## Scott warns of hurricane 'devastation,' storm surge

TALLAHASSEE — Hurricane Michael, swiftly moving north through the Gulf of Mexico, is growing more dangerous as it is set to bring "devastation" Wednesday to parts of the Florida Panhandle and Big Bend region, Gov. Rick Scott said Tuesday morning.

Scott, after getting a briefing at 8 a.m. at the State Emergency Operations Center, urged people who plan to evacuate to do so Tuesday morning, as he continued to expand the activation of the Florida National Guard in advance of Michael's landfall.

Tolls have been lifted in Northwest Florida to ease evacuation, and Scott said fuel distribution is being watched, though there haven't been "widespread fuel shortages or outages." Motorists were lined up before 7 a.m. Tuesday at gas stations across Tallahassee.

Scott said his main concern from the rapidly developing hurricane is storm surge, which the National Weather Service estimates could reach eight to 12 feet between Indian Pass in Gulf County and Cedar Key in Levy County and top six feet from Crystal River in Citrus County to the Okaloosa-Walton County Line.

"Hurricane Michael is a massive storm that could bring total devastation to parts of our state, especially in the Panhandle," Scott said. "Think about destruction we've seen before with storms like Hurricane Irma. Hurricane Michael poses a deadly threat."

As of 8 a.m., Michael was located about 395 miles south of Panama City, moving north-northwest at 12 mph with maximum sustained winds of 100 mph, a Category 2 hurricane.

A hurricane warning is in effect from the Alabama-Florida state line east to the Suwannee River.

Scott, who on Monday ordered the closure of state offices in 35 counties, has activated 2,000 members of the Florida National Guard.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission has 120 wildlife officers ready for search-and-rescue operations. The

## BPD officer sells drugs out of patrol car, arrested

BONIFAY — A Bonifay Police Officer was recently arrested for selling drugs out of his patrol car.

Dwayne Frazier White, 48, was arrested Friday night at the Bonifay Police Department after an investigation from Florida Department of Law Enforcement last month.

"Earlier this month, FDLE agents made a controlled purchase of opioid tablets from White," an

his marked patrol vehicle, while in uniform and was using his personal cell phone to facilitate the drug deals."

Holmes County Sheriff's Office requested the investigation after receiving a tip that White was selling

prescription opioid tablets.

White was charged with selling a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of an assisted living facility and unlawful use of a two-way communication device and is being housed at the Walton County Jail.

The Office of the State Attorney, 14th Judicial Circuit is prosecuting this case, the release stated. Holmes County Sheriff's Office and Bonifay Police Department are assisting with this investigation.

### County issues state of emergency as Hurricane Michael approaches

BONIFAY — As Hurricane Michael opens wide on the Gulf Coast, officials are reminding residents to use precaution and not take the storm lightly.

"People should take it seriously," said Adrienne Owen, acting director and program assistant at Holmes County Emergency Management Office.

Holmes County county officials met Monday late afternoon to discuss plans and preparations, following a weather briefing from the National Weather Service.

As a result of the meeting, the EOC activated to Level 1 on Tuesday after Holmes County Board of County Commissioners issued a state of emergency.

"I urge citizens to take this storm seriously," said Holmes County Sheriff John Tate. "I believe this is one of the worst storms we have seen in a while. We encourage people to seek shelter early and not to wait to try and leave in

the middle of the storm. Should anyone need assistance with getting out, contact Holmes County Sheriff's Office or EOC."

Although there were no evacuation orders for Holmes County, residents in mobile homes or unsafe structures were urged to make other arrangements. Also, officials said local residents, if an evacuation was to be ordered, should seek out alternative evacuation routes if roads are obstructed.

The county opened a pet-friendly general population and special needs shelter Tuesday morning

## PDL swears in new member, recognizes mayor

PONCE DE LEON — Ponce de Leon Town Council swore in a new council member and Mayor Ron Farrington was recognized for his long standing service when they met in regular session on October 4.

Rachel Montgomery was appointed to fill the seat left vacant when Larry Coaker resigned for health reasons. Montgomery was sworn in by the council's attorney, Lyndia Spears.

A representative from the Florida League of Cities, Sharon Berrian, presented Farrington with a plaque and a pin for his 20 years of service to the town.

"Mr. Farrington has served his town for 20 years and has served them well," said Berrian. "This recognition is well deserved."

The council approved a resolution from FDOT for a Small Community Outreach Program grant to resurface the Pirates Cove Road. Work on the project is expected to begin soon.

The 2018-2019 proposed budget was also approved. Totaling \$1,050,810, the budget includes a three percent pay increase for the town employees, a \$25 monthly increase in council salaries, and a \$20,000 increase in repairs and maintenance budget.

The general election for the town will not take place as no-one qualified save for the incumbents. Those seats will be retained by Denise Serigne, Marilyn Haney, and George

**Safe Driving Tips**

Florida Highway Patrol

The Florida Highway Patrol would like to remind motorists that during the storm, please stay off the roadways during possible tropical storm force winds. Please follow the below tips for the next several days as we, experience possible tropical storm force winds.

