## Bonifay accepts \$50K grant, water law

**BONIFAY** – With the acceptance of a \$50,000 grant, anticipation of improvements at Eastside Park will be closer to reality.

Falling Waters State Park and Ponce de Leon Springs State Park Manager Aaron Miller was on hand to present the council with the check during a regular Bonifay City Council meeting held Monday, Sept. 24.

The funds will be used for the Eastside Park project and will include a new playground area, renovations of the existing walking trail, playground improvements, picnic areas, bathrooms, parking areas and fencing.

Also at the meeting, the council made the final approval of Ordinance 404, regarding water services.

The ordinance pertains to due dates, collection procedures, and cut off procedures of water services. The ordinance states bills are due on the first of each month and will be deemed late if not paid in full by 4 p.m. on the 15th of the month. A late fee will then be added to the bill totaling 10-percent of the bill due.

Should any bill, including the late fee remain unpaid by 4 p.m. on the 24th, immediate disconnection and cessation of services to the premises will be made. To return service to the premises, all monies due plus a \$25 reconnection fee will be required to reconnect during business hours. Should reconnection be requested outside of normal business hours, a \$50 fee shall be assessed.

Upon approval the ordinance took immediate effect. Any changes will be reflected on customer's new bill.

Bonifay City Council will meet again in regular session at 6 p.m. on October 8.

## Crutchfield: 'A living testimony'

**Sake of One supports band member to help pay for medical expenses**

**BONIFAY** – When the band Sake of One left practice on June 12 nothing was out of the ordinary but all that would soon change.

Drummer Justin Crutchfield, 28, went home as usual and an hour later his girlfriend, Hailey Bawcom, found him spinning in a circle due to a seizure. That seizure

soon led to the discovery of a five centimeter brain tumor called an Anaplastic Glioma Grade III at Flowers Hospital in Dothan.

Three days later, Crutchfield would go under the knife and have the majority of the tumor

removed. The tumor turned out to be cancerous but the doctors say it is slow growing. Crutchfield underwent six weeks of radiation and be on a chemotherapy pill for a year after which doctors are confident the tumor will not grow back.

They are doing everything they can because he is so young.

Crutchfield, produce manager at Bonifay Piggly Wiggly, paid for everything Humana Health Care had to offer, except for health insurance. Due to having no insurance, medical bills have piled up to more than \$100,000 and that number is increasing.

## Post Office runs special stamp for cancer research

**BONIFAY** - Bonifay Post Office customers can help fund breast cancer research starting Oct. 1.

The U.S. Postal Service in Bonifay, 325 W. Highway 90, will have special Breast Cancer Awareness stamps on sale throughout October. Each special stamp will cost 65 cents, 15 cents more than a regular stamp, with the difference going toward breast cancer research.

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

In addition to offering the special stamp, the post office will hold a kick-off event Oct. 1 that will include light refreshments.

"Cancer effects so many people," said Bonifay U.S. Postal Service Post Master Lawrence Fern. "This is just a small way to help those that need the help that we can give them."

The post office participates in the program every year, he said. New this year, the post office will erect a board for individuals to post photos of themselves or loved ones who have survived, battling or lost the battle with breast cancer. Although rates have decreased, about 41,000 women in the U.S. are expected to die this year from breast cancer, Breastcancer.org reports. About 1 in 8 women in the U.S. will develop the disease at least once in her lifetime.

## County unemployment rate continues to tumble

**HOLMES COUNTY** - Holmes County's unemployment rate is continuing to tumble.

While the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for August was the same as July and down .3 of a

percentage point from a year ago, Holmes County saw a .4 decrease from July and a .8 percentage point lower a year ago.

According to CareerSource Chipola jobless rate report, the region, which also includes Calhoun, Washington, Jackson and Liberty counties, unemployment rate went from a rate of 4.0 from 4.4 last month and 4.7 a year ago.

Holmes and Calhoun counties are on par with Liberty County, which saw the greatest improvement from a year ago, decreasing its unemployment rate by an entire point.

In the region, there were 1,626 unemployed residents out of a labor force of 41,278, the report stated. The state gained 220,200 jobs over the year, which is an increase of 2.6 percent.

# Laws on PTSD benefits, animal abuse set to take effect

TALLAHASSEE - Laws will take effect next week that will add benefits for first responders who suffer post-traumatic stress disorder and impose harsher penalties on people who abuse animals, along with 19 other measures signed by Gov. Rick Scott after the 2018 legislative session.

