City passes litter ordinance

BONIFAY — The Bonifay City Council recently held the second and final reading for Ordinance 385, known as the "Private Property Standards of the City of Bonifay."

This ordinance outlines code enforcement regarding abandoned personal property, debris, excessive

growth and litter on personal property within the Bonifay city limits that is considered unattractive, unhealthy or unsafe to the surrounding residents and visitors. It defines penalties, procedures and enforcement allowed for handling such cases.

Copies of this ordinance are available upon request at the Bonifay City Hall.

Local resident and co-owner of Brumicon Scott

Watkins came before the council to request support from the city for his new website.

"This website was built for the benefit of the city of Bonifay's economic endeavors," Watkins said. "There are a lot of resources available online, and we've provided a free website to help people look for jobs, employers to find employees, classifieds, and all this is free to the public."

Watkins said he had the endorsement of Goodwill Industries, committing to post all their links to residents seeking employers and employees through the site as well as the Holmes County Public Library, which provided a link to their website.

"Things like Craigslist and Monster doesn't really work for this area because it only benefits for places like Panama City or Do-

than," Watkins said. "We've developed a site where you can get all that in one location, and it's absolutely free. There is no charge to the city, and all we ask is that we get your endorsement for support and add a link to our site through your website."

City Attorney Lucas Taylor said he would look into it for the city, but he didn't

Water rate increase expected in Esto

ESTO — The town of Esto discussed the upcoming Water Rate Ordinance during their monthly meeting Tuesday, March 5, which would increase the water rates for those using water provided by the town of Esto.

Esto Town Attorney Jeff Goodman suggested a few adjustments to the ordinance and reviewed the procedure for introducing a new ordinance.

One adjustment was the town put out a notice requesting compliance in 90 days.

"It doesn't have to be 90 days," Goodman said. "I just find this is the standard amount of days used for most municipalities I've worked with."

Goodman said in order to adopt a new ordinance, the best procedure to follow was to put a notice in the paper before the next meeting, hold a public hearing and first reading, notice it again for the next meeting and hold another public hearing followed by a second reading and approval of adoption.

Holmes County IFAS tells about local services

BONIFAY — Holmes County Extension Agent Judith Corbus and Holmes County 4-H Agent for the University of Florida IFAS Extension Niki Crawson visited the Bonifay Kiwanis Club on Wednesday, March 6, to talk about the services they provide to both adults and children in Holmes County.

"Our goal is to take IFAS information down to a county level," Corbus said.

"Holmes County is highly agricultural, and we've been blessed with an abundant food supply at an affordable price. We're working with sustainable resources, and we've got all the resources of the University of Florida right here on a county level, which can help establish things like organic farming and beekeeping."

She said there are 309,120 acres in Holmes County, 1,037 farms, 151,812 acres on those farms that include woodland, 210,000 acres of managed timberland and

45,991 acres of cropland. The market value of agricultural products sold in Holmes County is \$24 million.

"We've got agronomic crops, which is your peanuts, cotton, soybeans and field corn, and we've got livestock production that includes beef cattle, goats and horses," Corbus said. "We've also got farmers who are looking for other options, such as vegetable crops, beekeeping and organic farming and that's

"This is provided so that the public has plenty of opportunity to give their input in the matter," Goodman said. "This also gives you the chance to hear the public and give them two chances to speak their piece."

The council members agreed to put in a public notice to have the first ordinance read and public hearing at their next scheduled meeting in April and the second and final reading and public hearing at the meeting scheduled in May.

Town Clerk Jody Sellers informed the council she had received an invoice from their auditor for \$10,000 for his services.

"He quoted me an estimate of between \$6,000 and \$7,000," Sellers said. "Now he's changed his mind and is requesting \$10,000."

Goodman said there wasn't much he could do from a legal standpoint, because it was only an estimate and not a set figure given, and there was no contract to bind that price.

Goodman then advised them to have all their documentations in order to prove he had ample notification of the due dates of his work and from what he knew. Goodman said that the council had a favorable chance in getting the matter resolved in a positive manner.

