located on his person, according to the report.

Calhoun was placed under arrest for driving while license suspended, possession of methamphetamine and possession of drug paraphernalia.

"The community's involvement in fighting the war on drugs is essential," Sheriff Tim Brown said.

"I've looked at it and Jerri's looked at it and these dark spots just won't come out," Cloud said. "They've said that the 21 ounce would start fraying in 10 years so I suggest that we go with the 26 ounce for additional durability."

The council approved of paying Robert Griffin \$680 to clean the city hall.

"This is a one time cleaning," Cloud said. "We don't have anyone other than ourselves to keep this place clean, however we don't have the equipment needed to do certain tasks, like buffing the floors."

A code enforcement workshop will be at 6 p.m. Feb. 5 at Bonifay City Hall.

The next regularly scheduled meeting is set for 6 p.m. Feb. 11 at Bonifay City Hall.

"When it comes to United Way, it's like a grant and someone, not a paid staff member, but someone within your community will look at the dollars, they will look at the grant request and our agencies will fill out an application, a grant application, they tell us how much we need, how they're going to use the money and that whole process," said Sharpe. "Then our individuals from this community

look to see what they can do to leverage those dollars."

Those individuals for Holmes County's community were recognized as Bullington with the Holmes County Chamber of Commerce, Willard with Regions Bank, Haithcoat with Wells Fargo and Blich from Doctors Memorial Hospital.

"They take those funds, they look at the grant requests and ask how can we leverage the most dollars to

their fullest potential," said Sharpe. "For example, you guys are familiar with Life Management. They do a lot of great work within the six counties that we serve."

One program Life Management has is an adoption care program, he said, and every dollar given to them in that grant they get \$25 in matching funds.

"That's pretty powerful what you can do with just a dollar," said Sharpe. "Early Learning Coalition is really a silent partner; not many people knowing what they do, but when you go by a daycare center they are the agency behind the scenes that does a lot of great work within the community. They have a school readiness program for the children and ever dollar we give them they get \$17 in matching funds."

Another example was

the Council on Aging Meals on Wheels Program and for them every dollar given to them they get \$9 in matching funds.

He explained that there are 31 agencies that serve the needs of Holmes County, but many aren't known about because they do not have a physical location in Holmes County.

"I can tell you they can assist the citizens here even if they are stationed in Panama City," he said. "One example is Family Services and last year they helped over 50,000 people and I'm not talking about lazy people or people just needing a hand out. This agency alone do their due diligence when people come in and say they need help with their power bill because they just got laid off, or with a food pantry or clothing."

The moral dilemma that unfolds makes a very compelling and thought-provoking read. Mrs. Brannon served delicious refreshments at the conclusion of the meeting.

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
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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Prattler remembers Malzie Floyd Wells Smith

Those readers who saw the obituaries in the B Section of the Washington County News/Holmes County Times Advertiser of Jan. 16 saw the report of the death of Malzie Floyd Wells Smith.

If your writer did not report that this lady was the first cousin of my father, Hugh T. Wells, then it would probably be unreported. The article today is an effort to further explain this lady's ties to Washington and Holmes counties families.

Her father is Jasper Green Wells, the brother of my grandfather, James Thomas Wells. He and my grandfather, along with one sister, Mary Elizabeth Wells Peters, were the three children which John Coleman Wells and wife, Lucinda Speigner Wells, brought to Holmes County in about 1880, upon their move from Butler County, Ala., expressly to work on the railroad then being built from Jacksonville to Pensacola. These children, plus two more boys, Joseph Lafayette Wells and John Smith Wells, and two more girls, Lulu Wells Chitty and Emma Wells Bryant were born to the transients from Alabama. All were reared to adulthood just west of Bonifay on what is known as Boswell Hill.

On March 26, 1905, Jasper Green Wells married Linnie Baker, daughter of a Westville pioneer family, where many descendants still reside. Born to Jasper Green and Linnie were J. C., Gussie Mettie (Met), Eva Mae, Leon, Tommy and Malzie.

