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FOUR-DAY TRAINING PROGRAM IN BASSETTERRE, ST. KITTS, FOR JEHOVAH'S WITNESSEES

The Philipsburg congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses are making preliminary plans to attend a four-day training program in Basseterre, St. Kitts, it was announced recently.

Mr. Gust W. Maki, presiding minister of the group, in discussing the announcement with the congregation, pointed to the challenge to Christian thinking and unity in the rising tide of materialism.

"The object of the program," Mr. Maki said, "is to equip ministers in the practical use of the Bible as a help in attaining unity and fortifying the spiritual morale of the people in the community."

The announcement came as a climax to the weekly ministry-development program held at the Kingdom Hall on the Front Street in Philipsburg.

Mr. Maki said that Jehovah's Witnesses are enrolled in the ministerial training of at least five classes weekly. "These classes are designed to promote Christian unity and also for this reason, the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, the sponsors for this four-day Basseterre refresher course, have set the theme of the assembly as the "United Worshipers District Assembly", he explained.
