

'Voter Alert' mailer delivers confusion

Washington County Supervisor of Elections Carol Finch Rudd and Holmes County Supervisor of Elections Debbie Wilcox Morris say absentee voters need not worry about their ballots.

Both elections offices received calls from concerned voters this week after a confusing flyer from Gov. Rick Scott's "Let's Get to Work" campaign arrived in their mailboxes. The mail-out proclaimed a "voter alert," informing absentee voters already should have arrived and voters should contact the elections office if they

have not been received.

"This is causing a lot of unnecessary concern," Rudd said. "The only ballots that have been (mailed) are for the Military and overseas voters. Florida law prohibits all others from being (mailed) prior to the Oct. 2 date."

Morris added additional requests for absentee ballots should

go out within two days of being filed.

"Voters can request an absentee ballot be mailed to them until Oct. 29," Morris said. "State law mandates the earliest domestic absentee ballots may go out is Sept. 30, and they may be sent to

BONIFAY — The Northwest Florida Championship Rodeo is celebrating 70 years of "bulls, boots and bling" Thursday, Oct. 2 through Sunday, Oct. 4. Gates open each day at 5 p.m. at Memorial Field in Bonifay.

Thursday kicks off the festivities with Children's Night,

providing free admission for children. Friday starts off with the rodeo parade at 1 p.m. down Waukesha Street and Military Night starting at 7 p.m. On Friday, the family of Ox Long will be honored. Long participated in the first rodeo, placing first in "bulldogging."

Saturday will start off with a 5K Bull Run at Middlebrooks Park at 8 a.m. with a children's Fun Run at 9 a.m. Proceeds from

the 5K Bull Run will go to the Wounded Warriors Program.

The Bonifay Fire Department will host a pancake breakfast from 8 to 11 a.m. at the fire department. The day will proceed with another rodeo parade at 1 p.m. and "Tough Enough to Wear Pink" starting at 7 p.m. in honor of Breast Cancer Awareness month.

Steering Committee to begin for SR 79 project

BONIFAY — Because of the efforts of Holmes County Commissioner Bill Parish, local efforts are being made to create a steering committee to try to create a voice for Holmes County with influence in future decisions by the Florida Department of Transportation in regards to the widening of State Road 79 from Interstate 10 to the Alabama state line.

Included in the current committee are Mayor of Bonifay Lawrence Cloud and Director of the Holmes County Chamber of Commerce Mike Alvis.

After much discussion it was agreed that a declaration be made from the county recognizing the committee as a voice for the local area after appointing representatives from Esto and Noma, reviewing requirements to abide by the Florida Sunshine Law and researching more about the project.

The study for the road will be at least five years and development and construction will be another five years, putting the project completion at around 10 years down the road.

"My parents encouraged me to see the world, so on \$1,500 I bought plane tickets and visited over 19 countries including Spain, Portugal, Israel, France and England," Bomann said. "It didn't take long for me to discover the rodeo and I was drawn to Holmes County's winter rodeo. I started everything but calf

roping and then I went on to mostly bulldogging and participated for 10 years at the Northwest Florida Championship Rodeo, even placing a time or two."

He said he had seen no other place like Holmes County.

"There's no people like the people of Holmes County, and you'll never find better friends," Bomann

After weeks of recovery, the kitten grew strong — but with a penchant for tormenting our "senior cat" around the house, Lightning.

I quietly relocated Lightning to the office for his own protection, where he lived, quite uneventfully, for several months. Lightning had his own visitors, including neighborhood children who stopped in to tell him hello or scratch behind his ears.

This lasted until Cheryl Williams, president of the paper's parent company, stopped in, unaware a snowy white cat had taken up residence.

Cheryl stepped to the back of the office where I was working and, of course, that's the moment Lightning decided to skitter across her path.

"I didn't know we have a cat," she said with a bewildered smile and obvious surprise on her face. "Do we have mice?"

"No, ma'am," I replied with a sheepish grin. "See how well he's

working out?" I bit back an observation that Lightning didn't know about Cheryl, either, or he wouldn't have scampered so frantically.

