Founder tells the story of community clinic

BONIFAY — Dianne Little stood before the Bonifay Kiwanis Club during their regular meeting last Wednesday, Feb. 26, to explain how the Holmes County Community Health Clinic came about, services provided and to look toward the future working

with the Bonifay community.

She said it was during her own hospitalization she realized the importance of community service and that she was touched by vast prayer chains throughout the community for her health and recovery. After that hospitalization, that she realized she wanted to do something for the community in return.

"I just kept thinking about

doing something, and I was speaking with a friend about ideas when she assured me that God had a plan for me," said Little. "It was during the afternoons when I'd walk with Dr. Leisa Bailey out at the hospital. She was telling me how she had been doing volunteer work at the Alford Community Health

Bonifay elections canceled

BONIFAY — Bonifay City Council approved of canceling the Bonifay City Elections during their meeting Monday night and return the original Bonifay City Council meeting date and time at 6 p.m. on March 24 due to all of the members running unopposed.

Council member Andrew Granger and Mayor Lawrence Cloud will be sworn in at the next meeting as well as a new council member, Larry White, who ran for Council member Micah McCormick's position but since McCormick didn't run for reelection White has the seat by default.

City Attorney Lucas Taylor informed the council that the lawyer he had researching Bonifay's attempt to claim BP funds was unsuccessful, saying the lawyer researched thoroughly but found no base for a claim.

Council approved of Mema & Pa's closing down their portion of the street for their annual St. Jude's Ride and approved of Chris Johnson to be hired as the new Inmate Supervisor.

The next meeting is set for 6 p.m. on March 24 at the Bonifay City Hall.

Town to pump down the volume

ESTO — The Town of Esto reviewed changes to the town's noise ordinance during their March 4 meeting, agreeing to return at the next meeting with more possible changes after review.

The town's noise ordinance was brought into review after several noise complaints were made and upon review the town discovered there was no time set for quiet time.

The town then tasked Town Attorney Jeff Goodman with reviewing the ordinance and making possible changes in which included choosing the decibel level [a unit for measuring sound], duration, description

County swaps County for FEMA Coordinator

BONIFAY — Holmes County Board of County Commissioners decided to forgo the pursuit of a County Coordinator in favor of a temporary Federal Emergency Management Agency Coordinator during their special called session on Thursday.

"We've discussed it and discussed it and now we're back to the position of County Coordina-

tor," said Chair Monty Merchant. "No matter what, if we don't hire someone tonight, we've still got to start on FEMA work."

Holmes County Attorney Jeff Goodman informed the Board that there were three who applied for FEMA Coordinator and three applied for County Coordinator.

"We're charged as commissioners to make the best decision for the county, both long and short term," said Commissioner Bill Parish. "I am in favor of the County Coordinator but I do see

an urgency to get someone hired because I see the need for work to be done quickly. The number one task of our County Coordinator would be FEMA."

Merchant said he disagreed, stating that the FEMA work itself would be a full-time job.

"We've got a lot of money that has to be accounted for and I'm afraid if we put someone in the County Coordinator position they will become distracted by the work that's involved in the

Clinic, which is a free health care clinic, and she said we should go down there and see what it's like and what it takes to run it."

Little said that was the beginning of her search for volunteers for a possible free health clinic here.

"I asked what they thought about a free health clinic here in town," she said. "So, after jumping through the hoops and talking to the people we had to (in order to) set up our own volunteer health care clinic, (the First Baptist Church) gave us the old Howell house behind the church to use. The healthcare clinic is open on the first and third Saturday of the month from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and we see people who do not have Medicaid, Medicare or insurance."

The clinic is for those who "fall between the cracks."

"There's a lot of young people who work hard with good jobs but just can't afford insurance," said Little. "As long as they do not have Medicaid, Medicare or insurance, we can see them in our clinic. We can not see the elderly because most of the elderly are suppose to have Medicare, and we can't see children because children are suppose to be on Medicaid, however we have made some exceptions in emergency situations, such as if their Medicaid hasn't come through yet."