The laws taking effect Oct. 1 range from allowing credit cards to be used for background checks when firearms are purchased to doling out tougher punishment for people who steal bee colonies or trespass at airports.

Most laws crafted during the legislative session, including the state's \$88.7 billion budget, hit the books on July 1. But others had later "effective" dates.

The change for first responders (SB 376) would expand workers' compensation insurance benefits for firefighters, police officers, paramedics and emergency-medical technicians who suffer from PTSD.

The office of state Chief Financial Officer

Jimmy Patronis, who has started running a campaign ad that highlights his support for the law, announced last week the launch of training materials for first responders on PTSD.

"We've heard terrible stories about the impact tragedies like Pulse, Parkland and most recently Jacksonville Landing, have on our first responders and their families," Patronis, whose job includes serving as state fire marshal, said in a statement. "The training is an important step needed to help our first responders."

According to a 2015 article published in the Journal of Emergency Medical Services, 6.6 percent of 4,000 first responders surveyed had attempted suicide, which is more than 10 times the rate in the general population.

Under the new law, first responders who have witnessed the death of a minor or witnessed a death that involved "grievous bodily harm of a nature that shocks the conscience" can file workers' compensation claims for lost wages.

The new law is expected to increase workers' compensation costs for

cities and counties that employ first responders by upward of \$7 million, according to the National Council on Compensation Insurance.

Another new law (SB 1576) taking effect next week stems from the beating death last year of a 9-month-old Labrador retriever puppy in Volusia County.

The new law, named "Ponce's Law" after the puppy, will allow judges to bar people convicted of animal cruelty from owning pets. The legislation also increases the severity ranking of animal-abuse related crimes, making it more likely that offenders would go to jail upon conviction.

Kate MacFall with the Humane Society of the United States hopes the new law will allow judges to make sure people who mistreat animals are not allowed to repeat the cycle of abuse.

"It gives that judge discretion to say they can't have any contact with animals during their probation," MacFall said. "It clarifies that and gives the judge the authority to have that as part of the sentencing, so that the criminal cannot have contact with animals

during their probation."

In addition to dealing with animal cruelty, the new law also creates policies and procedures for animal shelters to use following natural disasters, such as hurricanes, to return lost pets to their owners.

"It puts more teeth into it. It stiffens the penalty for people who abuse animals," MacFall said. "Who wouldn't support that? This all came from a dog named Ponce, that was beaten to death last year. It was a horrific tragedy."

Other new laws going into place on Oct. 1:

--- HB 55, allows people buying guns to use credit cards to pay for background checks. They have been required in the past to pay with personal checks, money orders or cashier's checks.

--- HB 135, allows deaf people to voluntarily identify themselves as hearing-impaired when they register vehicles. The idea, which came from a Tallahassee police officer whose son is deaf, is intended to prevent communications issues with deaf drivers that could inadvertently lead to confrontations.

His band mate and cousin Braeden Cooper, knew immediately that he and fellow band mates would do everything they could to help their friend. A benefit concert was set up for September 22 at Northside Assembly of God where Sake of One would play alongside duo Gary and Chrissy and solo artist Taylor Maples. All proceeds from the concert would go to Crutchfield to help pay for his medical expenses.

With a standing room only crowd, \$5,100 was raised, neither amount - people and funds - was what the band was expecting according to Cooper.

"When we got to the church to set up we put out 80 chairs," said Cooper. "Twenty minutes after the doors opened we wound up putting out every chair the church had. We thought we would raise maybe \$500 or so, so this amount raised blows our minds. We are so grateful for it."

Bawcom says Crutchfield has taken the process like a superhero.

"He has honestly taken everything like a superhero," said Bawcom. "The radiation took a toll on him for a little bit. He was really tired and achy for a while but has bounced back awesomely."

Crutchfield continued on as normally as possible working every day throughout the times he was receiving radiation.

Cooper says they are trusting God's plan because we know everything is going to be alright.

"We trust that this is God's plan for Justin," said Cooper. "I believe he is giving a story to tell, his living testimony. I just know that everything is going to be alright."

Bawcom says she is thankful for the loving community they are surrounded by.

"I would just like to say thank you so much to everyone who has kept us in their thoughts and prayers," said Bawcom.

"Those mean more to us than anything. Justin is so incredible and has made it through this troubling time like a champ. He's kept in good spirits and constantly is cracking jokes and goofing off like he always has. I love the fact that we live in such a loving community that comes together in someone's time of need and I can't say thank you enough. His family and I are so blessed to have such loving folks around us."