The council agreed to draft a letter stating insufficient services and requested the return of owed files and to make necessary contacts to hire a new auditor, this time under the prerequisite of having a contract as suggested by Goodman.

Sellers said the town had received a letter from the Department of Environmental Protection stating that all the requirements to get the water system up to code was almost complete, but the last requirement was also the most expensive.

Town Council President Danny Powell said DEP has worked with the town before, and it was possible to get an extension.

"If you show you're working to make progress they will work with you," Goodman said.

The council members agreed to look into the request of a resident to put in a new backstop to be built at the town's park at no charge to the town.

The council also agreed to look into resident Brady Well's offer to sell his

property to the town, which has been used by visitors as extra parking during the Two-Toed Tom Festival.

Powell approved council member Darlene Madden's request for scaffolding for the soundman to use at the Two-Toed Tom Festival. Powell also requested water meter readers log their meter readings in a log on a regular basis so the town's water operator can monitor and record any major changes.

Sellers informed the council they had received several compliments about the fence donated to the town near the pond.

"Someone donated that fence in response to a concerned parent about their kids playing too close to the pond," Sellers said. "It's so nice that I've even

seen people using it as a backdrop to take pictures."

Madden gave an update on the progress of the Two-Toed Tom Festival.

For the car show, she had received several calls from participants, and she found someone willing to judge, provide trophies and a sound system with a DJ and was also willing to "hook up" with other car shows for additional support.

She said someone was willing to put in the work to add additional power to certain areas if the town was willing to provide wire and a trencher. Powell and council member James Daniels agreed to donate the wire and to look into making the needed adjustments so they can rent a trencher for \$150 and have the whole procedure done in one day.

Madden informed the council someone is donating handicap signs for parking, four to six parking signs and possibly a couple of banners in exchange for advertising in the event's flier.

"There'll also be inflatable slides, and we've got plenty of vendors coming in," Madden said. "Everything is set up for that morning's opening ceremonies, and we've got the Holmes County JROTC coming as well. Everything is coming together quite nicely."

She also said that she had used the town's Sam's Club card to purchase items for the Two-Toed Tom Beauty Pageant concession stand.

The next scheduled meeting for the town council is set for 7 p.m. on Tuesday, April 2, at the Esto Town Hall.

The council approved of Resolution 13-05, Notice of City Election, during their regularly scheduled meeting Feb. 11, which "provides for an annual election of officers to be held on the fourth Tuesday in March every year."

This year's election will be 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. March 26 and will be for the No. 1 seat, which is held by Richard Woodham, and the No. 3 seat, which is held by Roger Brooks.

The following citizens were appointed to serve at the election: Sarah Bynum as clerk; Mellie Marell, Rosalie McClain and Katie White as inspectors; and Jess Akins as bailiff.

what where here for. To help them get started and assist them in any way possible."

An example is the soil sampling service they provide. For \$7, they take a soil sample and after tested they can determine what is required of the farmer or homeowner to do what they wish to do.

"Our main area of interest is in the community," she said. "We focus on nutrition and health, food preservation, housing and homebuyer education, resource management, consumer education and balancing work and family in stress management."

In the area of nutrition and health, they work with MyPlate, physical activity/healthy lifestyles, Nutrition Education to 25 Council on Aging congregate meal participants monthly, food safety, food preservation with pressure canning classes, safe food handling and temperature testing of COA home-delivered meals.

"Not everyone knows that we're involved in the State Housing Initiative Partnership, which provides down payment and closing cost assistance for first-time homebuyers and rehab assistance for existing homeowners," Corbus said. "We also have the SHIP Homebuyer

Education Program, which is a six-hour class to make sure you're ready and able to buy a house. We're about improving the quality of life in Holmes County."

Upcoming programs include the monthly Healthy Cooking Demonstrations with the Holmes County Health Department at the Holmes County Agricultural Center, which is held at 9 a.m. on March 28, noon on April 25, 11 a.m. on May 16, noon on June 20 and 11 a.m. on July 18.