She also said they try to stick to the \$4 drug list, and local pharmacies are helping.

"Johnson's Pharmacy is developing a formula where we stick to the \$4 list, and A Plus Pharmacy is going to give us some special prices," said Little. "We're also going to set up a fund so that if there are more expensive medications, (there may be help) through a voucher system."

Little then explained what someone could expect from a visit to the clinic.

"First, you're greeted, and then you're handed paper-

work to fill out, which is the basic paper work of why you came to the clinic. Then, you see the coordinator, a nurse takes your blood pressure and weight, and then you see the physician," she said. "We have two nurses' rooms, 14 volunteers and seven nurses. Dr. Bailey is our Medical Director and Coordinator."

From there, it is up to the doctor what course to take next, such as prescribing medication, x-rays, etc.

"Doctor's Memorial Hospital allows us five free x-rays a year with a doctor who reads them for free," said Little. "Labs are done through Holmes County Health Department. After presenting the findings with the patient, there is an exit interview. Different preachers come into the exit interview to ask about the patient's spiritual needs, talk about various churches in their area and ask if they want to pray."

Surprisingly, there's quite a bit of positive feedback, she said.

"Almost everyone has a God moment," said Little. "He moves right there. Everything at this clinic is free."

Dr. Bailey said there's a large response every time the clinic's doors open.

"We usually see 15 to 20 people over a four hour period," said Bailey. "Most of them are people who lost their insurance or people moving from Alabama to Florida and don't have insurance yet. You'd think that because of Obamacare we would become obsolete, and instead, it has been the direct opposite."

She also said she often goes on mission trips to Honduras to do similar work.

"There's this feeling you get when you help those in need, and it's a good feeling," said Bailey. "Now at home, it's an even greater feeling. Everyone is working so well together. It's a wonderful community."

and reinforcement of the ordinance.

"The town must establish a decibel level because what would be considered loud for one person doesn't necessarily mean loud for another," said Goodman. "Law enforcement has equipment for measuring decibel levels and will help set the desired level. You also need to make the times match the values of the town with violators receiving a warning for the first violation and a fine for the second, which is usually \$100."

After much discussion the time was considered to start at 9 p.m. and a possible animal clause added.

"In Washington County, there is a nuisance clause for animals," said Good-

man. "For example, how they deal with habitual barking, which there is a civil penalty for the period time the dog barks. Dogs are going to bark but this is for those dogs who bark for long periods of time, such as a continuous barking for 35 to 45 minutes at all hours of the night."

Resident Sandra Parker came before the Council to tell the Council that the noise ordinance couldn't come too soon, speaking of a local business that uses heavy machinery into the night.

"The noise is 50 feet from the building that I live in," said Parker. "This has been going on for four years and I can't wait until 3 a.m. for the noise to stop so that I can go to bed. I got

to head to work at 4:30 a.m. and I've got a daughter with frequent migraines from all the noise."

Resident Maryann Munoz came in with a similar complaint only about a local band practicing at night.

"I rarely can sleep at night due to being in constant pain, spending several nights awake and last night I was able to doze off when that noise started," said Munoz. "I called the law last night because it's never been that loud. I don't care if they practice every night, just lower the volume."

President Danny Powell informed them that this issues are what the revisions for the noise ordinance are addressing and Goodman explained that after the

changes in the ordinance are advertise, a public hearing is held and the Council approves it then the ordinance will be put into effect and enforced.

Council member Jeff Carnley gave a quote of \$1,500 to install 10 electrical plugs that would accommodate 20 vendors for the upcoming Two Toe Tom Festival.

After much discussion the Council agreed to pay for half of the expenses from the city's special projects fund and to solicit the other half from local businesses who might be interested in sponsoring the event.

The next regularly scheduled Esto Town Council meeting is set for 7 p.m. on April 1.

county. We've got to have someone who can take care of the FEMA alone."