Crutchfield says he is thankful and blessed.

"I am just so blessed to still be here and thankful for all the prayers and love I have received," said Crutchfield. "Although the worst is over, I just ask for continued prayers."

## Don't touch the Second Amendment

The ongoing debate over guns in America has led some to vociferously call for abolishing the Second Amendment. That's just not wise thinking. There are common-sense restrictions on guns that fall within the scope of the Second Amendment.

So there's no need to even consider abolishing it.

Nevertheless, calls for abolishing the Second Amendment are coming from such respected figures like retired Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens.

And a new poll shows about 20 percent of Americans favor repealing the Second Amendment.

In reality, that probably shouldn't be a surprising statistic.

There are actually Americans, after all, who regularly support restrictions on speech that would not be allowed under the First Amendment. So, of course, there will always be a fringe minority out there yapping for scrapping the Second Amendment.

Or the Third Amendment.  
Or the Fourth Amendment.

You get the point.

Fortunately, the anti-Second Amendment extremists have little support in Washington; even blue-state Democrats like Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California have made clear they support gun ownership for self-defense and hunting.

What's even more striking is that noted, liberal-leaning Harvard law professor Laurence Tribe also has dismissed the campaign to abolish the Second Amendment.

In a piece for The Washington Post, Tribe wrote that the Second Amendment isn't the problem; in fact, Tribe declared, repealing the Second Amendment would not limit a single gun or enact a single regulation.

The fact is abolishing the Second Amendment isn't necessary because the Supreme Court already set some reasonable parameters.

In the Supreme Court's historic 2008 Heller decision that underlined an individual's right to bear arms, the court also noted that right wasn't unlimited — and that certain classes of "dangerous and unusual" weapons could be limited.

The court also has allowed limits on assault weapons, large magazines and the number of weapons that can be stockpiled.

That's why instead of abolishing the Second Amendment, the focus should be on reducing the ability of Americans to use military-style weapons to kill innocent fellow citizens.

The focus also should be on restricting the ability of mentally ill people — and those with histories of domestic violence — to have easy access to firearms; clearly more safeguards must be built in to immediately "red-flag" such Americans whenever they try to purchase weapons.

There is certainly widespread support for that kind of proactive approach.

Gun advocates like to criticize the 1994 ban on assault weapons for its emphasis on cosmetic features; they deride it as a naive and unrealistic law designed by people who know nothing about guns.

*In an opinion piece, Palm Beach County criminologist Thomas Gabor said such poor standards of definition have undermined attempts to strictly regulate assault weapons because "the gun industry can easily make cosmetic modifications to skirt the regulation."*

Then next year when the Community Day of Service is announced Bonifay Garden Club will be a strong presence.

## Bert and Ernie Supposed to Teach ABCs, not LGBTQ

Bert and Ernie are not gay. That I even have to say this is the problem, not the actual fact that they aren't.

This week, long-time Sesame Street writer Mark Saltzman revealed that he wrote Bert and Ernie's relationship as that of "a loving couple" and based it on his own relationship with film editor Arnold Glassman.

Soon after, Sesame Workshop took to Twitter with a denial - not just of Bert and Ernie's romantic relationship but of the very concept of sexual orientation for puppets. I'm with them.

It always seemed evident to me that Bert and Ernie were not gay because of the way they dressed. Clearly, neither of them would have fit in on Queer Eye for the Straight Guy. (Though Kermit might be the Muppet most likely to be the target of a questionable

#MeToo accusation from you-know-who.)

Have I offended you with the non-PC references yet? Christine, how dare you suggest that gay men must be well-dressed? And that not-so-veiled reference to Miss Piggy and the possibility that she'd lie? How dare you! Puppets must be believed!

I'm obviously joking. Frankly, I find it easier to laugh about the topic than to take it seriously. Of course, Bert and Ernie aren't gay. They're just sweet, nebbish little animated socks who had to split the rent on a fourth-floor walk-up.

But these days, we need to worry about the backstories and implications of everything, from Supreme Court nominees to animated socks.

There is no question that Sesame Street has been on the cutting edge of diversity and inclusivity since the beginning. Over the years, the show included characters that reflect different demographics, such as Julia the autistic Muppet, and Muppets who had accents (other than the Count because there isn't a huge lobby for Transylvanians in the U.S.) and Muppets whose parents were divorced.