Homebuyer Education Classes will be held from 6-9 p.m. on March 19 and 21 at the Holmes County Agricultural Center.

A Beginners Pressure Canning Class will be held from 6-9:30 p.m. on March 26 at the Holmes County Agricultural Center.

A Multi-County Cooking Class will be held from 6-8 p.m. on May 23 at the Washington County Agricultural Center.

A You Be Jammin' 4-H Day Camp will be held on Aug. 7, which will teach youth the basics of making and canning jam.

"4-H is about respect. Our motto is to make the best even better through learning leadership skills, positive decision making, communication skills, problem solving skills, goal setting and responsibility," Crawson said.

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EMS emphasizes the dangers of strokes

BONIFAY — Shay McCormick with the Emergency Management Services in Holmes County visited the Bonifay Kiwanis Club to stress the severity of strokes and to help identify the signs for early detection during the regularly scheduled meeting of the Bonifay Kiwanis Club on Feb. 27.

“Strokes have become a vast issue with our quickly growing aging population. Strokes are an emergency situation we commonly refer to as a ‘brain attack,’” McCormick said

A stroke, McCormick explained, is where the brain isn’t getting oxygen or blood due to a clotting or a bleed in the brain.

“It is the fourth leading cause of death in the United State; killing 700,000 to 800,000 a year,” he said. “Women are more prone to strokes than men, and the highest risk is found in African Americans.”

80 percent of all strokes are caused by a blood clot in the brain and 20 percent of strokes are caused by a brain bleed, explained McCormick.

“There’s a chance for an 80-100 percent recovery in stroke victims, but that’s only if you act very quickly,” he said. “They need to be in the hospital within three hours of having a stroke and time is of the essence because 2 million brain cells die every minute. Humans are born with only 500 million brain cells, and it doesn’t take long to lose many irreplaceable brain cells.”

McCormick reviewed some of the symptoms to look for by remembering the acronym FAST — face, arms, speech and time.

“First check their face,” McCormick said. “It is common to see drooping in one side of the face. You can even tell them to stick out their tongue and it will droop to one side.”

The next was arms, said Joe Cloud with the Holmes County EMS, who was demonstrating signs to look for in a potential stroke victim.

“Tell them to hold both arms out,” Cloud said. “If they’ve had a stroke one arm will slowly fall because they will not have the strength to keep that side up.”

Next was speech, explained Cloud. “The best phrase we’ve found to

test as many portions of the brain as possible is ‘can’t teach an old dog new tricks,’” he said. “They’ll only be able to get out portions of that phrase, and sometimes they won’t be able to speak at all. This is another sign they’re suffering from a stroke.”

McCormick stressed that the final thing to emphasize was time.

“I cannot stress enough that time is of the essence,” McCormick said. “If you know something’s not right or if there’s any issues, don’t take it lightly. You’re loved one may need treatment and quickly.”

He said he had an incident a few shifts ago where a known stroke victim had called with signs of a stroke, and McCormick was called out to take him to the hospital.

“By the time I got there he seemed to be doing fine and was refusing to go to the hospital,” he said. “Don’t take this lightly because that was considered a mini-stroke and the blood clot moved but it is only a matter of time before the clot can move and create a larger stroke. Don’t take that chance, it could mean the difference between life and death.”

McCormick said to become familiar with your blood pressure. People with atrial fibrillation have a 500 percent

higher chance of strokes, and smoking increases your chance of strokes. Know your cholesterol level. Diabetes patients have a higher risk of strokes. Regular exercising helps reduce the risk of strokes.

EMS Director Rick Barton also joined in the discussion.

“I’ve spent over 26 years in EMS and know we’ve got some of the best Emergency Medical Technicians around who are both knowledgeable and well educated,” Barton said. “It’s a long way to the hospital, and it takes aggressive service to get the job done right.”

He updated everyone on the new ambulance they were able to obtain through a grant and how there was one more on the way. Barton also added that they recently had an update in their computer system that would make processing information a lot quicker and more efficient.