Commissioner David Whitaker agreed with Merchant.

"I think we should hire a FEMA Coordinator because right off the bat they would have to focus on FEMA with undivided attention," said Whitaker. "I know the County Coordinator position is important but we've done well so far without one so far and we may even evaluate the applicants work on FEMA for possibly the County Coordinator position. Mrs. Wanda Stafford has a full time job and FEMA is a full time job and I don't want to put it all on Mrs. Wanda."

Commissioner Kenneth Williams said, "FEMA trumps County Coordinator."

"We've got \$20 million in road work riding on this and I say we need to do it right," said Williams.

After much discussion the Board approved of interviewing the applicants for FEMA Coordinator, inviting the applicants for County Coordinator to be interviewed, ranking the top two, ranking again for the number one and then allow Goodman and one commissioner to negotiate salary a couple of hours before the regular meeting on March 25, which then the new FEMA Coordinator will be approved at.

Board approved of tabling the hiring of the new 911 Coordinator during the next regular meeting.

Board approved of Amanda Hickman's BeautyPageant Letter Request, showing that the county recognizes the Little Miss and Miss Holmes County

Pageant, which is one of the requirements for the winner to be enter in the National Peanut Festival Beauty Pageant.

"Winners will be able to move on to participate in Peanut and also gives them the opportunity to win scholarships if they win Peanut," said Hickman. "I think our girls deserve a chance just like all the other counties."



Don't be intimidated!

We must not give in when friends, family — and even strangers — want to take control of our 'send button'

"I love Jesus, but I hate forwards!"

I looked up from my book after hearing this strange declaration from the room of my two oldest daughters.

Curiosity got the better of me, so I peeked in the bedroom doorway of Amber, 19, and Taylor, 16. There sat my oldest child, waving her cellphone, and ranting to her sister:

She'd just received a text message re-capping the miracles of Christ, ending with (and I'm paraphrasing here), "If you really love Jesus, send this to 10 people. If you don't send it, He will know you're ashamed of Him."

Most of us have received similar messages, though the content might vary.

When I was a child, they were called "chain letters," occasionally showing up in my parents' mailbox and promising "great wealth" or "healing" if they would just forward a copy to a specified number of recipients. Having been raised in the church, I know the miracles of Christ will come, regardless of the acts of man — including what we do with our email, text messages and Facebook accounts.

The method of the message has advanced with technology and, as I began receiving chain emails as a young adult, I haven't minded so much the cutesy "You're a good friend" type messages. Those challenging

my faith, or claiming I'll lose something for not sending the message on, strike a nerve, though. I once received a chain text threatening if I didn't forward it to 15 people in 15 minutes, my mom would die in 10 days.

I debated this in the way I imagine Amber did. I'm a logical person and know a random text sent to what could be hundreds of people couldn't bring eternal consequences, but... There was that brief "better safe than sorry" moment thinking, "Well, gee, I don't want my mom to die..."

In the end, I cared more about not wasting precious time and not filling up the inbox of family and friends with junk. The message went to another box called "trash." I went about my business.

That was months ago, and Mom's still around, calling daily and occasionally complaining about a junk email she received from a well-meaning friend.

Smiling, I watched Amber delete the pushy message she received, choosing instead to quietly exemplify her beliefs through her life and choices, rather than with one more press of the "send" button.

There's only one chain text I believe I'd forward, and that would be one saying it's all right to ignore those viral-type letters, emails Facebook posts and texts. Feel free to pass that on.

Sonny Waits dies in Charlotte

An email from Mr. Sid Waits informed me that Edward Shaver, known here as Sonny Waits, had passed away on Feb. 18, 2014. He would have been 85 six days later on Feb. 23. Ed was born in Tampa, Fla., the only son of Dr. Edward Franklin Shaver, Sr. and Faye O'Neal Shaver. He came to Bonifay at the age of 2 when his mother died and his father's sister, Mrs. Maude Waits and husband, Jim, brought him to Bonifay, where he lived and attended school through 10th grade. After that he attended Staunton Military Academy in Staunton, Virginia where he graduated. Many here will remember him.