From the beginning, the human characters, such as Maria and Gordon and Mr. Hooper, were of different ethnicities, and some of the vignettes were in Spanish, which was very exotic for 1969, when the show started. Teaching kids from an early age that everything and everyone has value is, unquestionably, one of the most positive lessons Sesame Street can impart on its viewers.

But Sesame Street is not - and should not be - in the business of helping kids explore their sexuality. It's always been a show geared to the youngest of the young, the toddler set who were too tiny to really understand sex at all. No 3- or 4- or 5-year-old should have to deal with a topic that will cause them decades of angst later in life.

Children shouldn't be forced to acknowledge their sexuality as toddlers. That's not a burden that should be placed on their young shoulders. I call it "burden" not because we should have a negative view of different forms of sexuality, but because children should not have to think about those concepts while trying to figure out what number comes after "7" or what letter comes after "K."

## 150 Years of 'Little Women'

### Mini Fact:

Louisa May Alcott was **ambidextrous**: She could write with both hands.

Do you have heroes who are fictional characters? Whether it's Harry or Hermione, Katniss or Gale, there are many boys and girls in books and movies today who are worthy of our admiration.

In 1867, there weren't so many female characters for girls to read about and admire. A wise publisher, Thomas Niles, thought girls would like to read about characters like themselves, so he wrote to a young author, Louisa May Alcott, to see if she would write a book for girls. "Never liked girls or knew many, except my sisters," Alcott wrote.

But Alcott did like to make money, so she set about writing the story of the March sisters, also known as "Little Women."

A year later, the first part of her famous book was published, with the second part following in January 1869. This week The Mini Page celebrates 150 years of "Little Women" and the author behind the classic.

### Louisa's life

Louisa May Alcott was born in 1832 in Germantown, Pennsylvania. She grew up as one of four sisters. Their father, Bronson Alcott, was an educator and philosopher, and the family moved around a lot.

She and her sisters worked from an early age, as her father didn't make enough money to support the family. The girls sewed and

took care of children, and Louisa wrote and sold stories and articles to make money.

### The sisters

In "Little Women," Alcott, her sisters and their mother are the main characters. She named the girls Meg (her sister Anna), Jo (herself), Beth (Lizzie) and Amy (May). Their mother is known as Marmee.

While there are differences between the book and Alcott's real life, many of the events in the story come from actual facts. For example, in the book, Amy is an artist. In real life, May was also an artist.

### Louisa and Jo

The character Jo is different from others in the book. She is tall and sometimes clumsy, rather than small and ladylike. She likes to run and play sports. Her best friend is a neighbor boy, Laurie (short for Laurence), and as an adult, Jo is not interested in marrying. Jo thought boys were more free to be themselves than girls.

Alcott modeled Jo after herself; although Jo finally does marry in the book, Alcott herself never did. She took in her sister May's daughter after May died, and she loved her nieces and nephews, but she was not interested in having a husband.

### After 'Little Women'

In her time, Louisa May Alcott became as popular as "Harry Potter" author J.K. Rowling is today, according to experts. Her book made her one of the wealthiest women in the United States.

In 1933, the first of many movies was made of the famous story.

### Lessons of 'Little Women'

Alcott's book is about family and how the sisters worked together to help provide for each other. Her characters are all very different, but they love and support each other, especially through terrible times or conflicts.

## Cook's Corner

### Dressed-Up Broccoli

# Deputy fired for planting drugs

More than 250 criminal cases in question after review of body cam video

PANAMA CITY — Prosecutors are reviewing more than 250 criminal cases involving Jackson County Sheriff's Office Deputy Zachary Wester after video emerged in the past month of him planting drugs in a vehicle during a traffic stop.

Wester, 26, of Marianna, was fired Sept. 10 after more than two years as a patrol deputy with JCSO. His career now is under investigation by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) after evidence arose that he had planted drugs during a February traffic stop in Marianna. As that investigation proceeds, the 14th Judicial Circuit State Attorney's Office is reviewing more than 250 cases to determine Wester's role and whether any misconduct took place.

State Attorney Glenn Hess said his office so far has identified 263 cases in which Wester played a role, either as the lead officer, backup or an essential witness. Prosecutors said they have identified 10 cases that involved misconduct

in which incarcerated people's sentences will need to be vacated, and 15 pending cases that have or will be dismissed. When FDLE concludes its investigation at an undetermined date, authorities will decide whether to pursue criminal charges against Wester.