My great uncle Green Wells, as he was called, moved his family to Tallassee, Ala., where Malzie, and others, were born. It is reported that employment in the cotton mills of that area attracted the Wells Family to migrate to that

Alabama town. In the late 1940s, my great uncle returned to Holmes County and lived in Bonifay. He was hired as custodian in the Holmes County Courthouse, where

he was able to renew many friendships of the past, plus make a host of new friends. The return to this area resulted in the youngest son, Tommy, marrying a New Hope community girl, Vonceil Smith. Malzie married Lewis J. (Junior) Smith, a Westville native who served as a city policeman in Bonifay after his discharge from military service. Their special needs son, Ronnie, was born during that time.

The family later returned to Tallassee, where other children were born. Ronnie passed away several years ago. After Junior's death last year, Malzie lived with her son, Glynn, and family in McDonough, Ga.

J. C. Wells and wife, Lille Mae Anderson Wells, also a Holmes County lady, moved their family to Columbus, Ga., for employment in that city where jobs were readily available in the cotton mills. Some of their children have continued to make that area their home in adulthood.

Leon Wells, Met, who married a Weldon, and Eva Mae, who marriage was to a Kelly, continued to live out their lives in Tallassee.

Malzie Wells Smith, who died on Jan. 5, was the last in her family to pass away. After a Jan. 7 funeral service held at Haisten Funeral Home in McDonough, with the Rev. Mike Patterson officiating, her body was brought to the Campground Cemetery north of Westville on Jan. 8 for burial, where she joined her parents, Jasper Green Wells and Linnie Wells Baker, and older brother,

Surviving Malzie Wells Baker are Mickey Smith and wife, Donna, of Morrow, Ga.; Glynn Smith and wife, Beverly, of McDonough; Clora Long and husband, Dave, of Cherokee, N.C.; Greg Smith of Tallassee; and Jean Moreland of McDonough. She has 12 grandchildren and 32 great-grandchildren and a host of nieces and nephews.

Offspring of almost all, if not all, of her siblings attended the Westville burial service. My brother, Max, and our son, Tim, joined me in attending the last service, which was our first opportunity to see many of kinsmen for the first time.

The final service at Campground provided a time of eulogies to be spoken by any family member who chose to do

so. Numerous tributes were delivered by her children, grandchildren and other family members. The main attributes of the deceased consistently mentioned by her loved ones were her compassion, patience, selfless attitude, love for family and others in her life and her ability to accept her role in life under whatever adversity.

Although not speaking publicly, and after hearing the comments of those who spoke, I did tell some of the close family members that their description of their loved one reminded me of what our dad, Hugh Wells, said of Uncle Green many years ago: "Uncle Green Wells loves everybody better than I love anybody!" They agreed that the description would also befitting of Malzie Wells Smith.

Local Judge hears Florida's first terrorist trial in 1977

The trial of Rolando Otero Hernandez, accused of terrorist activities in south Florida in 1975, was moved to a Panhandle courtroom in 1977 due to pre-trial publicity. The bombings took place October through December of 1975 at Miami International Airport and several U.S. Postal installations in the Miami area. Otero, 33, a naturalized American who emigrated from Havana, Cuba, was charged with 39 felony counts of attempted murder and other related charges.

The case had been heard in federal court, and he was acquitted, but Florida state charges were still applicable. The trial began in Okaloosa County Court with Hon. Clyde B. Wells as the presiding judge. The source of this article comes from newspaper clippings that I saved from the Pensacola News Journal, which at that time was delivered to our home. During my recent home renovations, these surfaced among my memorabilia, and since it is the 35th anniversary of

probably the most publicized trial of my brother's career, I decided to print it.

Jury selection for the four men, two women jury took the first day with attorneys issuing

16 of their 20 challenges before agreeing on a panel. Only 13 persons of the entire venire remained unexcused or unchallenged. The most spectacular part of the whole trial probably came during opening arguments when defense attorney Bill Clay repeatedly tried to blame the bombings on a double agent who worked with the CIA. The public defender repeatedly objected and the judge warned him to stick to the evidence. After what appeared to be a heated exchange in judge's chambers from which the press was excluded, the opening statements continued. Clay again picked up the political aspects of the case quoting from a speech by Cuban Premier Fidel Castro. Wells cautioned Clay, "We are not going to try anything but the issues in this case—not

Fidel Castro."

The defense attorney persisted, after the warning, to describe how Otero was anti-Castro and had an abiding hatred of communists. The Judge again cautioned him to stick to the facts in the case but did allow him to present some background into the defendant's attitude about communism and Castro.