“Now we can send info on a patient with a push of a button, and we’re evolving more and more every day,” Barton said. “We’re working on getting deliberators in more public areas, such as in schools and their gyms, and we’re increasing our CPR classes to once a year even, though they’re only required once every two years.”

To the Editor:

Nearly one-quarter of Washington County's residents depend on timber or logging to support their livelihoods and families. To keep these industries stable, our elected and appointed leaders should ensure regulations do not impede the production and sale of forest products by Florida businesses.

Unfortunately, federal policies have the effect of blocking Florida wood from use in thousands of building projects across America. Many jurisdictions mandate that developers abide by "LEED" standards. These guidelines only recognize a specific form of timber that is "certified" by the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC), a program that is hardly utilized at all by businesses, foresters and landowners in Florida.

Since LEED only deems FSC wood as "sustainable," this means the timber harvested from millions of acres of Florida land certified by other programs, such as the American Tree Farm System (ATFS) or Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI) can get blocked from use in thousands of construction projects nationwide.

The federal government's promotion of only a single certification program discourages sustainability. FSC wood can easily be imported from foreign nations, as 90 percent of its land is found overseas. Many of these countries fail to meet American standards of oversight on public and private forests. Can any policymaker or government agency make the claim with a straight face that Russian, Chinese, Indonesian and Brazilian wood is more "sustainable" than that made in Florida and America?

This rural area of Florida needs to boost its local economy and cannot afford any policy that stalls economic growth and ultimately hurts consumers. A regulatory system that promotes competition in the timber industry and forest certification market will raise the amount of sustainable wood in American buildings and keep workers on the job.

February holds great significance for Prattler's family, community

February slipped away before I had written all I had intended to write on the special meaning of the month.

Feb. 16, 1906, was the date of my mother, Nettie Marie Harris Wells' birth. Not too long after her death on June 9, 1993, my dad pointed out the exact location of our mama's birthplace. The mammoth oak tree is still standing in the pasture where the Jim Harris and Minnie Eliza Cook Harris house was situated. It is just south of the Udon Pettis and Ouida Hewett Pettis home on Highway 280.

I was delighted to learn the area where my mother entered into the world.

I have reflected on the sadness of her early life, and of her upbringing, each time I pass the place of her birth.

On Feb. 27, 1908, her brother, Horace Edward Harris, was born. On Feb. 20, 1910, a third child, Byron Harris, was born to the union. The mother died during his birth and the baby died a short time later. Both are interred in St. John Cemetery in Holmes County.

This story is expounded upon in the "Heritage of Washington County" book, page 179, relating that my mother and uncle Edward were taken into the maternal grandparent's home, Charles Florella Cook and Maraih Christina Archer Cook, and reared until adulthood. Your writer will not narrate this history again, but must pay tribute to the aged grandparents for the labor of love, which could go down in the annals of family history as one of their greatest achievements in life. (The Heritage Book is once again available. Call me at 638-1016 for details.)

On Feb. 2, 1990, our brother, Circuit Judge Clyde Brown Wells, was tragically killed in an airplane crash in Pensacola during the take off of an ill fated hunting trip which was to take him and his pilot and hunting partner, Jim Loudermilk, to the hunting grounds of Louisiana. Clyde was age 57 and in his 17th year as an elected Circuit Judge. Sister, Hazel Wells Tison, wrote of his untimely death in her column, "Happy Corner" in early February.

Hazel mentioned Clyde's excellent working relationship with the press, especially during the sensitive terrorist trial he had been assigned in a case moved from Miami to Okaloosa County.

I do remember crossing the old wooden bridge on the school bus, when students were unloaded and walked across the wobbly structure and reloaded to continue the journey.

The Prattler recalls one picture of Clyde shown in a newspaper story during that trial, portraying him at the bench, wearing his horn rimmed glasses, with the caption to the effect: "Jowly Judge Clyde Wells rules on important motion." He regarded the article and the picture as an approving gesture on the part of the reporter covering the trial.