Several local residents fondly recall Sonny as he was known here. Wilhemina Parish Belcer recalls that he was responsible for her getting to know her future husband, Wyatt Parish, as he and Sonny were roommates and Kappa Alpha fraternity brothers at FSU. Son Chance recalled having Sonny as a playmate and eating meals at the Waits home. He said that Sonny was a very obedient child and, unlike Son, always did his homework. One night at the dinner table Mr. Waits asked Son Chance

a question that he didn't know the answer to. Mr. Waits replied, "You'd better know that. It's on your test tomorrow."

Virginia Chance told the goat story. Someone had given her dad, Mr. Harvey Spears a baby goat which became her pet that would stay in beside the fire with them. However, as the goat grew it became more and more of a

nuisance so it was given away. It wound up at the Chance home where Son and Sonny were playing outside. Sonny grew too warm and took off his nice leather jacket and hung it on the fence. While the boys were playing, the goat ate the lining from Sonny's leather jacket and chewed up one arm of the outer sleeve and part of the jacket body. Mrs. Waits made him wear the jacket as it was for a time.

Freddie Howell didn't have a sports story for Sonny because he was more studious and played in the band, but he did remember that Sonny had a Shetland pony. One day as Fredrick and his brother Shoupe were picking cotton for some farmer near town, Sonny rode his pony out to where they were picking. The fifth grader, Freddie, climbed the fence and sat on the

pony for a bit before going back to picking cotton. (Remember that crops were fenced in that day and livestock ran free.)

Edward Shaver's obituary from Harry and Bryant Funeral Home in Charlotte, N.C., reported he looked back on his idyllic Bonifay childhood with great pleasure. After graduation from FSU, Edward Shaver entered the United States Air Force obtaining a commission through the O.C.S. program and flew 40 combat missions in his B-29 heavy bombardment group over North Korea. After the war he helped set up a B57 Canberra flight school program and wrote a booklet on flight mission planning, which was later adopted and published by the U.S. Air Force.

After active duty, Shaver entered Tulane University School of Medicine and was a member of the Phi Chi Medical Fraternity. He completed residencies at Charity Hospital in New Orleans and in Harvard Medical School in Boston, Mass., training as a head and neck surgeon. He also received a research fellowship in otology-neurology at Baylor School of Medicine in Houston Texas. He opened his medical practice in Charlotte, N.C., in 1964. He was considered a pioneer in his field of neurology in the Southeastern U.S.,

serving on the board of Mecklenburg Medical Society, the Charlotte Speech and Hearing Center, and was President of the Mercy Hospital medical staff and the Mecklenburg chapter of The American Cancer Society and many other professional honors. He volunteered with MedAssist for many years.

Dr. Shaver was described as a man of great strength and character and deep Christian faith. He was an elder, a deacon and a Sunday School teacher at Myers Park Presbyterian Church and a longtime member of the Rhodes-Johnston Bible Class. He loved God, his country and his family. A true son of the south, he was happiest on a trout stream or working his dog in a quail or duck hunt on the coast. He enjoyed competing in field trials with his Labrador Retrievers. He never lost his love of flying and piloted his own plane for years.

He is survived by five children, Edward Franklin Shiver III, Bradley O'Neal Shiver, Reed Carson VandeWater, Christina Carson Evans, James Weston Shiver, Page Carson Rogers, their spouses, his grandchildren and many other relatives and friends.

Funeral services were held on Feb. 21, 2014, at Myers Park Presbyterians Church.

Story on Charles Whitehead sparked discussion

Soon after the story on Charles Whitehead was printed on Feb. 26, telephone calls from longtime readers began to come in.

