PINEAPPLE GROWERS HEAR ANNUAL REPORT

The Indian River and Lake Worth Pineapple Growers' Association annual meeting was to have been held in Jensen Wednesday, but on account of the lack of a quorum no business could be conducted.

General Agent E. P. Purcher gave a detailed statement of the association's business for the past year's pineapple crop, showing that the association had handled 62,000 crates and returned to the shippers on the entire movement handled by them an average price of \$1.59 per crate. This average price is considerably out down in comparison of the large number of crates, which brought less than an average, and the receipt of 111 crates which were in such a rotten state that freight charges could not be got out of them.

The association returned to the shippers their payments of \$24, 304, 84 and 100 cents of 124 an average price of \$2.14 per crate, which was certainly a splendid average. The large payments of 124, 188 and more than 200 crates that were smaller than 44 brought the average for the entire movement down to \$1.59 per crate, which would appear small for a short crop season if not explained.

Those present expressed their satisfaction at the manner in which their fruit had been handled by the association, and several expressed the opinion that they would patronize the association next year more liberally, rather than to sell far in advance of the season at as low a figure as controlled last year.