At the time of his death, he had just finished trying a murder case with the defendant convicted. Prior to departing on the hunting venture, my brother had written, in long hand, the exact sentence he intended to render in the case. It is reported that the judge assigned to the case used the notes and pronounced the sentence of the court verbatim from Clyde's writing.

On Feb. 28, 1991, Congressman Earl Hutto entered a Resolution in the U.S. Congressional Record paying tribute to Judge Clyde Brown Wells regarding the bridge at Choctawhatchee Bay on U. S. 331 in Walton County being named the Clyde B. Wells Bridge. The Congressman stated in the Record: "He was a good friend of mine and thousands of others."

Feb. 2, 1952 is a more pleasant date to remember. That is the date your writer graduated from the University of Florida. A fellow graduate, Randall Roberts, and I, always enjoy a lengthy telephone conversation on the anniversary of this experience of long ago.

On Valentine's Day in 1948, Hester sent me a Valentine Card, renewing our earlier friendship. This card resulted in a courtship that culminated in our marriage on Oct. 4, 1952.

The historic event of the opening of the new Vernon Bridge also happened on Feb. 14. It was extensively covered by Randal Seyler, editor of the Washington County News. My sister, Hazel, also gave it excellent coverage and raised her hand, among others, who report attending the bridge opening in July 1939. Lucille Marshall

Brackin, Paula Simmons Dalton, Walter Franklin (Buddy) Marshall and wife, Bessie Alma, also report attending the first opening. I told Hazel that I do not recall being present, but if she was there, surely I must have been also. I do remember crossing the old wooden bridge on the school bus, when students were unloaded and walked across the wobbly structure and reloaded to continue the journey.

While standing on Vernon Square, the site of the old Washington County Courthouse in Vernon, and the venue for the dedication ceremony, I spoke to spectators W. T. (Sonny) Cook, Jr. and Johnny Worthington. In a rather short conversation in the cold and threatening weather, Johnny requested that I do a future "Perry's Prattle" on Howard Bruner, a well loved former Vernon High School teacher. I did relate a short report of Mr. Bruner coming into the Vocational Agriculture Building when your writer was among a group of students who had been left unattended for a short time by Mr. O. Z. Revel, instructor, while he made a run to downtown Vernon. I will not call names, but suffice to say, Mr. Bruner quickly and convincingly put a class filled with unruly ninth graders back into their place without hesitation.

These two younger Vernon High School graduates probably did not know that the first basketball court for Vernon School was on the courtroom floor of the old courthouse. That is where I saw my first basketball and tried to beg off from being put into a practice game. After about the third day, Mr. Howard Bruner, the coach, denied my pleading and put me into action. The embarrassment and the humiliation that followed has remained with me to this day. I hope that I have told this story to Mr. Bruner's daughter, Joyce Bruner Bailey and hopefully to Janice and Larry (Bud) Bruner prior to their death. See you all next week.

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CLASSIC TIPS

Useful all-around tactics from world championship of bass angling

As you read this, Cliff Pace's wife is trying to figure out how much redecorating she can do with 500 grand. That's the payday the Petal, Miss., angler brought home from the Bassmaster Classic last month in Tulsa, Okla., edging out 52 of the world's best anglers to take home the big prize.

The amazing thing was not that Pace won, but that most of the top anglers loaded up on fish during three miserably cold days when most of us would no way, no how ever have launched the boat.

The pros very often beat top local anglers in their travels to lakes across the nation; in fact, only one angler has ever won the Classic when it was held in his home state, in more than 40 years of competition.

The reason, said frequent winner Kevin Van Dam, is simple enough: "In a three- or four-day tournament with a lot of good anglers on the water, the spots the local guys depend on to win for them get beaten up pretty bad. The spots that win are new spots found by the traveling anglers who rely on a lot of research to put them on the fish."

Finding fish in salt

Van Dam's tactics are made to order for bass fishing in areas such as the Apalachicola River and Lake Talquin, but they're also right on target when it comes to finding reds, trout, flounder and other saltwater species in Panhandle waters.