"It's speculation," Hess said. "But if you're accusing someone of planting drugs, they must have possessed drugs. And I don't know of any provision in the law that authorizes a deputy to possess drugs outside of evidence they seize in the pursuit of an investigation."

Hess said FDLE came to his office days ago to brief him and senior prosecutors about an investigation into Wester. During that briefing, Hess said he viewed a video and

photographs from a traffic stop that resulted in the arrest of a woman on narcotics possession charges.

"The things I saw in the video caused me concern about his professionalism," Hess said. "As a result of that, I made the decision not to accept any cases in which he was participating. We also undertook a review of all cases made in the past two years by that officer and have been taking steps to correct a situation that is unacceptable."

The video released Thursday by the SAO dates back to a traffic stop on Feb. 5 in Marianna, in which Teresa Odom was arrested after Wester said he found a baggie of methamphetamine in her vehicle.



The entire traffic stop was recorded on Wester's body camera and later aroused concern by the prosecution and defense attorney. They took the information to Jackson County Sheriff Lou Roberts, who began an internal investigation and called in FDLE to conduct an independent investigation. Roberts declined to comment on the case, as the FDLE investigation is ongoing. However, Wester has been fired after two years with JCSO. Before then, he worked as a Liberty County Sheriff's Office deputy from August 2015 until

he joined JCSO. On Tuesday, prosecutors asked Circuit Judge Christopher Patterson in open court to vacate the sentence of Odom, the woman whose drug possession arrest was caught on body camera video. Patterson agreed.

According to court records, Odom was on pretrial release from an earlier stolen property charge when Wester arrested her on Feb. 15. The new arrest prompted a judge to revoke her bail, which kept her behind bars for more than a month until the resolution of the drug case. She pleaded no contest to the drug charges brought by Wester on March 6 and was sentenced to four years of probation.

It wasn't immediately clear how many other defendants

might be in jail or prison as a result of alleged misconduct by Wester. Hess said he has an attorney working full time to review cases brought by Wester and expects more charges to be dismissed because of misconduct.

"Cases that are good cases and are viable, that do not involve any questionable conduct, go forward in the court system," he said. "Those that are questionable, the benefit of the doubt goes to the defendant."

Hess said the scope of misconduct involved in this case is unprecedented in the circuit and possibly across Florida.

A motive behind the evidence tampering has yet to be established and there did not appear to be any common themes among the cases.

--- HB 523, increases penalties to a third-degree felony for people who trespass on airport property to injure other people, damage property or impede the operations of aircraft. The bill is in reaction to instances since 2014 of people getting on property at Florida airports, including Orlando International, Tampa International and Miami International.

-HB 961, allows businesses such as bars to receive up to 10 cases of branded glassware --- 24 glasses per container --- a year from brewers or importers. Supporters of the "beer glass" bill maintained that the change would allow small businesses to save on the cost of glassware. But a number of craft brewers opposed the measure, arguing it would allow a small number of brewers who could afford the costs to flood the market with company-branded glassware.



### Bonifay council meeting

## City budgets \$459,401

The Bonifay City Council Monday night approved a tentative budget for the 1977-78 fiscal year totaling \$459,401.33, not including the budget for federal revenue sharing funds. A federal revenue sharing budget will be prepared when the city has been notified of the amount it will receive.

No increase in local taxes was necessary to finance the budget. Anticipated receipts from city taxes include \$57,586 from a ten percent utility tax, \$19,000 from Gulf Power Co. franchise tax, \$4,100 from occupational licenses and \$6,500 from road and bridge tax rebated by the county.

Receipts from other government units expected by the city include \$90,000 from state revenue sharing, \$19,000 in cigarette taxes and \$20,000 from the Board of County Commissioners for fire protection.

Water receipts, tap-in fees and fire hydrant rental fees are expected to bring in \$72,297 to the city. They also expect to collect \$29,700 from garbage fees and \$31,200 for sewer service and tap-in fees.

Major expenditure items in the budget include:

- Administration, \$57,860; street department, \$70,880; police department, \$56,900; recreation, \$4,000; fire department, \$10,570; water fund, \$80,829; sanitation fund, \$32,700; sewer system, \$36,900.

The council gave its approval to Holmes Farmers Cooperative, Inc. to install a farm supply store on a tract of land just west of the I & N railroad depot between Bonfill Ave. and the railroad tracks.