At the beginning of the trial, the Judge had ruled that no reference to the Federal trial would be allowed during the testimony. When Robert Rosenblatt, the other defense attorney, made a reference to Otero's statement in the previous trial, the Judge immediately called the bailiff to take the jury out. Rosenblatt was ordered to serve two days at the conclusion of the trial in Okaloosa County Jail for contempt of court as he had been warned on several occasions, one of which was a remark that suggested that the judge had made a reversible error.

As the trial proceeded, Clay continued to try to introduce evidence produced in the previous trial and after due warning. He also was

ordered to serve two days in jail at the conclusion of the trial for contempt of court.

This was a complicated trial with the use of an interpreter, witness testimony from the Cuban community, Dominican Republic, Venezuela, the FBI and others. Rolando Otero-Hernandez was convicted of all counts and sentenced to 40 years in prison. From the closest records I could ascertain, he was incarcerated from 1977 to 1989. He was out of prison from '89 to '98 and was re-incarcerated for a long list of offenses. Whether he is still alive or not, or whether he is at liberty I was not able to find out.

As we approach our brother Clyde's untimely death on Feb 2, 1990, in a fiery plane crash, we cherish every memory we have of him. He seemed to be a favorite of the press, so we have many clippings of him as a public figure. Though he sat on an interim basis on the Florida Appellate Court and argued one case before the U.S. Supreme Court, the terrorist trial was probably the most newsworthy trial he presided over.

Carson set his sights on the deer, turning down two other shooter bucks because this was the one he wanted to bring home.

For a young hunter to turn down not one but two smaller bucks is extreme. I know experienced hunters who would have a hard time doing that.

Over the days and weeks Carson spent more than 100 hours in the stand waiting and hoping this buck would show himself again. Finally, two does showed up followed by the 8-point he had waited on for so long.

He watched as the buck made a scrape and decided that now was the time.

Carson put the shot right behind the shoulder and the deer jumped straight up and was dead before it hit the ground.

It was a nice 8-point estimated at 180 pounds. The shot was made at 40 yards.

Carson is now a full-fledged deer hunter. Memories like his last a lifetime, and I'm sure Carson will be telling the story of his first big deer for years to come.



LET IT BURN

Controlled fires planned for area sawgrass marsh

Over the next several days, wildlife biologists will be busy with several large prescribed burns north of Apalachicola in the sawgrass marsh.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Wildlife Biologist Derek Fussell said the prescribed or controlled burns will be done in several phases on marshlands in the Apalachicola River Wildlife and Environmental Area. An estimated 10,000 acres will be burned in the next seven to 10 days.

"Our purpose in doing the burn is really twofold," Fussell said. "It's about hazard reduction or removing as much combustible material as possible to prevent a more serious wildfire."

"Additionally, burns like this help stop the encroachment of hardwoods into the marsh."

Before settlement in Florida, Native Americans sometimes used wildfire to burn significant areas of the state. They recognized that fire not only kept forests and fields open, but was good for wildlife such as white-tailed deer.

To burn as much as 10,000 acres quickly, Fussell said the FWC would be using a helicopter and aerial ignition system called Delayed Aerial Ignition Device. Pilots using the DAID system fly along, dropping pingpong-like balls filled with a chemical mixture. When the balls hit the ground, they ignite.

Under the old burning methods, biologists on the ground with fire pots could burn

and maintain control of a prescribed burn of usually not more than several hundred acres. Using a helicopter and a modern DAID system, they can safely burn thousands of acres in a day.

Fussell said another important reason biologists and foresters like to burn in January and February is because of predictable weather.

"We have to keep the smoke away from people and highways, and this time of year fronts and wind direction are much more predictable," he said.

Fussell said the FWC works closely with the Florida Forest Service and obtains a burn permit before beginning any prescribed burn. To keep it safe, the burn permit takes into account relevant burning conditions.

FWC, DEP combined forces increase service in state parks

When the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission acquired additional personnel from the Department of Environmental Protection and the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (DACS) last year, its staff gained new responsibilities. Now, FWC officers patrol all of Florida's woods and waters, including its state forests and state parks.

Gov. Rick Scott said, "By combining the efforts of Florida's environmental law enforcement, we can ensure that our state's many visitors are safe and

This efficient approach provides FWC more opportunities to serve Florida families and enhance the natural condition of our state parks and forests."

natural resources are protected. This efficient approach provides FWC more opportunities to serve Florida families and enhance the natural condition of our state parks and forests."