All the while, my mind was resurrecting a long-passed conversation about the inadvisability of animals around a business office.

Lightning soon was no longer a fulltime staffer at the paper. My former boss was correct to instruct me to relocate my feline assistant, so I continue to help animals in other ways. Amendment reviews

Amendment review: No on No. 1

When Florida voters go to the polls Nov. 4, they will do more than choose a governor; they will decide the fates of three proposed amendments to the state constitution. The first, Amendment 1, is called the Florida Water and Land Conservation Initiative.

Amendment 1 would require that "no less than 33 percent" of net revenue from the existing excise tax on documents be spent on conservation. Specifically, according to the ballot summary, it would enable the Land Acquisition Trust Fund to "acquire, restore, improve and manage conservation lands including wetlands and forests; fish and wildlife habitat; lands protecting water resources and drinking water sources; ... beaches and shores; outdoor recreational lands; working farms and ranches; and historic or geologic sites."

In truth, there's little new here. Amendment 1 would not raise taxes. The Land Acquisition Trust Fund already exists to buy land for conservation, although its land-buying budget has been slashed in recent years. What Amendment 1 would do is provide a guaranteed source of land acquisition funds for 20 years.

That may be unwise. If voters approve Amendment 1, a significant spending mandate will be locked into the Florida Constitution. One-third of documentary stamp revenue will have to go to the Land Acquisition Trust Fund, regardless of the state of the economy or other budgetary needs. How much money would that be? The Financial Impact

Estimating Conference says Amendment 1 would commit \$648 million to land-buying in fiscal 2015-16. After 20 years, the annual sum could be \$1.26 billion.

That's a lot of money for a program — buying up more and more land to put under government control — that is inherently wasteful. In past editorials, this newspaper has applauded reductions in Florida land-buying expenditures. The state owns enough land. Some estimates put the total as high as 30 percent of Florida acreage,

all of it shielded from taxation and requiring taxpayer dollars for upkeep.

Amendment 1 would make a bad situation worse. Vote no.

Amendment review: No on No. 3

Florida has a process by which its governor can fill judicial vacancies.

When a judge or a state Supreme Court justice reaches the mandatory judicial retirement age of 70, or fails to qualify for a retention election or loses such an election, the governor can appoint a successor from

candidates selected by a nominating commission.

But the Supreme Court has ruled that "a vacancy in a merit retention judicial office does not occur until the end of the judge or justice's term." Thus, judicial vacancies may occur on the same day a new governor is sworn in. The court's 2006 ruling means the newly sworn-in governor, not the outgoing governor, gets to fill those vacancies. That makes sense. In such instances, the new governor chooses the judges or justices he or she will work with.

Amendment 3 on Florida's Nov. 4 ballot, the Prospective Judicial Vacancies amendment, would turn the process upside-down.

The ballot language says it authorizes the governor "to prospectively fill a vacancy in a judicial office to which election for retention applies ..."

Let's guess that Charlie Crist wins the governor's race next month but Floridians grow weary of him and he's out after one term. He will leave office Jan. 8, 2019 — the same day Florida Supreme Court justices R. Fred Lewis, Barbara Pariente and Peggy Quince, liberals all, are to step down because of the age limit. Crist could choose their replacements as he's walking out the door.

Under Amendment 3, "whoever is the outgoing governor on Jan. 8, 2019, will be able to appoint (the justices') successors before the incoming governor is inaugurated later that day," according to Ballotpedia. That doesn't seem fair. The process already in place works fine.

Vote no on Amendment 3.

Protecting Our Mail

What was in your mailbox today? Was there something special for you? You may not have thought much about how letters and packages leave one location and arrive at another.

The U.S. Postal Service moved 22 million pieces of mail *every hour* in 2013! Mail is delivered to about 153 million addresses in the United States.

With all that mail moving around every day, postal inspectors have a big job: protecting post office employees, equipment and customers from attacks and crime.

This week, The Mini Page talks with a curator at the "Behind the Badge" exhibit at the Smithsonian's National Postal Museum in Washington, D.C., to learn more about this special job.

What kinds of crimes involve the mail?