Earl Ray Kolmetz, a faithful reader called to report that after a long professional and personal association with Charles and his dad, Jimmy J. Whitehead, he never knew that Jimmy was a brother to Ivan I. Whitehead. Earl knew

the Ivan Whitehead family, dating back to his upbringing at Hinson Cross Roads, the third son of Elam Kolmetz and Cora Hinson Kolmetz. He also had two older deceased brothers, Milton and Wilton, who were well known in Washington County. He labeled the article as a "good one" and thanked me for giving the Washington County native the local recognition that he so justly deserved.

Former mayor of Bonifay Thomas Jenkins gave his "thumbs up" approval of my efforts in honoring the Caryville boy who had done exceeding well in life.

Joe Earl Collins, retired Chipley High School teacher, who was reared in the area where a sign was erected many years ago identifying the area as "Whitehead Crossroads." He stated he knew Charles only through his accomplishments in Bay County and had never thought of the kinship with neighbors, Ivan Whitehead and Mamie Whitehead Johns.

The Prattler began to feel unsure about his reported relationship after outright telling Earl Ray Kolmetz that writings by family members in the Heritage of Washington County Book on the Whitehead History named all the above as being in the same household. The questionable validity of my statement became so strong that I immediately went to the Whitehead Story in the above 2006 heritage book, and found no reference to Ivan Whitehead and Mamie Whitehead Johns having a brother named Jimmy J. Whitehead.

Earl Ray went to work for Mr. Russell Everett in the Ford Agency in Chipley in 1957 as a young man. Later he operated Tri-County Ford in Bonifay before moving to Chipley to continue in the automobile business. His last working experience was at Chipola Ford in Marianna, owned and operated by W. A. (Will) Rogers, a Wausau native. Will Rogers told me

that Charles Whitehead was a mentor to him in the automotive business, and the two maintained contact after Charles retired until a few short months before his death.

Finally, the bombshell fell when Ruth Johns Givens called me three days after the story was printed and hesitatingly and apologetically told me: "Perry, I almost did not make this call as so few people will be affected in knowing the error of identifying Jimmy J. Whitehead as a brother to my mother and Uncle Ivan." I thanked Ruth for her courage in setting the record straight, as she related some profound history regarding the kinship between the parties.

Jimmy J. Whitehead's father was Charlie Rayford (Tead) Whitehead and the mother was Della Brown Whitehead. Charlie Whitehead was gravely injured in an automobile accident in 1924, which happened on a clay road near his home in the Pondtown Community south of Hartford, Ala. Somehow, he walked home but collapsed on the porch and died.

The tragedy resulted in Jimmy and sister, Bonnie Whitehead, being placed in the home of the uncle and aunt, John Cicero Whitehead and Amanda A. Whitehead, the parents of Ivan, Mamie, Pence and Gus, who had moved to Florida in 1913. The family worshiped in an abandoned "shack" where a logging camp had recently closed. Later, Lakeview Methodist Church was established by the efforts of the Whitehead Family. Jimmy and Bonnie remained in the household

until old enough to go out and get jobs. Jimmy went into Caryville and worked in the sawmill. He met and married Pally Hodges and worked for Herman Brown, his brother-in-law in his automobile repair shop. Bonnie Whitehead married Lynn Allbress and they lived their lives in Auburndale, Fla. Years after Jimmy J. Whitehead married Pally Hodges and had Charles and Elizabeth Ann, the family moved to Auburndale. Charles had entered college in Miami, and Elizabeth Ann was in high school at Frostproof.

The date was Dec. 31, 1949, when my dad, Hugh Wells, and I traveled to the central Florida city to move the family to Panama City. This was mentioned in the first column two weeks ago. Jimmy had been hired as Shop Foreman for Cook Motor Company, the Ford Agency there. This move was obviously the springboard that gave Charles his start in the automotive business. He first became a partner in the business known as Cook-Whitehead in 1960. Later he became sole owner and sold the business in 1997 to the current owners.