"We have become more efficient and effective with an even broader range of skills and experience," said

Col. Jim Brown, director of the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement. "By reducing supervisors, increasing the number of officers in the field and working closely with DEP's Florida Park Service, we have been able to increase service levels in the parks by 28 percent."

The statistic refers to the

number of activity hours in the parks in the first six months after the consolidation - July through December - compared to the same time period of 2011, when a smaller number of DEP officers was patrolling the parks alone. The consolidation of officers became official July 1, 2012.

"We are pleased with the extremely high level of service provided to our state parks and visitors by FWC law enforcement professionals," said Donald Forgone, DEP's Florida Park Service director. "The safety of our visitors and the environment is our top priority. With the consolidation of Florida's environmental law enforcement divisions, we have a larger pool of officers from multiple areas of the state who are available to efficiently and effectively assist the state parks when called."

The consolidation was recommended by the Law Enforcement Consolidation Task Force and sponsored

by Rep. Rich Glorioso and Sen. Jack Latvala in a bill that the Florida Legislature approved. Gov. Rick Scott signed the consolidation bill into law. The change was projected to improve service to the public and cut costs. Though the initial savings are limited, the efficiencies created will save the state more than \$3 million over the next five years and \$1.28 million in recurring annual savings.

"We are already seeing benefits," Brown said. "We look forward to continuing to enhance service and ensure that people can safely enjoy our state parks, state forests and all of Florida's beautiful natural resources."



Do not get me wrong, we have been a marvelous working team for more years than I can remember. Of course, that does not mean anything because I cannot remember yesterday. However, we have worked together most marvelously for many years, and I look forward to many more years of such marital shenanigans.

In spite of that, we have our differences. One of the great differences we have is in the definition of importance. It is a rare day in June when our definitions are united in holy macaroni and cheese. It does happen though and we both revel in those moments.

Out in the world of politics and religion, people are always coming up with solutions to nonexistent problems. It takes a good politician and religious person to spend a lot of time working on a solution of which there is no problem. Our world is full of problems, to be sure. It would be a rare day when people would get their heads together and work

on problems. All we have today are solutions. The trouble is finding the right solution for the right problem.

Only in politics and in religion can we spend all our time working on a solution that does not address any particular problem. As this stands today, I think I am just going to sit down and let it go by, because it will.

My father taught me the most important thing in life was never to try to fix something that ain't broken... or ain't broken too bad. It is amazing what a little duck tape can do to put off fixing something that is not broken too bad. Not every crack needs fixing.

Silence is golden and noise can be expensive especially when somebody else is talking. I like surrounding myself with the wonderful sounds of silence. I do not even like talking to myself. I do not listen anyway so what is the use.

Often in my life, I have regretted saying something but never, to my knowledge, have I regretted keeping my mouth shut. Yes, I will stand up for some things, but many things I will just sit down and take it. No reason to get all riled up when what people are talking about is like a breeze on a summer afternoon. It comes for a moment and then it has gone, and where it goes, nobody knows.

The apostle Paul knew what to stand for: "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage" (Galatians 5:1). If you do not stand for something good, you will fall for anything, usually bad.

Bear Wrongs Patiently

The fifth spiritual work of mercy is to bear wrongs patiently. Bearing wrongs patiently does not, however, mean being a doormat for others to walk on. It simply means that, regardless of the wrongs which we suffer, we should bear them all patiently. For example, if you have had something stolen from your unlocked car, this virtue requires that you treat this with patience and equanimity, but not that you continue to keep your car unlocked. It is more about the attitude that you have concerning the wrong done to you. We might take a lesson from the ancient stoics, who counseled that every event has two handles, as it were, one by which it can be borne and one by which it is unbearable. Remember that everything here is temporary and that liars, thieves, and even murderers really have no power over our immortal souls. Finally, consider the example of Jesus in his last days. Faced with false charges and inhuman torture and suffering, he prayed for his accusers and tormentors. We should show patience by praying for those who wrong us, realizing that they are the ones who have truly been harmed by their misdeeds.

For one is approved if, mindful of God, he endures pain while suffering unjustly. For what credit is it, if when you do wrong and are beaten for it you take it patiently? But if when you do right and suffer for it you take it patiently, you have God's approval.

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
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

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