Because many prime inshore areas are both clear and shallow, Google's satellite view can give you an amazing amount of info that might be big news to local anglers who are not taking advantage of the technology.

In a Google Earth "flyover" you can see the bottom on much of St. Andrew Sound, East Bay, West Bay, North Bay, Choctawhatchee Bay, Santa Rosa Sound, St. Joseph Sound and other areas, and also check out every tidal creek, oyster bar, grass bed, submerged channel and pothole — even the occasional sunken boat, great "secret spots" for sheepshead.

Print out a view of spots that look promising, then check out your Navionics app on PC, iPad or iPhone and you can get a marine chart view complete with GPS numbers, mark your spots — and then transfer them to the GPS on your bay boat.

Pay particular attention to areas where there are deep holes at the mouths of creeks, cuts through oyster bars, points created by grass flats, shallow humps created by channel dredge spoil — anything that might create a feeding, resting or traveling area for gamefish. It's far easier to locate these potential spots while sitting at your computer screen than it is out there on the water.

Now you're ready to head for the ramp and "ground-truth" all those likely looking spots you've located

via digital research. Of course, time and tide have much to do with success on coastal waters.

Flats edges, grass flats, oyster bars and docks are likely to be most productive on rising water. Cuts through the outside bar, potholes, sloughs and creek mouths are likely to be better on falling water. Visit any of these spots on the wrong tide — or on a day when strong winds have altered the normal tidal flow — and you won't find much happening. And of course the monthly cycle of the tides has a big impact — strongest flows, highest highs and lowest lows all will be on the three days nearest the new and full moons each month.

Fish fast to find 'em

It's smart to copy the bass pros and fish fast until you locate the mother lode. One good approach is to lay out a spread of rods that allow you to move quickly from one tactic to another.

Most of us don't think of crankbaits as saltwater lures, but particularly for redfish, they're highly effective. So are small gold spinnerbaits equipped with a swimmer shad tail of the type known as the Cockahoe Minnow in Louisiana. And both these types of lures can be fished rapidly and still be effective. When you're making three casts with one of these lures rather than one with the traditional plastic-tailed jig, it allows you to locate productive spots much faster.

Weedless spoons such as the classic Johnson Silver Minnow also are "fast" lures; you can crank them steadily without losing their action, and both redfish and big trout whack them. And a fast-moving Super Spook or other topwater also can be a killer for larger trout and reds — the action is steadily walking the dog in a zig-zag action. Four rods, four different presentations, all of them covering the water rapidly.

The other key to fishing fast is to fish the lure only for the portion of the retrieve where you expect to get bit. If you're running a spinner through a cut in an oyster bar, the fish are likely to be in the eddy on the downcurrent side. Once you clear that area, it makes sense to take a tip from KVD and plane that lure back to the boat as fast as you can crank, so that you can quickly flip it back into the strike zone.

When you get a strike or two on the high-speed baits, that's the time to stick the Power-Pole or ease over the anchor and go to work with "slow" baits. In saltwater, an assortment of shad-tail jigs or soft plastics like the DOA shrimp or Baitbuster mullet are likely to be the ticket, or maybe even a live shrimp under a popping cork.

The idea is to hop your lure all over the likely habitat, fan-casting to thoroughly cover the bottom as well as mid-water areas. Start on the near side and work farther off as you pick off the fish close to you — that way you won't be dragging a hooked fish through the school and spooking them.

You might never fine-tune all of this to the point where you can take on KVD — but then, hardly anybody ever gets that good. However, using these tactics you can travel pretty much anywhere across the Southeast, freshwater or salt, and quickly find and catch at least a few fish.

Hooked on Outdoors

Have you ever been on a long trip with kids and heard, "Are we there yet?"

Sportsmen are about the same. Have the pompano arrived yet? Has the third foggy day in March arrived and if so are the Spanish mackerel here? Is anyone catching sheepshead at the jetties? Has the first ling been sighted?