- **Slow down** – The roads remain slick after the storm so if you have to drive, decrease your speed to avoid hydroplaning.
- **Buckle up** – When it is finally safe to venture out, take the extra time to buckle your seatbelt. It is the law in Florida, and statistics continue to show that seatbelts save lives. Four of the reported deaths related to Tropical Storm Fay involved motorists who were not wearing their seatbelts.
- **Be cautious of high winds** – Windy conditions adversely affect all vehicles, particularly high profile vehicles, such as buses and trucks, as well as motorcycles. Gusty wind makes driving difficult, especially when it is rapidly changing speed and direction.
- **Turn Around; Don't Drown** – Prepare for standing water. Never drive through flooded areas, even if you are familiar with the roads. The area of roadway you cannot see beneath the water may be washed out or the water may conceal debris, tree branches or even power lines.
- **Traffic Lights** – You may come up on an intersection that is no longer controlled by a traffic control device. If a police officer is directing traffic, follow their directions. Otherwise, treat the intersection as you would treat an intersection governed by a four-way stop sign.

at Poplar Springs School, 3726 Atomic Drive, in

Graceville. A general population only shelter was opened at New Hope Volunteer Fire Department, 1969 Highway 2, in Westville.

If you go to a shelter, you will need to bring

the following with you: medical records, food, medicines, and any other essentials needed for your pet. No reptiles allowed.

County Commissioner Clint Erickson is hunkering down with his family for the storm. By Tuesday morning, he had already fueled up several gallons for his generator, stocked up on water and cleaned debris around his home.

He encouraged Holmes County residents to be as cautious as the storm headed toward the region Wednesday, and to be patient in its aftermath.

“After the storm comes through, lets be patient with the power companies,” he said. If there’s any resident that needs help, call our emergency management office.”

Residents in need of transportation to getting to one of the local emergency shelters, may contact Holmes County Sheriff’s Office or Emergency Management by calling the Holmes County Communications Centers at 850-547-3681, Option 1. Officials urge those in need of transportation to make arrangements with the offices as soon as possible.

Also, county officials direct non-emergency calls, such as a downed tree, to the Sheriff’s Office at 850-547-3681 or the EOC at 850-547-1112.

Florida Highway Patrol has 350 troopers working 12-hour shifts.

A major concern also is restoring electricity after what is expected to be widespread power outages. Duke Energy has 5,000 workers ready to deploy, and Gulf Power has 3,000 personnel on standby.

Unlike with the powerful and deadly Hurricane Irma last year that ran up the state, Scott has left evacuation orders to county officials.

“I’ve been talking to mayors, to county commissioners, I think people are taking this

serious,” Scott said. “This thing came up fast and it wasn’t like Irma where we had quite a bit of time to prepare.”

State Emergency Management Director Wes Maul, in talking to his staff a few minutes after Scott’s news conference, expressed concern that county shelters have had to quickly set up because Michael formed in a short period of time over the weekend.

Scott said the state is working with the American Red Cross and National Guard to assist counties with shelter needs.

Floridians in counties where election offices closed Tuesday for Hurricane Michael will be able to register to vote the day those offices reopen.



## Privacy rules up for comment

If you want to help shape future privacy rules in the United States, now's your chance.

The National Telecommunications and Information Administration is seeking comments on "ways to advance consumer privacy while protecting prosperity and innovation," according to an announcement on the U.S. Department of Commerce site.

Many, if not most, Americans now share (knowingly or unknowingly) everything they do online, so the chance to help shape the rules is an important task. The default philosophy that can develop from such free sharing tends to signal to industries that no one cares about privacy anymore, but as we have said before, you don't value privacy until you lose it.

And remember, privacy isn't just your pictures on Facebook and tweets. It's essentially everything about you — a profile that defines you and is shared by whoever can pay for it. It may be disguised as a number or sequence of letters and numbers, but it's not difficult to match a profile with a person — and then your Facebook account, your Twitter feed, your Instagram posts, your address and so on.

The latest hack of Facebook further exemplifies why privacy rules here need to be updated — and then perhaps updated again to fix any flaws and close any gaps that result after the rules are enacted. The company has pledged to fix its problems, and so it and other companies that operate online have a powerful incentive to come up with answers.

The European Union has enacted much more stringent rules than the United States — many would say too stringent. They lean on fines for companies and organizations that violate the rules, as much as 4 percent of annual turnover for global companies, according to the UK-based Guardian newspaper.

So, perhaps recognizing the demand for privacy standards and spurred on by hacking breaches, many companies are seeking to shape the privacy rules, and The Associated Press reported Congress, too, is exploring its options. Those options reportedly are not as strict as in Europe, which are among the most stringent in the West. But Congress is trying to move on its own before states like California nudge it toward rules that would be unfriendly to industries tasked with implementing them.

It's tempting to blindly agree to privacy rules when you get a pop-up notifying you a site has updated or changed its privacy rules. Reading the fine print is arduous, and you usually don't have a choice in declining it; if you do, then you can't use the site. Thus, the importance of sharing your ideas.

## The Brock/Young connection in Washington and Holmes County

Recently I read through the letters written by Uncle Jim Brock to my husband's great Aunt Jessie, the youngest sister of his grandmother Mary Young Meeker.

Grandmother Meeker came to Bonifay from LaValle, Wisconsin with her Young family when she was probably a young teen. Aunt Jessie is the only one of the large family who was born in Bonifay. They moved to Bonifay by train around 1890.

I came into possession of the letters by way of John Yarrow Chance, who was the heir to his cousin, Alta Young Adams. Alta is the daughter of Grandma Meeker's brother Will Young. Another cousin, Loqitas Brett Belloit had asked for any information on the Brett family. However, the letters and etc. from Alta contained no Brett family info. Loqitas' grandmother was Martha Young Brett, another sister of Grandma Meeker.