Our Postal Service makes it simple for us to share items and information. We can easily send a letter, a bill for payment or a package to someone.

But this convenient service also makes it easy for criminals to abuse the system. Crimes involving our mail system include:

- Fraud.** Customers may receive mail that promotes a dishonest scheme trying to **scam** them out of money.

- Theft.** Items may be stolen from mailboxes. This could include packages, or it might be a letter that has private

information in it. That information could be used to steal from the person it was sent to.

- Shipping illegal items.** People may try to send illegal drugs or other items through the mail.

- Mail terrorism.** Dangerous materials can be sent through the mail, such as bombs or poisons.

Postal inspectors investigate these types of crimes and educate the public and Postal Service employees about how to identify fraudulent or dangerous mail and stay safe.





Trusting the mail

When you get a letter or package in the mail, aren't you excited to open it? Most of us look forward to receiving something.

People don't expect attacks through the mail. They trust that an item received by mail is safe for them to open.

Experts say that violent attacks through the mail are unusual. For instance, over the history of the Postal Service, fewer than 10 pieces of mail have been found to have a dangerous chemical or biological substance.

Still, an explosive or dangerous chemical sent through the mail could hurt many people at once.

The Postal Inspection Service works with managers of mailrooms at big companies and government offices and with postal employees to teach them how to identify a suspicious package.

It also protects post offices and their employees and customers from theft and assault.



Case history: Anthrax

In October 2001, government officials and members of the media began receiving letters with a deadly bacteria dusted on them. Anthrax is the disease caused by the bacteria.

Twenty-two people were infected, and five people died.

Two different post offices, along with part of the U.S. Capitol, had to be cleaned and fumigated after contaminated mail passed through their mail processing machines.



Case history: Mail bomb

In 1991 in Alaska, a mail bomb killed a man and injured his wife. The bomb was sent to their son by three people who helped a convicted murderer plan and build the bomb for revenge.

Postal inspectors worked with the Anchorage Police Department in solving the crime.

This X-ray image is part of a hands-on exhibit in the Smithsonian's National Postal Museum. Postal inspectors are trained to distinguish safe packages from those that could be hazardous. This image reveals a shape, density, wiring and switch that suspiciously look like a pipe bomb.

Inspectors at Work

Special events

Imagine you wanted to send a fan letter to a favorite athlete during the Super Bowl next February. Did you know the Postal Service operates temporary post offices during big events, such as the Olympics or political conventions?

The Postal Inspection Service helps to set up these temporary offices and make sure they are safe. Inspectors work with employees of these offices to train them how to screen, or check, the mail.

Disasters and emergencies

After a natural disaster such as a hurricane, post offices may be damaged, and mail can be lost. At these times, victims really depend on receiving paychecks or money from insurance companies.

Postal inspectors help to return service to normal. They make sure the mail is delivered where it should be, restore equipment to working order, and re-route the mail when needed to avoid the damaged area.







The 5 acre corn maze using silage type corn dominates the landscape. With technical savvy, Bryan and a friend designed it at the kitchen table, sent it to GPS, and cut the maze with a lawn mower. Many who start such an endeavor hire a professional maze-maker to construct the maze. Five acres is a huge maze, but they assured me that there is an escape if it proves too long for some of us. The exit will take you through the country store where you may purchase apple cider, apple butter, caramel apples, fresh apples, novelty gourds and pumpkins, mums, dried corn and corn stalk bundles. Possibly some local jams

and jellies will also be available.

Ryan, the son of Ronnie and Lisa Hammack, is a 1998 graduate of Vernon High School where he was active in FFA. Ryan is basically a peanut farmer in Holmes County but has numerous other business interests. NWF Championship Rodeo pays tribute to


The Bonifay Kiwanis Club pays special tribute to two long-time rodeo families in this 70th year of the Northwest Florida Championship Rodeo. The Foy Reynolds and the Ox Long families will be recognized and participate as grand marshals during the two parades.