Earl Ray Kolmetz recalled the many visits he had made with Charles Whitehead and his father in conjunction with their mutual business and had spent nights in their home. In retirement, Jimmy Whitehead occasionally drove to Chipley in his pick-up truck camper, parked the vehicle at the home of Valery and Cumi Williams on North Sixth Street and looked to Earl to drive him around Caryville and Westville, visiting old acquaintances of years gone by.

Thanks for all the wonderful response to the Charles Whitehead story and a special thanks to Earl Ray who raised the doubt about kinships and to Ruth Johns Givens for "Setting the Record Straight". Hopefully this article with further compensate for the absence of Charles Whitehead's appearance in the Heritage of Washington County Book under the heading of "One of Washington Favorite Sons", as he definitely qualified for that honor.

Snapper allocation meeting set

PANAMA CITY — Recreational anglers could see an increase in the amount of red snapper they can harvest in the coming years if the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council approves a proposed amendment.

The council will host its sole public hearing in Florida on Wednesday to solicit comment on the amendment, which would revise how red snapper harvest is split between the commercial and recreational sectors in the Gulf of Mexico. The meeting will begin at 6 p.m. at the Holiday Inn Select, located at 2001 N. Cove Blvd. in Panama City.

Pam Anderson, operations manager at Capt. Anderson's Marina in Panama City Beach, said Monday the allocations are in need of updating.

The total allowable red snapper harvest currently is divided as 51 percent to the commercial sector and 49 percent for recreational anglers.

"That was decided many years ago and it was decided based on what was best economically for the nation and for the Gulf states," Anderson said. "Economically speaking, the trends have changed and the needs have changed."

One big change comes from the amount of red snapper anglers can catch across the board, which has risen from about 9 million pounds in 2006 to 11 million pounds today.

The council will consider several alternatives to the proposed amendment, but it has outlined its preferred alternative as one that allocates 75 percent of quota increases to the recreational sector if the total allowable harvest of snapper is greater than 9.12 million pounds.

Others involve allocating 100 percent of quota increases to the recreational sector and shifting the overall allocation either 3 percent, 5 percent or 10

percent from the commercial sector to the recreational sector.

Capt. Anderson's Marina is home to five head boats and 25 charter boats and, therefore, supports increasing the recreational allocation, Anderson said.

Anderson said fishery managers recently conducted an economic study showing the percentages need to change based on an increase in recreational fishing coupled with an increase in the allowable catch.

"There are more private anglers, so the demographic for more quota on the recreational side has definitely increased," Anderson said.

The commercial sector operates under an individual fishing quota, a program in which a portion of the total allowable catch of

a species is dedicated to individuals and corporations.

The council will discuss the amendment further at its meeting April 7-11 in Baton Rouge, La.

"We just hope that the community realizes that it's important, that every single person that fishes in the Gulf is a stakeholder," Anderson said, encouraging all anglers to attend the public hearing Wednesday. "They have a say in it, so we're hoping they come to the meeting and give their opinion."







Crist defends Obamacare, blasts Scott

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Florida Gov. Charlie Crist on Sunday stuck to his support of President Barack's health care overhaul, saying "it's been great" for the state despite a difficult rollout.

In an interview with CNN's "State of the Union" Crist said Obama has a "compassionate heart" and predicted the public eventually would embrace the health care law.

"At the end of the day this is going to be a very popular program because it's doing the right thing for the people of our country and my state," Crist said. "The president is a smart guy and he's doing the right thing."

During the interview Crist also acknowledged Florida's economy has improved under incumbent Gov. Rick Scott but he still said he could have done more to help Floridians.

He also said the economy was helped by his decision while governor to accept federal assistance that was part of the federal stimulus package that was passed in 2009.

The former Republican, who is trying to win back his old office as a Democrat, urged members of his new party to fully support Obama during the midterm elections. Crist said Obama was "leading and leading well."

"I think that what they need to do is support him

and support him strongly. He deserves it," said Crist. "That will bring them home and unify them and I think that will make November very, very good for Democrats."