The city also agreed to relocate Still St. to the property boundary line just slightly northwest of its existing location in exchange for an easement for a street that would connect McGee and Hangeline streets.

If the city can cross the railroad tracks at this location, it will provide a thoroughfare from Highway 90 to Holmes County High and Bonifay Elementary School.

A proposal by Sheriff W. C. (Ben) Jones asking the city to pay the Board of County Commissioners \$7,500 during the coming fiscal year was discussed, but no action was taken. The sheriff proposed to provide one full-time radio dispatcher, room, board, medical bills and lockup fees for city prisoners for the money.

Kenneth Fleming appeared before the council and requested an extension of the city limits to include his property on State Road 79 south of Bonifay where he is building a Best Western motel. Councilman Pat Kelly made a motion to this effect, but it died for lack of a second.

Fleming then asked the council for permission to pump liquid wastes into the city's sewer line, such as had been granted to Simbo's Restaurant and Rich's.

### Franklin named to School Board

C. R. Franklin of Rt. 2, Graceville has been appointed to fill the unexpired term on the Holmes County School Board left by Glynn Meadows, according to Gov. Reubin Askew's office. Meadows, who died July 26, was the School Board Member from District 5.

Franklin will take office as soon as he signs the commission, according to a spokesman for the governor. The term will expire next year.

Franklin is a farmer in the Poplar Springs community and operates a farm supply and equipment business in Graceville. He is 59 years old and has four grown children.

According to Franklin, he has never been a candidate for public office. He previously served for about three years as a member of the board of trustees for Holmes County Hospital.

### Owens arrested on two charges

Earl Owens, 54, of Rt. 2, Geneva, Alabama was arrested Tuesday by the Holmes County Sheriff's Department and charged with aggravated assault and false imprisonment.

The charges arose out of an incident that occurred August 20 at the L & E Country Club, which Owens owns, in the northern part of Holmes County.

Owens allegedly pulled a gun on Mitchell Goodson and Talmadge Fleming after becoming angry with them, according to a spokesman for the Holmes County Sheriff's Department. He subsequently shot Gary Laquet Sanders in the upper part of the leg.

After the shooting, Owens is alleged to have gone outside the club where he held 12 people, including Sanders, inside with a gun on the door. About 30 minutes later he agreed to let Sanders and his family out to go to the hospital. Others inside also left at that time, the spokesman said.

Owens' club had been closed for several months prior to the shooting as the result of another shooting incident in which a man was killed.

Owens was released from jail on bonds of \$1502 for each of the charges.

### County gets 6 CETA jobs

The Holmes County Board of County Commissioners has announced the receipt of several new Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) contracts for fiscal year 1977-78, which will provide six new jobs.

The new contracts will give the county a total of 61 persons employed under the CETA program on grants from Titles VI, VII and Special Projects Title VI totaling \$416,345, according to County Coordinator Sid Lenz.

New positions to be available October are:

- Clerk/typist for the Holmes County Planning Commission; assistant bookkeeper for Tri-County Community Council; records and delivery clerk for Holmes County School Board; assistant social worker for State Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; clerk/typist for Town of Noma; and motor vehicle operator for Board of County Commissioners.

Persons who are interested in these jobs and can qualify under the CETA regulations may get an application from Lenz's office on the second floor of the court house.

### REA meeting set for October 8

Three trustees for Districts 4, 5 and 6 are to be elected at a membership meeting of the West Florida Electric Cooperative in Graceville Oct. 8, according to acting manager Adell Miles.

The trustee post from District 4, encompassing the Graceville area, is held by Howard W. Birge.

The District 5 post was recently vacated by Lee L. Speers, who was determined to be residing outside the district.

The post from District 6, including much of rural Washington County, is occupied by Grady Windham.

Trustees may be candidates to succeed themselves, said Miles. He said the board of trustees consists of nine members from as many districts, plus one minority representative elected from the service area at-large.

The holdover trustees are:

- Monroe Yoder, District 1; Roy H. Young, District 2; Ben Floyd Jr., District 3; Henry J. Burn, District 7; C. W. Gilbert, District 8; Thomas Strickland, District 9; and A. H. Bowers, minority representative at-large.

The cooperative, with headquarters in Graceville, provides electric service to rural residents and some small municipalities in Jackson and Holmes counties, Northern Calhoun County and about two-thirds of Washington County.

The meeting will begin at 8 a.m. and will continue past noon, when lunch will be served.