I was hoping to find in Uncle Jim's letters any family information, but they had little substance. He mainly wrote about wanting to come and see Aunt Jessie. He did mention several times about being at the bachelor quarters. This I assumed was a place where he, his dad and brothers stayed in south Washington County while

they were rounding up cattle from the open range or else while they shearing sheep. I learned from a cousin my age, Bill Brock, the son of Angus Brock, Uncle Jim's brother, that the Brocks had sheep as well as cattle. Bill remembered helping with the sheep shearing. Uncle Jim and Angus were two of my Grandmother Hannah Brock Wells' first cousins, the sons of her Uncle Josh Brock.

I am not sure I can name all the others but they include Curtis, Preston, J.N., Ned, and Josh.

I found this recipe for fruit cake among Aunt Jessie's stuff. It contains so many ingredients that I felt it worth printing. When you think of the size of the Brock family, you can imagine a fruit cake this size. The Young family was equally as big. Grandma Meeker was a great cook, but I never ate any of Aunt Jessie's cooking.

Uncle Josh Brock's home was just inside Holmes County north of the Washington County Line. The Young homestead was on Highway 177A inside Bonifay City Limits now.

### Aunt Jessie Young Brock's fruit cake

- ½ pound butter
- 1 pound sugar
- 12 eggs

- one teaspoon each of cream of tartar, and salt
- 1 ½ quarts shelled pecans not chopped
- 1 pound of almonds and 1 pound of brazil nuts chopped
- 1 fresh coconut grated
- 1 orange grated rind
- 3 boxes seeded raisins
- 1 box currants
- 3 boxes dates
- 1 pound crystalized cherries
- 1 can pineapple (crushed, chunks, candied?)
- 1 quart figs (i assume fig preserves)
- 1 pt watermelon rind preserves
- ½ pound citron
- 1 tablespoon each of cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg & allspice
- 1 cup cocoa
- 1 cup fruit juice

Add cream butter and sugar. Add eggs. Mix enough flour to make a stiff batter with spices and cocoa and add to butter and egg mixture. Mix nuts and fruits.

(I added this instruction: dredge fruits and nuts with about a half cup flour) add to egg and butter mixture mixing with hands. bake in a warm oven for four hours.

There are no instructions as to what size pan nor oven temperature. I would guess that would fill two tube pans and bake on 250 to 300 degrees.

## Corporate names go from dollars to donuts

It seems that in the age of abbreviated communication, where "r u ok?" passes for a sentence, and KFC is a place that used to be called Kentucky Fried Chicken, the name Dunkin' Donuts is simply too big a mouthful.

Come January, the Massachusetts-based doughnut purveyor will be known as just Dunkin'.

The move is not unlike what happened a few years back when the world's largest seller of pizza decided to remove the key word from its name. Domino's Pizza became Domino's.

I've always believed it makes good sense for a company's name to at least hint at what it does. United Parcel Service communicates more than UPS. But WW, what the heck is that? It's the new slimmer-down name of Weight Watchers.

At least these well-established

operations waited until they were successful to begin slashing their names into a single meaningless word or string of letters.

Start-ups, however, won't wait. A friend of mine got a job at a firm in San Francisco that calls itself Plaid. I assumed it was a clothing manufacturer or perhaps a supplier to the bagpipe industry. Plaid, it turns out, is a tech company that enables applications to connect with users' bank accounts.

I Googled Plaid and found that it was originally named Silver. It later changed its name to Rambler, before deciding that what would really resonate best in the banking community was Plaid.

Speaking of Google, its name was crafted from the word "googol" - the number 1 followed by 100 zeros - which supposedly conveyed a whole lot of searching. Oddly, founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin originally favored the name BackRub, which apparently had to do with checking back links and not - I repeat not - a service that the bosses provided for each other.

A classic case in the corporate name game occurred in Britain six years ago when a

publisher of yellow-page directories called Yell inexplicably changed its name to Hibu. The Daily Mail wrote: "From Yell to Hibu? Online directory service rebrands itself (and even chief executive admits new name is meaningless)."

Speaking of bizarre names in publishing, Tribune Publishing, owners of the Chicago Tribune and other papers, made the baffling decision a few years back to change its name to Tronc. After two years of confusion and ridicule, the old name was restored.

But in the world of meaningless monikers, nothing says "company that sells many products and delivers them right to your door" like "Amazon." Believe it or not, when founder Jeff Bezos started the company in 1994 he called it Cadabra.

A few months later, Mr. Bezos thought about renaming his company Relentless, but after flipping through a dictionary he settled on Amazon.

If pressed into change-for-change-sake, as happened at Dunkin', would Amazon ever switch back to its original name? Go online to Relentless.com and see for yourself.




## A Sign of Autumn



### Mini Fact:

There are about 120 different kinds of ducks.

Have you seen flocks of ducks in wetlands or flying overhead? Winter is on its way. Daylight time is getting shorter.

For ducks and other animals, it's getting harder to find food. Ice on the water where ducks swim and feed is a threat. In the fall, many ducks are flying night and day to seek warmer weather.

Some start flying south in August. October and November are usually the prime migration months.

### The right route

Scientists aren't sure how ducks know the right route to follow. They might be living compasses, using the magnetic pull of the Earth to guide them. They might use the sun and stars or landmarks as guides.