FOY REYNOLDS

Foy and Jody Reynolds came as contestants to the Bonifay rodeo from Texas in 1958. Foy became a RCA (PRCA) stock contractor in 1959. He produced rodeos all along the Eastern Seaboard from New York to Homestead, Florida. He produced the Bonifay rodeo during the 1960s into the early 1970s. Foy held the arena record in the steer wrestling at Madison Square Garden for years and was an outstanding calf roper.

Jody was a rodeo secretary and an accomplished trick rider. She trick rode at Madison Square Garden and the major rodeos in the U.S. She traveled to Cuba and the Dominican Republic as a trick rider.

Their family members have continued the rodeo legacy as riders, ropers and racers, including Dallas Reynolds Dewees

and Randa Dewees, both of whom will be competing this year. The family also operates the Foy Reynolds Cattle Co.

W.B. "OX" LONG

William Burvie "Ox" Long brought his family to Bonifay by horse and wagon after World War II. He had worked in Texas as a cowboy ranch hand in the 1930s and was called back to the great state of Florida by the US Government in the early 1940s to round up cattle in central Florida.

Ox and his family also bought, trained, and sold horses. They traveled to

Rodeos for completion and contracted rodeo acts, and caught wild cattle as a way of life and to make their living.


Ox participated in the very first Bonifay Rodeo in the Bull Riding and Bulldogging – called steer wrestling today – where he won first place. He knew the local people with livestock and helped provide the stock by rounding up horses and bulls from the surrounding area.

Ox made his living with horses, cattle and Rodeo. Today he passes on a rodeo legacy that is still going strong

through his children, grandchildren and even great-grandchildren, who continue his legacy with great ability and pride.







Concessions will also be available, and a convenience store will be open to purchase apple, pumpkin and other products.



Groundhogs, katydids and leading indicators

"Oh the days dwindle down...to a precious few... September... November..." — "September Song" as recorded by Willie Nelson

Pennsylvania has Punxsutawney Phil; Florida has singing katydids.

Last week a wonderfully entertaining article in the Sebring News (central Florida) described a variety of signs that we are facing an early, cold and wet winter. A primary source is the Farmer's Almanac. Mainly, though, folks around Sebring are observing nature's pre-winter activities.

One Sebring native says that katydids are singing, and this traditionally means that winter's first frost is only six weeks away. "Thick tails and bright bands" on raccoons and thick hair on the nape of cows' necks represent more signs that cold weather is coming. Crickets populating the fireplace hearth earlier than usual is another harbinger. Some Sebring natives say that considerably cooler weather is imminent when spiders spin webs that are larger than normal and find their way inside peoples' homes. Finally, squirrels are already burying acorns for the winter.

Pretty unscientific, huh? But I'll be shocked if our central Florida friends are incorrect. Animals, insects and birds can "sense" the earth's changing seasons. Anyone who has witnessed the movements of nature's creatures just before a hurricane arrives

has likely marveled at their prescient qualities. By the way, January is likely to be our coldest month this winter.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if certain events tipped us off to similar coming market changes? As my father used to say, "Would that it were." Lagging and coincident indicators only provide backward and sideward glances. For instance, a look at current corporate profits (a lagging indicator) tells us nothing about the future, because these numbers represent past performance.

Leading economic indicators may provide some front windshield views, but economists differ on how these factors should be interpreted. Many items are considered leading economic indicators by the Conference Board, including 10 that comprise the Composite Index: average weekly hours (manufacturing); average weekly jobless claims for unemployment insurance;

manufacturer's new orders for consumer goods; vendor performance; manufacturer's new orders for non-defense capital goods; building permits for new private housing units; the S&P stock index; money supply; the interest rate spread and the index of consumer expectations.

Synthesizing and applying this information, once it's assembled, is a neat trick, especially when individual leading economic indicators provide conflicting data. What's an investor or advisor to discern, for instance, when manufacturer's new orders for consumer goods and capital goods are up, but when consumer expectations and vendor performance are down? Various aspects of the economy may be performing at different levels.

Which is why all the securities and sectors of a well-designed portfolio do not rise or fall in concert simultaneously. In other words, "the Bronx is up, but the Battery's down."

The Princess nominees were eighth graders Haley Mitchell, Madison Jones, and Ivy Tindell.