Much starts happening when March arrives. Most of

the time, we look forward to warmer weather replacing cold weather in March, but this year the opposite occurred. It seems as we move into spring it is getting colder, not warmer.

I can remember in the 1960s during Alabama Education Association Week, my grandfather would take us to Peach Tree Creek and leave us with a boat powered by a

sculling paddle. We would have to get out on the hill and build a fire it was so cold, and that was in the middle of March.

There are many things to do this month. The steam plant or the hot water canal has opened to the keeping of legal speckled trout and the catching of bait. I think with these late cold fronts coming through, even if the trout are scarce in the hot water canal, at least you can cast net a bucket of finger mullet and take them someplace else.

For hunters who just didn't get enough during deer season, there's always turkey season. It will last about a month and will test your skill as to whether you can sit still or not. It's sit still or nothing. There's no way you can slip up on a turkey.

If you are keeping up with what is being caught at the jetties, you must have heard of the permit that have been caught in the past few weeks. Permit are not exactly a targeted species in this part of

Florida. They are the first cousin to our pompano, but about three times as large. They usually show up in the fall, if at all. A few fishermen have caught them in their lifetime, but not many. I'm not too sure of their food value since I never have eaten one, and I don't believe I have ever held one in my hands.

The bay and Gulf are muddy, and the wind is howling. It is cold, but at least it's March, so that means everything is going to be all right pretty soon.

All-Star Classic rosters revealed

East boys hope to maintain streak; girls seek 3rd win

The rosters are set for the East basketball teams, which seek a second straight sweep in the Halifax All-Star Classic.

The ninth annual Panhandle showcase will take place April 6 at Gulf Coast State College. The East, chosen from senior players from The News Herald's eight-county coverage area, faces the West, comprising athletes from the Northwest Florida Daily News' three-county umbrella. The girls game is at 11 a.m. and the boys play at 1 p.m.

Malone's Steve Welch and Graceville's Matt Anderson will lead the East boys in the quest for a sixth win overall and third straight victory in the series dating to 2005. Welch will coach forward Ty Baker and guard Austin Williams for the final time, as those Tigers' players were among the selected all-stars. Anderson will bring along Graceville guard Marquis White.

Thirteen players were chosen for the East boys. That was due to the probable absence of Holmes County's Chris Walker, who led the Blue Devils to this season.

Walker has been selected to play in the McDonald's All-American Game and the Jordan Brand Classic before and after the Halifax Classic. Athletes that sign Division I scholarship offers, as Walker did with Florida, are eligible to play in only two all-star games.

And while Walker's absence would be critical, the East has enough balance to challenge the team record total of 114 points set in 2011. A solid complement of guards who can score might be tasked more with doling out assists due to the talent on the roster.

Guards include Jerodd Blount (Cottondale), Keyman Borders (Marianna), Herbie Harrell (Bozeman), Ryan Norwood (Bay), D.J. Roulhac (Cottondale) and Kiki Williamson (Rutherford). Blount is the tallest guard at 6-foot-2 and the highest scoring with a 24.5-point per game average. The remainder of the group stands 6-0 or shorter, but their contributions will be measured by far

more than how many rebounds they can grab.

That's left to the remainder of the team with players that could leave the West with matchup problems. Baker is 6-7, Bethlehem's Austin Boyd 6-6, Rutherford's Jai Jencks 6-8 and Wewahitchka's Raheem Wright 6-3. The latter plays taller than his size would indicate and averaged a double-double for the season with 26 points and 12 rebounds.

Post play should be critical in the girls game as it has in year's past. The East picked up its first win in the series in 2007 behind spirited play in the paint and did the same in 2012 by grinding out a four-point win in putting the series at 6-2 in favor of the West.

The East will contend with Choctawhatchee's Lauren Day and outstanding guard Brittany Brown with post players Anissa Martin (Bay) and Aaliyah Coleman (ChIPLEY).