In North America, ducks usually follow one of four flyways, or bird "highways," when flying south in the winter and north in the spring.

The routes are called the Pacific, Central, Mississippi and Atlantic flyways. They follow waterways.



Migrating ducks might:

- fly only a few miles or up to as many as 5,000 miles each way.
- fly up to 50 miles per hour.
- fly a few miles to a couple of hundred miles per day. Some take their time and often stop a few hours to rest and sleep.

### Wetland rest stops

Wetlands are areas where water is very close to or above the surface of land. They are also called swamps and marshes. Plants, animals and insects live in wetlands. Waterfowl depend on them as places to rest, feed and live.

National Wildlife Refuges are special areas set aside by the U.S. government to protect wildlife and their habitats, or living areas. Most refuges are established to protect migrating birds.



### Ducks help us

Many people eat ducks. Duck hunting is a popular sport. Special farms raise ducks for grocery stores and restaurants.

People collect down, or small duck feathers, from duck nests. Ducks use the down for insulation to keep them warm. People, too, use down to keep them warm, in coats and blankets.

### Ducks and people

Over time, the number of ducks goes up and down for many reasons. In recent years, many duck species have been increasing because rain and snow have filled their wetlands with water. But some ducks are still in trouble because activities by humans are destroying the wetlands.

### Duck Fact-a-roonies

- Diving ducks have small wings and must paddle along the water to pick up speed to take off. Their wings are so small that they can't take off from land.
- Dabbling ducks have larger wings and can take off straight up.
- Ducks can see and hear better than humans. But their senses of smell and taste are poor.
- Ducks have two layers of feathers. The thick top layer helps the duck fly. Under that layer is the fluffy down.
- Ducks also have a special gland that produces oil, which they rub through their feathers using their bill. This is called preening. If ducks could not preen, their feathers would get soaked with water and they couldn't fly well.
- Ducks have webbed feet that help them swim. However, their swimming legs are not good walking legs. That's why they waddle when they walk.
- Female ducks are called hens. Males are called drakes, and babies are called ducklings.

# Three ballot measures take aim at taxes

TALLAHASSEE — Three proposals on the November ballot that would make tax-related changes to the state Constitution have drawn conflicting views from the real-estate industry, local governments and other groups about the measures' potential economic impacts.

Amendment 1 seeks to create a bigger property-tax break for many homeowners by increasing the homestead exemption by \$25,000.

Amendment 2 would make permanent a 10 percent cap on annual property-tax assessment increases for commercial property, apartments and vacation homes.

Amendment 5 would

make it tougher for future lawmakers to raise taxes by requiring two-thirds votes in the state House and Senate to increase taxes or fees, up from the usual majority.

To be added to the state Constitution, each proposal requires 60 percent support from voters in the Nov. 6 election.

Amendments 1, 2 and 5 were crafted the past two legislative sessions, with the most debate surrounding the proposals to increase the homestead exemption and to require two-thirds legislative votes to hike taxes or fees. The tax-related proposals are among 12 constitutional amendments slated for the November ballot.

University of Central Florida political-science professor Aubrey Jewett

said voters aren't getting enough information on any of the amendments.

"When it comes to these proposed amendments on the 2018 ballot, we are basically asking Florida voters to find their way through the political Everglades at night without giving them a map or a flashlight," Jewett said.

## Amendment 1

One of the critics of Amendment 1 is the Tallahassee-based Florida TaxWatch, which recently released a study that said the proposal will "likely increase, not lower, taxes for all Floridians."

TaxWatch estimates that 43 percent of homesteaded property, 76 percent of all properties and 71 percent of Florida

families will not benefit from the exemption. Also, that is before local governments would have to find ways to make up for lost revenue through increasing taxes or cutting services.

## Amendment 2

The real-estate industry group Florida Realtors has poured millions of dollars into an "Amendment 2 is for Everybody" campaign, which says the measure "prevents taxes from skyrocketing, hurting the economy and making rents too expensive."

Voters in 2008

approved a constitutional change that placed a 10 percent cap on annual increases in assessed values of non-homestead properties. The limit will expire Jan. 1 unless it is extended by voters in November through passage of Amendment 2.

## Amendment 5

The League of Women Voters and the Florida Education Association teachers union oppose Amendment 5, arguing that during an economic crisis, the proposal would tie the hands of lawmakers.

"By requiring a supermajority vote of the Legislature for approval of any future tax or fee increase, what they're doing is empowering a super-minority of politicians who will be able to block any attempts to eliminate any loopholes, tax breaks or credits," said Joe Pennisi, chairman of the group Floridians for Tax Fairness.

Oklahoma voters approved a similar supermajority amendment in 1992, which David Blatt, executive director of the Oklahoma Policy Institute, said exacerbated funding problems.

## A game of feet

**Heroes and villains among NFL placekickers in Week 5**

NEW YORK — Some teams can't kick about their kickers. Others might want to kick them off the roster after this weekend.

With the rare exceptions of Indianapolis' Adam Vinatieri and Baltimore's Justin Tucker, there aren't any placekickers whose place in Canton, Ohio, is a topic of discussion. Even Vinatieri and Tucker missed kicks in Week 5.

