FLORIDA TOPICS

Short items from all sections of the State

The annual reunion of the Florida division United Confederate Veterans, will be held in Gainesville on November 10 and 11.

On and after December 1st, unless well held prior to that date, the "Hello Girl" will be in evidence by West Palm Beach and a first class telephone service will be inaugurated.

Robert Alton Burdick, Jr., of Ocala, has been elected to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., for the class of 1908. The young soldierman is a native of this county.

Plans for the annual reunion of the Florida division, United Confederate Veterans, have been definitely determined upon, and this year the big reunion will be held in Gainesville on November 10 and 11.

James W. Hutchinson, chief of the tree department of Orange, N. J., died of hemorrhage of the lungs on Florida East Coast passenger train on Saturday morning en route from Miami to Jacksonville.

Wholesale arrests of liquor men have been made in Tampa because they refuse to pay their new license fee, which has been increased from \$250 to \$500. If the dealers refuse to pay, they will carry their cases to the State Supreme Court.

Hon. James W. Perkins advised last Monday the first sale of fruit from this section for this season. It was a car of very poor quality. Mr. Chase, the Sanford orange broker, took charge of the car and sold it for \$97.50, which nets Mr. Perkins about \$2 on the tree. There were 250 boxes. DeLand Record.

E. E. Roper, who lost a large chunk of his fortune as a result of a damage suit won by Judge Louis A. Stewart some time ago, is a candidate for the State Senate against Frank W. Sams, the Democratic nominee. Mr. Roper is a Republican, but he favors Governor Howard's drainage scheme and he will stand by the Governor.

The case of the State of Florida vs. William King, in which King was on trial at DeLand for the murder in the first degree, charged with the killing of Tom Powell, the homicide having occurred at DeLand, on this year, was brought to a close last Thursday when it was announced that King had been found dead in his bed in jail.

There are over 100 students up at Station Liberty, and the total continues to increase by the arrival of new students. There are students there from all over Florida and from many of the Northern States. It is going to be a great year for Station, the best it has ever had. DeLand Record.

St. Augustine is to be congratulated on the policy of raising \$5000 for the purchase of an additional site for the State school for the deaf, dumb and blind. One of the conditions required by the State Board of Control before that body would consent to the erection of the much needed new buildings was that the city should provide suitable grounds.

Major Robert Gamble died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Howard Gamble, in Tallahassee, Wednesday night. Major Gamble was a member of the distinguished Gamble family. He was the oldest resident of Leon county, being ninety-three years of age. He came to Florida from Virginia in 1827, and has resided in the State continuously since that date.

By January 1 Tampa will be connected over the Peninsular Telephone Company lines with the long distance lines of the Bell Telephone Company between Jacksonville and the United States north of that point, and the entire country will be brought into communication with this city. Manager W. G. Brorien, of the Peninsular Telephone Company, yesterday said that the wires would soon be connected with the exchange here. According to Manager Brorien, this has been made possible by the absorption of the Bell Company in this city by the Peninsular Company. - Tampa Tribune.

Louis Wagener, winner of the sectional Vanderbilt cup race this year, will be seen in January, speeding over the famous Ormond Daytona course, and striving with other great drivers for the supremacy.

J. W. Risher, charged with murder, was acquitted by Duval county circuit court Tuesday. In an altercation a couple of weeks ago Risher is said to have struck one Hodges over the head with an ax handle, causing the death.

It is claimed that ex-Governor Jennings wrote the drainage amendment. The ex-Governor proposed the Internal Improvement Fund Tax, and the drainage board at a salary of \$5000 per year, which is \$1500 per year, more than he received as governor.

Hon. Alfred St. Clair-Abrams, editor of the Times Herald, and A. K. Taylor, the cartoonist, mention of whose arrest was recently made on the charge of criminal libel of Ex-Governor Jennings, have each been bound over in the sum of \$500, and will be tried in the Duval county criminal court.

Shipments of oranges from Tampa for the week ending October 6 were 6,175,000, the largest week's shipments of the present year. Previously reported shipments for the present year were 191,870,000. Total shipments for the same period of last year were 191,417,000. The increase in shipments for this year up to October 6 was 34,700,000.

The counties of Florida, one by one, are forbidding the sale of liquor. It is not a wave nor a stampede. The work is going on deliberately, thoughtfully and thoroughly. The fruit will be gathered in the harvest of young men who will grow up free from the saloon influence. The elimination of the saloon from politics will also be hailed as an unalloyed blessing by all—except the booze grafters. - Monticello News.

Every section of the city is now enjoying one of the greatest building booms ever witnessed in any southern city. The records kept at the office of the building commissioner will show that from fifty to seventy-five new residences and business houses are erected in Jacksonville every month, and that over 1000 buildings have been erected since May 1, 1905. Everywhere the eye is cast no matter in which section of the city one may stand, new residences and business houses can be seen going up.

Mr. J. N. Whitney, one of the prominent citizens of Orange County, one of the first and largest growers of celery at Sanford, Fla., says that a few years ago he spent a considerable part of his home, three miles from Sanford, Fla., town, where there was a large quantity of celery growing. The crop was a good one, and he received \$5000, and his neighbor received \$1000. All the celery grown in the county is now raised in the vicinity of Sanford. The celery growers are making fortunes. - Volusia county Record.

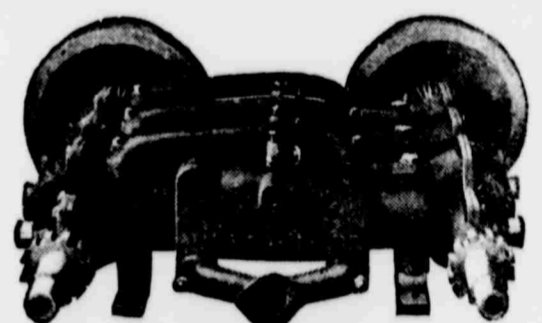