### County to pay \$200 for fire call

The Board of County Commissioners unanimously approved an agreement with the City of Bonifay at their regular meeting last week to pay \$200 for each response to a fire outside the city limits of Bonifay.

The agreement states that the Holmes County Sheriff's Department will dispatch the fire department and that the fee will be paid on a quarterly basis. Term of the agreement is for one year beginning Oct. 1, 1977.

Also approved unanimously by the board was a motion to borrow money through the issuance of state bonds to resurface all roads in the county that need it. No decision was made on how much money is to be borrowed nor the term of the bonds, which are expected to be issued with a pledge of repayment from proceeds of the fifth and sixth cent gasoline tax.

The decision to use the county's bonding capacity was made after a group of citizens from Westville appeared before the board to complain about the condition of County Road 179-A (river road).

Re-appointed to the Holmes County Development Commission were Howard Strickland from District 5, and Mrs. Bette Majors and Mrs. Marie Padgett from the county at large.

A gun permit was approved for David Wayne Sanders, provided it is cleared by Sheriff W. C. (Ben) Jones.

A. V. (Duck) Carroll and Kelly Swindle were designated to be in charge of procurement of surplus property for the county and also as county energy officers.

The Army Corps of Engineers was authorized by the board to designate areas in the county as prone to flooding. This will enable residents in these areas to obtain flood insurance, according to County Clerk Cody Taylor.

Taylor was authorized by the board to sign a commitment for the county to provide in-kind services of \$1,500 in house rental for the Council on Aging. Commissioners Charles Owens voted against the motion.

The board approved a resolution requesting state aid from the Local Government Comprehensive Planning Act Assistance Fund to help the county pay for expenses it anticipates in preparing a county-wide plan for growth and development. The county will be eligible for up to \$17,000 in state funds from this source, according to Taylor.



## Struggles on the side

Why the 'gig' economy may not be the workforce of the future

WASHINGTON — The "gig" economy might not be the new frontier for America's workforce after all.

From Uber to TaskRabbit to YourMechanic, so-called gig work — task-oriented work offered by online apps — has been promoted as providing the flexibility and independence that traditional jobs don't offer. Yet the evidence is growing that over time, these jobs don't deliver the financial returns many workers expect.

And they don't appear to be reshaping the workforce. Over the past two years, pay for gig workers has dropped, and they are earning a growing share of their income elsewhere, a new study finds. Most Americans who earn income through online platforms do so for only a few months each year, according to the study by the JPMorgan Chase Institute released Monday.

The study, along with other research, points to

three conclusions about the gig economy:

**Don't believe hype**

Online work platforms took off after Uber's founding in 2009. They benefited from a weak economic recovery that had left millions of Americans unemployed and desperate for work. The initial popularity of gig work prompted a rash of speculation that independent workers — freelancers as well as gig workers and contractors — would soon occupy a steadily larger portion of the workforce. In October, a study by the Freelancers Union and Upwork, a freelancing website, predicted that a majority of U.S. workers would be freelancers by 2027. Yet the JPMorgan Chase Institute's report casts doubt on that likelihood. It found that among drivers, 58 percent work just three months or less each year through online economy websites. These include ride-hailing services such as Uber and Lyft as well as delivery drivers and movers who find work through online apps. Amazon, for example, now uses independent drivers to deliver some packages.

### Falling pay hurts

The number of gig workers has grown substantially in the past five years, the institute found, but growth is slowing. Among drivers, a flood of competition on sites like Uber and Lyft has led to lower pay. In March 2018, about 1.6 percent of families participated in the gig economy, equivalent to about 2 million households, the study said. That is barely up from 1.5 percent a year earlier. Drivers for Uber, Lyft and other platforms now collectively earn only about half as much each month as they did five years ago, the institute said. Average monthly incomes have fallen from \$1,535 in October 2012 to just \$762 in March of this year, not adjusted for inflation. That drop likely reflects the fact that many drivers are probably working fewer hours, Grieg said.

Many have probably found other sources of income as the job market has strengthened.

### Online-platform companies are evolving

So far, these trends don't appear to be harming most of the online platform companies themselves. Uber is still growing and preparing to sell shares to the public. Some other sites are forming partnerships with larger retailers. The JPMorgan Institute study found that transportation is increasingly the dominant force in the gig economy. Driving makes up 56 percent of all gig work, up from just 6 percent in 2013. Selling items through such online sites as eBay and Etsy has sunk to 19 percent of gig work, down from 72 percent. "It's really those transportation

platforms that have grown tremendously and now represent the lion's share of the dollars and participation," Grieg said. Uber is still reporting rapid expansion. Its revenue jumped 63 percent to \$2.8 billion in the April-June quarter from a year ago. Other platforms are being bought or are linking up with larger companies. Furniture retailer Ikea purchased TaskRabbit last year. Walmart has developed a partnership with Handy; both sites enable consumers to pay people for odd jobs like home repairs or furniture assembly.