For every hero with his soccer-style boots, there are flops. Graham Gano nails a career-best 63-yarder to lift Carolina past the Giants — tied for second-longest field goal in NFL history — and Greg Joseph sends a flutterball through the uprights to give Cleveland a 12-10 win over Baltimore. Meanwhile, Mason Crosby has the worst Sunday of his 12-year career with four botched field goals and a missed extra point in a 31-23 loss at Detroit.

Want more? Maybe not, but here goes:


- Chris Boswell missed the extra point after the Steelers' first touchdown, the third he's missed this season. Boswell missed three in his previous three seasons with Pittsburgh.

- Caleb Sturgis' PAT attempt after one Chargers touchdown bounced off the upright for his fourth miss of the season and third in the past two games. The sixth-year kicker has equaled the amount he had over three seasons in Philadelphia from 2015-17.

"The extra point did bother me a little bit, but we'll figure out what happened there," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said. "He's been kicking with a lot of confidence, so I'm not concerned about it."

- The Browns' Joseph clanked an extra point off the right upright, the third extra point missed by Cleveland this season. The rookie then pulled a 55-yard field goal left for the win with 5 seconds left in regulation before connecting in OT.

- Tucker, the most accurate kicker in NFL history, had a 48-yard field goal attempt blocked

by Cleveland rookie Denzel Ward on the final play of the first half. He made three kicks, however, proving he's still the league's most reliable.

- Detroit's Matt Prater missed a 55-yard field goal, badly, sending the football way right. But the strong-legged Prater is one of the best long-range kickers around and holds the record with a 64-yarder for Denver in 2013.

- Cincinnati kicker Randy Bullock had a 37-yard field goal try blocked by Vincent Taylor of Miami in the second quarter. The Bengals still rallied from a 17-0 hole to win.

- Cairo Santos of the Rams had a chance to tie the score at 31 in Seattle but missed a fourth-quarter extra point. He got a chance to redeem himself and did on a 39-yard field goal for the winning points.

- This one is not kicker Stephen Hauschka's fault, and he was being celebrated later with a 46-yard field goal to lift Buffalo past Tennessee. But it was an example of the weird day kicking teams were having.

The Bills botched a field goal late in the first half — either it was a blown fake or an issue getting the ball down for the kick. Holder Corey Bojorquez stood up after taking the snap and tried a short pass back to Hauschka under pressure from Brynden Trawick of the Titans.

- Not to ignore the punters, Atlanta's Matt Boshier had a kick blocked late in the third quarter when Pittsburgh's Roosevelt Nix bulldozed in.

Clearly, the most forgettable performance came from Crosby, who was crushed by it.

"I don't get this much attention unless it's really bad or extremely good," he said. "This one is unfortunately really bad. I'm going to have to really look at this one and this one hurts a bunch. I left a lot of points on the field for this team."

"I look back and I'm thinking, in my childhood, in high school, this is definitely one of the worst ones and I'm

bumped about that."

What really bums out fans is when coaches play for the field goal. It's far worse in college, where the dependability of placekickers is shakier than Crosby was Sunday indoors at Detroit.

But it infiltrates the NFL, too. And when the kickers flop consistently, they lose their jobs.

And like Hauschka and Santos and Sturgis and Bullock, they somehow pop up elsewhere. Until they start missing again.

**PHOENIX**  
Phoenix Suns fire GM McDonough

The Phoenix Suns fired general manager Ryan McDonough on Monday, eight days before the season begins.

James Jones and Trevor Bukstein will share the GM duties on an interim basis for the Suns. Jones is the team's vice president of basketball operations and Bukstein was assistant GM under McDonough, who had been in Phoenix since 2013 and was under contract through 2020.

Suns owner Robert Sarver said in a statement announcing the firing that he made the decision "after much thought and a long evaluation of our basketball operations."

The Suns took Deandre Ayton with the No. 1 overall pick in this year's draft and gave Devin Booker a \$158 million extension during the off-season. Phoenix has had four straight losing seasons and no playoff berth since 2010.

**LAUSANNE, SWITZERLAND**  
CAS: Contamination caused Olympic doping

The Court of Arbitration for Sport has lifted a provisional ban imposed on one of the two Russian athletes who tested positive for doping at the Pyeongchang Olympics.

CAS said Monday that a contaminated product caused bobsled driver Nadezhda Sergeeva's positive test for trimetazidine in South Korea in February.

The CAS anti-doping panel created for the 2018 Games had disqualified Sergeeva from her 12th-place finish.

Sergeeva's case with the panel continues, but any final sanction can be reduced to take into account the seven-month provisional ban she already served.

In April, a Russian federal medical official said "organizational fecklessness" led to Sergeeva's mother, a doctor, giving her unapproved heart medicine

containing trimetazidine.

**SAN ANTONIO**  
Spurs setback: PG Murray lost to torn ACL

Dejounte Murray was driving past James Harden and on his way to the basket, showing one of the skills that made the San Antonio Spurs convinced he's the right point guard for their team.

And then Murray's knee gave out.

In an instant, the entire trajectory of the Spurs' season might have changed.

Murray's season is almost certainly over, after the Spurs learned Monday that their starting point guard has a torn ACL in his right knee. The team hasn't revealed when Murray will have surgery, nor has it determined a timetable for his return, but ACL reconstruction and rehabilitation is a process that typically takes around a full year.

Car owner Rick Hendrick has two drivers in the playoffs, but only one going into the Round of 8. "We hope Alex can get the win down there," said Hendrick, while celebrating with his Dover winner Chase Elliott.