The East also will contend for dominance in the post with forwards JoJo Booker (Arnold), JoJo Carlson (Ponce de Leon) and Alexis Ware and Segovia (Mosley). Booker and Ware are both 1,000-point career scorers.

Wewahitchka's Jessica Smith also achieved that scoring distinction during her career. She joins high-scoring guards Ashley Harper (Ponce de Leon), Khadejah Ward (Cottondale) and Holmes County 3-point threat Mikayla Moore on the roster.

Coleman is one of three Tigers chosen to the East, which is coached by ChIPLEY's Heather Hingson. Guards Rakeia Sorey and Jasmine Belsler also represent the Tigers, who finished as 1A runner-up this season.

The girls series has featured stingy defense in recent years with the last three games decided by an average of five points. No team has scored more than 70 in that span. Nine of the first 10 teams scored more than 70 points in the first five meetings.

Senior standouts who weren't selected for the East roster still are eligible to be chosen as replacements should one of the roster members be injured or otherwise withdraw from the event.

Williams also informed the HCSD that their meeting scheduled for Tuesday, March 19 is rescheduled for 6 p.m. on Monday, March 18 due to "legislative conflict."

Resident and teacher at Bethlehem High School Tamra Kriser were present to ask the board about the progress of Bethlehem High School's upcoming art and music classes.

"I wanted to follow up on the request we made about a month and a half ago on behalf of over 700 people," said Kriser. "Since we haven't heard any more about it or seen anything on the agenda I thought I'd stop by and inquire about it."

Dixon replied that the school board was making steady progress on the matter.

"We're arranging to have those classes available at the beginning of next year," said Dixon. "It's far too late in the year for a change in academic curriculum."

Larry Zorn with the Facilities of Holmes County School District informed the HCSD that there was a septic tank to collapse at Poplar Springs School and the Holmes County Health Department is issuing them a repair permit.

"Things are moving along quite smoothly," said Zorn.

Zorn also informed the board that the Panhandle Area Educational Consortium Fire Inspection Reports are completed and that "most deficiencies have been met with only a few minor ones remaining."

Zorn explained that those violations that remain are in reference to elementary schools.

"If they cover over a certain percentage of the wall with paper it's considered a violation," Zorn said. "With

elementary schools you see them displaying their art and achievements everywhere and even though it's considered a minor violation they say they still have to report it."

Board members agreed to separate the overnight/out of state trips to vote on the Poplar Springs High School senior trip separately for Kolmetz.

"I approve of all of them but that one," said Kolmetz. "I'm concerned with the students going down to the beach. It seems like more of a liability, so I'm opposed to it."

The board approved of overnight/out of state trips for Bethlehem High School's Future Farmers of America Club to go on March 22 to the FFA Land Judging Contest in Gainesville, Holmes County High School's JROTC to go on April 5-6 to the JROTC State Drill Competition in Lakeland, HCSD's JROTC to go on April 26-27 to the JROTC State Rifle Competition in Fort Myers, and for Bethlehem High School's Math Team to go on April 19 to the Math Tournament in

Enterprise, Ala.

The board also approved of the overnight/out of state trip for Poplar Springs High School on May 18 through 22 for their Senior Trip to Panama City Beach with a vote of 4-1, with Kolmetz voting "no."

"Poplar Springs has been accustomed to going to the mountains for their Senior Trip," said HCSD member Jason Motley. "But we've recommended that they stay in the state to decrease the chance of liability. So you take the cons with the pros on this one."

Board members approved of Johnson signing Form 8B, which excused him from voting at the last meeting due to conflict of interest when the board voted to approve of his daughter, Tara Finn, to be hired as a teacher at Bonifay Elementary School.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Holmes County School District is set for 6 p.m. on Monday, March 18, at the Holmes County District School Board at 701 East Pennsylvania Ave. in Bonifay.



Open enrollment in the Part-time Basic Recruit Corrections Academy will be April 10 and April 25.


Open enrollment for the Part-time Basic Recruit Law Enforcement Academy will be March 19 and April 18. Students that success-