The new partnerships may spur more growth for companies like TaskRabbit. Yet the odd jobs platforms have never attracted as many workers: Just 0.1 percent of households earned income through companies like TaskRabbit in March 2018, the institute found.

## Global stocks dip on China report

NEW YORK — Global stocks took small losses Monday after China reportedly pulled out of trade talks with the U.S. Industrial companies and banks suffered some of the worst declines among American stocks.

The U.S. and China officially began taxing larger amounts of each other's goods Monday, and the Wall Street Journal reported that China pulled out of talks that could have led to a new round of negotiations to end the trade war.

The U.S. is now taxing another \$200 billion in Chinese imports at a rate of 10 percent, and China added taxes of 5 to 10 percent on \$60 billion in U.S. products. Oil prices jumped after OPEC decided not to produce more oil.

Technology and health care companies rose, leaving U.S. indexes only slightly lower.

"The market's been remarkably resilient over the last couple of months while trade tensions were heating up," said Terry Sandven, chief equity strategist at U.S. Bank Wealth Management.

Sandven said the trade spat will endure past the midterm elections in November, but stocks are likely to keep rising because of strong earnings growth for U.S. companies, combined with low inflation and low interest rates.

After a volatile stretch early this year, the S&P hasn't risen or fallen 1 percent in a day since late June.

Sandven noted that this year's stock gains have been concentrated in technology, retail and health care companies. That was the case Monday, as Apple gained 1.4 percent to \$220.79 and drug and infant formula maker Abbott Laboratories advanced 3.5 percent to \$71.44.

Sandven said it would be an encouraging sign for the market if other sectors do better.

OPEC and key allies like Russia decided not to increase their oil output further. Production is falling in some OPEC nations, including Iran, which faces new sanctions from the U.S.

Benchmark U.S. crude gained 1.8 percent to \$72.08 a barrel in New York while Brent crude, the international standard for oil prices, rose 3 percent to \$81.20 a barrel in London, its highest price in more than three years.

Airlines and other transportation companies fell as investors anticipated they will have to pay higher prices for fuel.

## US, China hike tariffs as trade row intensifies

BEIJING — China and the United States imposed new tariff hikes on each other's goods Monday and Beijing accused Washington of bullying, giving no sign of compromise in an intensifying battle over technology that is weighing on global economic growth.

U.S. regulators went ahead with a planned 10 percent tax on a \$200 billion list of 5,745 Chinese imports including bicycles and furniture. China's customs agency said it responded at noon by beginning to collect taxes of 5 or 10 percent on a \$60 billion list of 5,207 American goods, from honey to industrial chemicals.

The conflict stems from U.S. President Donald Trump's complaints Beijing steals or pressures foreign companies to hand over technology.

American officials say Chinese plans for state-led development of global competitors in robotics and other technologies violate its market-opening obligations and might erode U.S. industrial leadership.

China's leaders offered to narrow their politically sensitive, multibillion-dollar trade surplus with the United States by purchasing more natural gas and other American exports. But they have rejected pressure to

change industry plans the communist leadership sees as a path to prosperity and global influence.

Monday's tariff hike follows a report by The Wall Street Journal that Chinese officials pulled out of a meeting to discuss possible talks proposed by Washington. The Chinese government had given no public indication whether it would accept the invitation.

Envoys last met Aug. 22 in Washington but reported no progress. With no settlement in sight, forecasters say the conflict between the two biggest economies could trim global growth through 2020.

On Monday, the ratings agency Fitch cut its forecasts for next year's Chinese and global economic growth by 0.1 percentage points to 6.1 percent and 3.1 percent, respectively.

"The trade war is now a reality," said Fitch's chief economist, Brian Coulton, in a report. "The downside risks to our global growth forecasts have also increased." Earlier, the two sides imposed 25 percent penalties on \$34 billion of each other's goods in July and another \$16 billion in August. Business groups say American companies also report Chinese regulators are starting to disrupt their operations through slower customs clearance and more environmental and other inspections.