### 2. Welcome, wild-card

While Charlotte Motor Speedway's Roval race has become a wild-card race of sorts for playoff contenders, Talladega Superspeedway will always be a driver's worst nightmare. Eight of the 12 survivors would like to win this race and join Chase Elliott with a pass to the Round of 8. This big, 2.66-mile tri-oval, which is a lane wider than Daytona, always produces major white-knuckle moments.

### 3. Entertainment value

Talladega Superspeedway must have enormous entertainment value because NASCAR's two television partners are airing races on their

#### LONDON Execs cooling on deals amid trade uncertainty

Executives around the world are cooling to the idea of mergers and acquisitions in the face of rising trade tensions, notably between the U.S. and China, a leading adviser on international corporate deals said Monday.

## Facebook wants people to invite its cameras into their homes

SAN FRANCISCO — Facebook is launching the first electronic device to bear its brand, a screen and camera-equipped gadget intended to make

video calls easier and more intuitive.

But it's unclear if people will open their homes to an internet-connected camera sold by a company with a questionable track record on protecting user privacy.

Facebook is marketing the device, called Portal, as a way for its more than 2 billion users to chat with one another without having to fuss with positioning and other

controls. The device features a camera that uses artificial intelligence to automatically zoom as people move around during calls.

Since Echo's release nearly four years ago, both Google and Apple have followed Amazon in releasing smart speakers for "smart" homes as people install appliances, lighting and security systems that can be controlled over the internet.

Portal represents Facebook's entry into that fray. But pointing an artificially intelligent camera into peoples' homes could well raise other privacy questions.

"The first thing consumers are going to wonder is 'how much sensitive data is this collecting about me?'" said John Breyault, vice president of public policy of telecommunications and fraud at the National Consumers League, a Washington-based consumer advocacy group that has received donations from Facebook and other tech companies.

On Monday, Twitter users were quick to point to Facebook's privacy fallacies and what they saw as the company's impudence in asking people to trust it with a camera called Portal inside their homes. Some compared it to the always-on, always-watching telescreens in George Orwell's dystopian novel "1984." Others saw the gadget's appeal — but not if it comes from Facebook.

It's a particularly trying time for Facebook to release a home camera. Earlier this year, the company had to acknowledge that as many as 87 million people may have had their data accessed by Cambridge Analytica, a data mining firm that worked for the Trump campaign and aimed to use the data to influence elections. More recently, Facebook revealed that hackers managed to pierce its security to break into 50 million accounts.

Facebook says it won't "listen to, view or keep the contents" of video calls, adding that the Portal camera won't use facial recognition

or identify people in the video calls. The device will allow users to disable the camera and microphone with a single tap and to lock it with a numerical passcode. There's also a physical camera cover to prevent recording.

Portal will not display Facebook ads "at this time," the company said, although it noted that third-party services such as music streaming might embed their own ads the same way they do on other devices.

The company says Facebook's privacy policy applies to Portal, since it uses Messenger for voice and video calls. Facebook executives have repeatedly said that the company does not use the contents of messages or calls for advertising purposes and will not do so in the future. Still, there are other, less direct possibilities for the future.

"This is going to gain (Facebook) not only a place in the smart home, but also data they may not have been able to collect before or understand before," said ABI Research analyst Jonathan Collins. This includes people's location, activities and interests — "all the reasons companies want to get into the home."

That said, Facebook says Portal does not collect any information about people's home, listening only for voice commands. The camera, when enabled, detects people as they walk into the room but does not identify specific people or record anything about people's homes, according to Facebook.

Facebook will offer Portal in two sizes — a \$199 model with a 10-inch horizontal screen and a \$349 "Plus" version with a 15.6-inch screen that can switch between vertical or horizontal orientations.

Both models also include an internet-connected speaker that features Amazon's voice-activated digital assistant, Alexa. Portal connects calls through Messenger, meaning that it can reach people who don't have a Portal themselves. And since Messenger can be used without a Facebook account, Portal users won't need a Facebook account to use it — only Messenger.

## Stocks mixed, but tech slides

NEW YORK — U.S. stock indexes found their footing after a sharp early loss Monday and finished mixed. Technology companies sank for the third day in a row.

Stocks slumped in morning trading following big declines late last week. Some of the largest losses went to technology companies, including payment and credit card companies. Indexes in Europe also dropped as Italy vowed to ramp up spending that will increase its deficit.

A sharp increase in bond yields last week had startled investors and prompted them to shift money out of stocks. Bond markets in the U.S. were closed for the Columbus Day holiday and stock trading was relatively light.

Banks, which often rise along with interest rates, continued their advance. High-dividend companies, which tend to fall when yields go up, recovered some of their losses from last week.

The S&P 500 index dipped 1.14 points to 2,884.43. The Dow Jones Industrial Average reversed an early loss of 223 points and rose 39.73 points, or 0.2 percent, to 26,486.78.

The Nasdaq composite sank 52.50 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,735.95. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks slipped 2.60 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,629.51. The Nasdaq and Russell are each coming off their worst week since late March.

Among payment technology companies, PayPal slid 3.2 percent to \$80.55 and Mastercard fell 2.3 percent to \$208.26. Elsewhere, Microsoft lost 1.1 percent to \$110.85.

Alphabet, Google's parent company, fell 1 percent to \$1,155.92 after it said a flaw in its Google Plus social network may have exposed personal information of as many as 500,000 people. It will end Google Plus for consumers next year.