Since officially joining the governor's race late last year Republicans have continued to hammer at Crist over his support of the health care overhaul. They were quick to pounce on his Sunday morning comments.

"Charlie Crist has left himself no room to

back out of his support of Obamacare, the disaster it has already been and the disaster it will continue to be," said Susan Hepworth, a spokeswoman for the Republican Party of Florida.

In recent weeks Scott has ratcheted up his criticism of the overhaul even though the former health care executive himself has altered his stance over the past two years.

Scott, who before running for governor in 2010 led a group opposed to the

overhaul, initially said he would not implement the law, or back the expansion of Medicaid that was a part of the overhaul. But last year Scott called on Florida legislators to accept billions in federal funding and expand Medicaid eligibility. But Scott stopped pushing for expansion after GOP legislators rejected it and in recent months has returned to criticizing the overhaul.

Scott this week even took time during a Cabinet meeting to criticize poten-

tial rate cuts to Medicare Advantage which lets seniors enroll in Medicare through private insurance plans.

During his CNN interview Crist faulted Scott for not pushing harder to accept federal Medicaid funds which could have been used to provide health insurance coverage to almost 1 million Floridians.

Crist also criticized Scott for opposing federal money for high-speed rail and for opposing a hike in the minimum wage. Florida's \$7.93 minimum wage is higher than the federal rate, but it is below the \$10.10 level that President Obama and many Democrats support. Bills are pending in the Florida Legislature to raise the rate but they are not expected to get heard during the session that started last week.

'Adult' banners raise concern in PCB

— A banner plane advertising "real. good. sex."

in Panama City Beach sparked controversy last week among residents who felt those words are best kept in the bedroom. Outcry over the Trojan brand condoms banner was enough to keep it grounded for the time being, officials with Northwest Florida Beaches International Airport confirmed Monday.

Airport Director Parker McClellan said planes flying the Trojan banner now will be out only on weekends to avoid flying during school hours. Trojan also switched to the banner used during Spring Break last year that reads "Can't wait to get it on," which sparked similar controversy.

Panama City Beach Mayor Gayle Oberst said the city has dealt with complaints about the banners for the past few years, but they ultimately are protected by the First Amendment.

"We have this happen every Spring Break,"

Oberst said. "We talk to the attorney every year, and he tells us it's a freedom of speech issue. They have the right to advertise their product."

Many of the banner planes fly out of the Northwest Florida Beaches International Airport in West Bay, which enters into an operating agreement with each company to ensure they are operating within Federal Aviation Administration safety standards.

"That's really where the airport's involvement in this ends," McClellan said, noting a steep increase in banner tow companies when Spring Break rolls around. "We don't have any involvement in what is printed on the banners."

Although officials can't stifle freedom of speech, McClellan said officials from the airport, the city and the county Tourist Development Council did urge the brand to adjust

its flight path to steer clear of schools.

"We're trying to be good neighbors," McClellan said. "We're trying to modify the flight route so they still have the opportunity to display the banner but still be community friendly."

Beach resident Ashley Curtain expressed concern about the original banner last week.

"You can't get much more sexual content than the word 'sex,'" Curtain said. "What's it going to be next year?"

Curtain said she became concerned after seeing the banner flying over a children's event at the Panama City Beach Mardi Gras festival the first weekend in March.

"I think everyone around was equally as astonished as I was," she said. "I understand it's freedom of speech. Do that on the beach — that's fine — but keep it out of the schools, out of the beach, out of our homes."



Prescott joined students from across the country and heard Nobel Laureates and National Medal of Science Winners talk about leading medical research. They also were given advice from Ivy League and top





Many diseases spread between you and your pet

As animal lovers, we enjoy spending as much time around our pets as possible. It is important to remember, however, that there are a number of infectious diseases transmittable between pets and their owners. Here are some zoonotic diseases relevant to our community, how they are transmitted and what you should do to prevent them from spreading.

