ing such replacement. It would, of course, be entirely possible for one mechanic to do all of the work involved. It would not be practicable, however. This would involve his having all of the tools and equipment of the various crafts. In every big plant there is usually an efficiency engineer. The rules regarding the division of labor are made more from the standpoint of efficiency than from the standpoint of protecting the mechanics. The same rules are in force in open shops as in closed shops. These rules were not established during the recent war as Mr. Alfred would have you believe.

"These same rules were in effect in 1907 in the I. and N. shops at Louisville, Ky., at that time a strictly open shop, not dominated by unions but run on the same rules



of efficiency as are upheld by all unions.

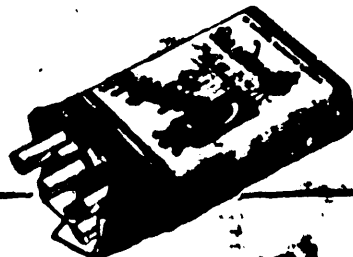