Google found the problem in March, and the Wall Street Journal reported that the company didn't disclose it at the time, partly to avoid scrutiny from regulators and damage to its reputation. The company didn't comment on that report.

Overseas, Italy's deputy premier vowed to press ahead with a plan to increase spending and the country's deficit even after the European Commission expressed "serious concern" about the notion.

Italy's FTSE MIB dropped 2.4 percent and Italian bond prices dropped, sending yields higher.

## What to ask your school about safety precautions

Whether you drop them off at elementary school or they're driving themselves to high school, school safety is on every parent's mind. They're out of your sight and you can't protect them. What should parents think about — or ask their children's schools — regarding school safety?

The Feb. 14, 2018, shooting at Stone-man Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, reignited a national conversation about school safety, but school safety isn't just about gun safety, said Amanda Klinger, director of operations at The Educator's School Safety Network, a not-for-profit organization dedicated to empowering educators with school safety training and resources.

"Schools are not prisons, and they shouldn't become prisons," she said.

The issue is more broad than solely the violent incidents that

major media chooses to focus on, Klinger said.

"If you have inadequate supervision at dismissal and a child gets hit by a car, that's a school safety issue," she said.

Schools must work on crisis prevention across the board to protect students from natural events such as hurricanes, tornadoes and earthquakes, power outages and fires — as well as from school shootings, Klinger said. Statistically speaking, your child's school is very unlikely to be the target of a shooting but much more likely to endure a weather-related safety issue, she said.

### What you can do

While Congress has increased federal support through 2015's Every Student Succeeds Act, which schools can use in a variety of ways including for safety measures, 39 state legislatures have proposed a variety of approaches to improve school safety — including more than 100

bills since the Parkland shooting, according to Politico in April. Some call for arming school personnel, while others address emergency response plans, require emergency drills, add school resource officers and strengthen building security and mental health services.

### Parents can help, too

"Parents can be incredible advocates for school safety, but they are often an untapped resource," Klinger said. Start a conversation with school officials to find out what safety measures are in place at your child's school, Klinger said. Ask if you can volunteer to be a part of the school safety team.

Find out if your school has added physical security measures, but don't be fooled by quick fixes, Klinger said.

Too often schools focus on physical security (called "target hardening") but skimp on the second line of defense, which are the

policies and procedures needed to back it up, Klinger said.

"School safety is a billion-dollar industry. Parents want to see that schools are doing things to make schools safer," which often results in metal detectors, security cameras and bulletproof coatings added to doors, she said. What good, though, is taking a visitor's name and identification at the front door only to allow them to wander alone through the school once they pass the gatekeeper, Klinger asked.

Schools also need to develop age-appropriate emergency drills that will not scare or intimidate children, Klinger said.

### Ongoing issue

There is no one-size-fits-all solution to school safety.

"The conversation about an active shooter at a school is a hot topic, but even if all the guns magically disappeared tomorrow there would still be school safety issues," she said.





## ASK PASTOR ADRIENNE

### Do I have to decorate for Halloween?

**Q:** Dear Pastor, It makes me mad that there's very little decor celebrating Fall since it's all about Halloween. Any suggestions for alternatives to creepy garbage?

**A:** Thank you for that question since it forces me to plan my decorative strategy as well. If you're a long-time reader, you know that my feelings toward Halloween aren't exactly warm, so I welcome the opportunity to discuss an alternative decor.

Autumn is a favorite time for many people in the Midwest where we enjoy four seasons of weather. It is most definitely mine as well — temperatures in the 50s bring brisk, refreshing breezes; clear moonlit nights display astrological vistas; stunning swaths of deciduous trees are in glorious color, and a feeling like one has survived the sweltering heat and humidity after all, settles us down toward the end of the year. It's the lull before the holiday onslaught where peace brings a restful, quiet time. In the rural farming areas, this is also the harvest season where we have God to thank for his provision. For many, it is a special time of contemplation.

Let us consider God's

calendar and the earth's orbit as well: we recognize this unique season of the year is just days past the "autumnal equinox" which has unfortunately been hijacked by the witches, warlocks, Wiccans and Druids who do horrible things in recognition of it (yet it remains a fantastic astrological time in the heavens), the Jewish new year has just begun (Rosh Hashana) and God has been honored via his Special Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur). And yet for practicing Christians, we're left looking a month down the road and pining for Thanksgiving since there isn't much by way of a marked celebration honoring God. This fact may also explain why Halloween has wormed its way into church culture where it has no business being. So what do we do?

My rule of thumb, as I hang fall wreaths and decorate porches and walkways, is to stay away from anything with a face. This is because the origin of Halloween's

face-oriented objects stem from the belief that evil spirits walk the earth during this season and we are somehow protected from evil when we display jack-o'-lanterns, scarecrows and the assorted ghouls. The truth is that evil spirits have no power over Christ's kids, so there is no need for Christians to display these items.

Now, I am an anti-Halloween zealot, so this is my rule and advice. But it certainly doesn't have to be yours. I realize adorable scarecrows are available everywhere and may well have an important function in protecting thieving garden critters. Yet in my opinion, once we start down the Halloween aisle, it's difficult to draw the line. Ghosts become "sweet," witches become "cute," death-like tombstones are "fun" and blood-sucking beings become "delightful." My heart's conviction is to focus on the Lord during this extraordinary time of year and leave the personified objects off my landscape.