One of the more familiar diseases, rabies, is a viral infection transmitted through an animal bite and attacks the brain.

"This is by far one of the most serious infectious diseases that a person may get from a pet, because it is usually fatal," said Dr. Renata Ivanek-Miojevic, assistant professor in epidemiology at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences. "Luckily, widespread vaccination against rabies in the Western world has reduced occurrence of this infection in dogs and cats and has thus protected human health." However, the seriousness of the infection should be a reminder to keep our pets vaccinated and avoid contact with stray animals or animals of unknown

vaccination status. "More than 55,000 people die of rabies every year, mostly in Asia and Africa. Dogs are the source of the vast majority of human rabies deaths," Ivanek-Miojevic said.

Another fairly common disease, salmonellosis, is a bacterial infection of many animal species. Of particular concern is that pet reptiles and amphibians are often infected. Our dogs and cats can acquire salmonellosis as well through eating raw meat and contaminated commercial dry pet food.

"People can get infected by touching animals and surfaces contaminated with the feces of infected animals," Ivanek-Miojevic said. "An infected person may suffer from abdominal pain, diarrhea, vomiting and fever, and it can be life-threatening to very young people or older individuals." The best way to prevent the transmission of salmonellosis is to thoroughly wash your hands after handling animals, and to always keep your pets' living quarters clean. As per recommendation by CDC, reptiles and amphibians

should be kept out of households that include children aged 5 years or immunocompromised persons.

Our feline companions can carry zoonotic diseases as well.

Toxoplasmosis, for example, is a parasitic infection transmitted through cats' feces. Cats can get infected by eating rodents, birds or raw meat or by coming into contact with contaminated soil.

"Healthy people that acquire toxoplasmosis usually do not have symptoms, but the parasite remains in their body in an inactive state and can be reactivated if the person becomes immunosuppressed," Ivanek-Miojevic said. "Worse, a woman that acquired the infection during pregnancy may not experience symptoms, but infection can transmit to her baby and result in a miscarriage, a stillborn child, blindness or mental disability of the child." To prevent such transmission, it is best to wear disposable gloves and thoroughly wash hands after changing cat litter.

Cat scratch disease, or bartonellosis, is a bacterial

infection that we can receive from cats. Cats may harbor infected fleas that carry the bartonella bacteria, which can then be transmitted to people if bitten or scratched by the cat.

"An infected person develops a mild infection at the point of a cat scratch or bite, and lymph nodes around the head, neck and upper limbs become swollen," Ivanek-Miojevic said. "To prevent transmission of the infection, people, particularly immunocompromised individuals, should avoid rough play with cats, particularly strays and kittens, in order to prevent scratches." To play it safe, you should always treat your cats for fleas and do your best to keep them away from strays.

Both toxocariasis and campylobacter infections are spread through accidental contact with feces of infected animals. Toxocariasis, a parasitic infection of dogs and cats, may transmit to a person when the animal sheds toxocara eggs in their feces and a person accidentally swallows dirt that has been contaminated with it.

"To prevent the infection, people, particularly children, should wash their hands after

playing in the dirt or in uncovered sandboxes," Ivanek-Miojevic said. "Feces of dogs and cats should be disposed of promptly, and pets should be regularly dewormed, particularly if they spend time outdoors and may become infected again."

The bacterial infection campylobacter can be spread through food and hands contaminated by infected animals' feces. Aside from occasional diarrhea, animals often do not show significant symptoms of the infection. If a person becomes infected, they may also develop diarrhea, which can occasionally be accompanied by fever. Washing your hands after interacting or coming into contact with pets is a must to prevent the spread of this infection.

"In summary, our pets can have a wide variety of infectious diseases, many of which could spread from pets to people," Ivanek-Miojevic said. "In order to protect human health, pets should be regularly vaccinated against rabies and treated against intestinal parasites and fleas. The closer we share our lives with our pets, the more important becomes their health to our own."