Happy Harvest! And may all God's blessings be upon you as you choose an alternative message to Halloween in your home and community.

# Later-life caregiving

As lifespans lengthen, people in their 60s and 70s are left to care for elderly parents

"This won't go on for very long," Sharon Hall said to herself when she invited her elderly mother, who'd suffered several small strokes, to live with her.

That was five years ago, just before Hall turned 65 and found herself crossing into older age.

In the intervening years, Hall's husband was diagnosed with frontotemporal dementia and forced to retire. Neither he nor Hall's mother, whose memory had deteriorated, could be left alone in the house. Hall had her hands full taking care of both of them, seven days a week.

As lifespans lengthen, adult children like Hall in their 60s and 70s are increasingly caring for frail, older parents — something few people plan for.

"When we think of an adult child caring for a parent, what comes to mind is a woman in her late 40s or early 50s," said Lynn Friss Feinberg, senior strategic policy adviser for AARP's Public Policy Institute. "But it's now common for people 20 years older than that to be caring for a parent in their 90s or older."

A new analysis from the Center for Retirement Research at Boston College is the first to document how often this happens. It found that 10 percent of adults ages 60 to 69 whose parents are alive serve as caregivers, as do 12 percent of adults age 70 and older.

The analysis is based on data from 80,000 interviews (some people were interviewed multiple times) conducted from 1995 to 2010 for the Health and Retirement Study. About 17 percent of adult children care for their parents at some point in their lives, and the likelihood of doing so rises with age, it reports.

That's because parents who've reached their 80s, 90s or higher are more likely to have chronic illnesses and related disabilities and to require assistance, said Alice Zulkarnain, co-author of the study.

The implications of later-life caregiving are considerable. Turning an elderly parent in bed, helping someone get into a car or waking up at night to provide assistance can be demanding on older bodies, which are more vulnerable.

Emotional distress can aggravate this vulnerability. "If older caregivers have health problems themselves and become mentally or emotionally stressed, they're at a higher risk of dying," said Richard Schulz, a professor of psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh, citing a study he published in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

Socially, older caregivers can be even more isolated than younger caregivers. "In your 60s and 70s, you may have recently retired and friends and family members are beginning to get sick or pass away," said Donna Benton, research associate professor of gerontology and director of the Family Caregiver Support Center at the University of Southern California.

Caregiving at an older age can put hard-earned savings at risk with no possibility of replacing them by re-entering the workforce. Yvonne Kuo, a family care navigator at USC's caregiver support center, has been helping an 81-year-old woman caring for her 100-year-old mom with vascular dementia in this situation.

"There's no support from family, and she's used up her savings getting some paid help. It's very hard," Kuo said.

Judy Last, 70, a mother of three adult children and grandmother

of six youngsters, lives with her mother, Lillian, 93, in a mobile home park in Boise, Idaho. Last moved in three years ago, after her mother had a bout of double pneumonia, complicated by a difficult-to-treat bacterial infection that put her in the hospital for eight weeks.

"You don't know if it's going to be permanent at the time," said Last, whose father died of dementia in January 2016 after moving to a memory care facility. "Mom had asked me several years before if I would be there when she needed help and I told her yes. But I didn't really understand what I was getting into."

Feinberg said this isn't uncommon. Last doesn't find caregiving physically difficult even though she's had two hip replacements and struggles with arthritis and angina. Her mother has memory problems and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, relies on oxygen, uses a walker, has lost most of her hearing, and has poor eyesight.

But things are hard, nonetheless. "I had plans for my retirement: I imagined volunteering and being able to travel as much as my bank account would allow," Last said. "Instead, I don't take time off and leave my mother. A big thing I deal with is the loss of my freedom."

Hall, who's turning 70 in September and who lives in Cumming, Ga., managed her mother's and husband's complex needs for years by establishing a strict routine. Monday and Friday they went to a dementia respite program from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. On other days, Hall cooked, shopped, did laundry, helped them with personal tasks, made sure they were well occupied, provided companionship and drove them to medical appointments, as necessary.

"I did not expect this kind of life," said Hall, who has had two knee replacements and a broken femur. "If someone had told me it would be years caring for my mother and your husband is going to get dementia, I would have said 'No, just no.' But you do what you have to do."

### Standing pose will build strength and balance

Everyone has their own fitness routine. Some are diehard runners, others are CrossFitters, weightlifters, walkers, group fitness junkies, yogis and at-homers. I think it's great that there are so many ways to incorporate fitness into our daily lives.

Our move today is a Warrior 3 pose, with a pulsing leg.

All you need for this is a little balance.

This move will work your core, back, glutes, and hamstrings. And, of course, your balance.

Begin this pose by standing tall. Extend both arms straight out in front of your chest, keeping your



shoulders back and down. Engaging your midsection, proceed to lift one leg straight up behind you. Shift your weight to

the stabilizing leg.

Keeping the elevated leg straight, push through with a flexed foot and begin a small pulsing

motion. This is where balance comes into play.

Continue this pulse, holding everything else tight, for at least a count of 10.

Drop the elevated leg and repeat on the other side. If you need help with balancing, grasp the edge of a counter, back of a chair or even hold a broomstick. You'll want to focus on your core and glutes.

Shoot for at least two to three sets on each side.

This move is great to incorporate into any fitness plan you already have.
